

Democrats Stake Chances for 1950 in Brannan Plan

June 14 (P)—Democrats will stake their chances for a midwestern farm-belt victory in 1950 on the controversial new farm plan promising a new administration's new farm plan promising a new farmer prosperity.

The latest conference voted yesterday to endorse the Democratic midwestern program advanced by Secretary Brannan and endorsed by President Truman.

State party officials, the conference made known by having Brannan and other top-ranking Democratic leaders advance the measure for preventing a new farm depression, and as a victory vehicle in next year's congressional elections.

The plan was taken in the face of a storm of opposition from the powerful American Farm Bureau federation. This federation, which has more members in the midwest area than any other farm group, has been a major force in the Republican bloc since the passage of the farm program last year.

Willings for Choice Farm belt Democrats said they were willing to let farmers choose between the administration's so-called Brannan plan and the Altieri law.

It was the midwest that President Truman signed a legislative victory in the presidential race last year. Republicans have declared their intention to try to win the traditionally GOP farm vote back into the party fold next year.

Higher Returns Pledged In brief, the Brannan plan would promise the farmers higher returns than the Altieri law, and that same prices on surplus perishable commodities. It would demand more upon subsidies to support farm income than would the Altieri measure.

Confidence in the Brannan plan was very small. "We are not sure that they will seek the lawmakers to continue the present wartime price support system for the next two or three years," congressional officials said.

Debt Rise Cited The growth of the national debt, the rise of the cost of living, and the high unemployment rate are the main reasons for the program, according to the Brannan plan.

Basin Runoff Is "Orderly," Bureau Says

BOISE, June 14 (AP)—The orderly runoff of waters in the Columbia river basin in Idaho has been "orderly" for farmers, the U. S. Geological survey has reported here.

In its monthly water resources review, the survey said the heavy snowpack melted in an orderly fashion and added that there were no damaging floods during May.

Far Above Average

However, in almost every major river in Idaho the runoff during May was well above the 30-year average for the stream, the survey declared.

Most streams in Idaho reached their peak between May 16 and 18, with the Kootenai river rising to a point only four feet of a year ago. However, there was no property damage reported from the stream.

"Some reservoirs are already at peak level, but are being drawn down for irrigation purposes," the survey report said.

Little Flood Change

The report added that there was little change of a flood during June on most of Idaho's streams.

The Idaho report contrasted sharply with the report on the Colorado river basin where, said the report, the river runoff was below normal during May because of the rapid snowpack melt in April.

The river was running below normal this year despite the heavy snows in the Colorado Rockies during the winter months.

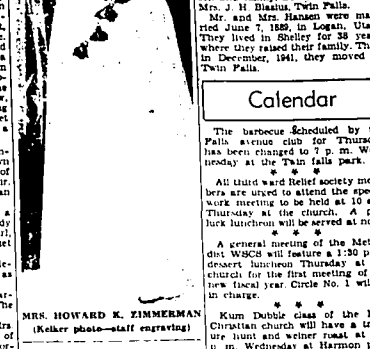
