Parents and friends of the children, who will enter school here next fall, were special guests at the program, and arrangements by Mrs. Babin and her room coordinators, Mrs. Virgil Barron and Mrs. Frank Babin.

Dances and songs the children had learned were presented, and was pointed out that during the three-week course, the group had learned to work as a team together, to help each other, to care for their things, to use the drinking fountain and to care for themselves.

At the end of the program, the children were taken to school in the fall.

School authorities here believe this to be the only pre-school of its kind in the state, and that it has made the notable progress of pupils in the first grade who had had this preparation.

Mrs. Babin, who last year studied up-to-date methods of kindergarten teaching in Chicago, has been commended by many parents for her work with the children in the three-week period.

Big Dividends Hold up, Yet Business Dips
 WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—Despite the decline in business this year, corporations are paying bigger dividends than they did in boom time 1948, the commerce department said today.
 "Yet business has been cutting down on inventories for the first time since the war—chiefly by holding back on buying in expectation that prices will go down."
 Department reports showed that publicly reported cash dividends by corporations in April, totalling \$414,000,000, were three per cent higher than in April, 1948. For February, March and April combined, they totalled \$1,364,000,000, and were eight per cent above the same three months of 1948.
 Publicly reported dividends account for about 60 to 65 per cent of all dividends paid, the department said.
 The strong showing of dividend payments has been one factor in slowing up the decline this year in personal income, which fell to an annual rate of \$11,100,000,000 in April after a month-by-month decline from the peak rate of \$22,100,000,000 attained last December.
 Chief explanation given for the higher dividend payments despite the economic downturn is that business no longer feels a need to set aside so much of its earnings to expand its capacity.

Drugs Aiding Fight Against Liquor Habit

PLACID CITY, June 11.—A stupor-producing drug is aiding in the treatment of alcoholism, the American Medical association has told today.

The idea, said two Seattle physicians at the closing session of the AMA's 58th annual meeting, is this: In the trance-like state produced, the patient can still talk, and he is administered by a doctor seeking to learn the real reasons why the patient began hitting the bottle in a big-league style.

Then, after learning "salient points in his alcoholic history" the doctor gives the entranced patient "strong suggestions against alcohol and toward correction of faulty habits of thinking."

(The doctors didn't say so in their report, but the theory is that the drug makes the patient tell what's on his sub-conscious mind—thus revealing the problems responsible for his drinking habits.)

Work with the drug—called "pentothal"—was described by Doctors Frederick Lemay and Paul O'Holaren of the Blaine Sanitarium for the treatment of alcoholism at Seattle.

They said it was an effective aid in the treatment of heavy drinking associated with nervous tension.


