### Solon Favors U. S. 'Shelf' of Project Plans

WASHINGTON, June 15 (AP)—The reclamation bureau should have a backlog of project plans "on the shelf" ready for quick use in the event of widespread unemployment, Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney, D. Wyo., believes.

O'Mahoney told a senate appropriations subcommittee he believed that such a "shelf" should be available at all times in case of emergency.

Reclamation Commissioner Michael Bruckner said there was no backlog now of project plans and specifications.

**Congress Approved Fast**  
"Congress has taken projects off the shelf as fast as they are developed," he told O'Mahoney. "There has been any amount of work with the exception of some of the Missouri river basin, the Boulder dam in Washington, and others in the new Columbia basin."

**Cites Backlog**  
"So there is that much of a program on the shelf," O'Mahoney asked. "The bureau replied, 'but once a project is started I consider it off the shelf,'" he said.

O'Mahoney and Ben Carl Hayden, D. Ariz., recalled that in 1930 there were appropriated \$1,000,000,000 for public works to take up some of the unemployment slack.

"But there were no plans," Hayden said, "and we fell back on small projects such as city halls and courthouses. They're fine but they are not wealth-creating in themselves in the way that reclamation and power projects are."

**Reasons for Support**  
O'Mahoney said that was the reason he favored the "shelf" idea. "Some people who oppose reclamation have a poor understanding," Hayden said, "are actually afraid that if plans are drawn the work will be done."

O'Mahoney said that if congress wanted a project should more money for plans and investigations should be appropriated. "I would like the house-approved bill carrying funds for the reclamation bureau was the best appropriation bill he has ever seen."

### Electric Firm 'Small Spuds' To U. S. Plan

WASHINGTON, June 15 (AP)—Sen. Zales Epton, R., Mont., says the Montana Power and Light company is "small potatoes" compared to power developments of the federal government.

He asked a Senate appropriations subcommittee to curtail federal development in his state, particularly in cases where the company is willing to do the work.

He opposed construction of federal power lines from Canyon Ferry dam, from Spokane to Anacosta, and from Tracy to Shelby. He endorsed appropriations for Yellowstone "dam" but urged that settlement be reached in advance of construction work. Crow Indians whose land was damaged, he also endorsed Moreshead dam funds.

**Devils on Conflict**

The major part of his consent to the subcommittee was devoted to the conflict between public and private power development.

"There was a time when the Montana Power and Light company was considered one of the great operating corporations," he said, "but after seeing the government commission on public power, I am convinced that the company is a small potato."

Sen. Epton of Montana, Okla., said he agreed with Epton on federal power developments.

**Asks for Monopoly**

"As these two, you wouldn't you rather live under a private monopoly than a government monopoly?" he asked.

"As far as the Montana Power and Light company is concerned, I remain 'small,'" Epton replied.

Epton said it embarrassed him to find that the company had been one of the few that would bring electricity to farmers. But he said he was sure they could get power from private sources.

"It did without electricity on my farm," he said, "and I don't want to be 'small' and eventually I got it and I think these people will get it. I don't want to see them get it with those people to supply that power."

Kulp made his statement in answer to criticism from several groups that he was allowing his office to be used by the association to fight the formation of Columbia valley administration.

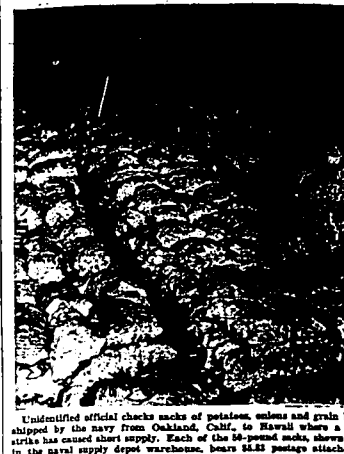
"If the association was purely political in nature, and if its job was to fight the CVA, I would kick the group out of my office," Kulp declared.

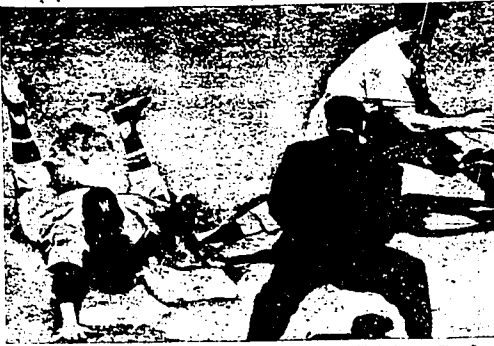

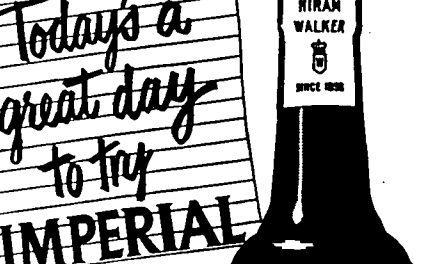

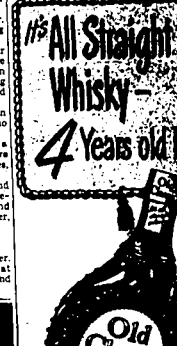

### Civil Service Exams Listed On Positions

Examinations for geophysicist and food sanitation inspector and vessel sanitation inspector have been announced by the U. S. civil service commission. No written tests are required. The positions to be filled from the geophysicist examination pay from \$3,777 to \$6,235 a year and are in various federal agencies in Washington, D. C., and throughout the United States. Appointments will be made from the sanitation inspector examina-

tions to positions in the U. S. public health service throughout the country. Applicants will be required to change places of duty frequently. Food sanitation inspector positions pay \$3,474 and \$5,727 a year and vessel sanitation inspector positions from \$3,351 to \$4,102. To qualify, applicants must have had from three to four and one-half years experience in sanitation work pertinent to the positions for which they are applying. Appropriate college study or specialized training may be substituted for not more than three years of the required experience for either type of position. The age limits for these examinations, 18 to 42 years, are waived for persons with veteran preference. Applications for food sanitation inspector and vessel sanitation in-

pector must be received by the commission not later than July 31. Applications for geophysicist will be accepted until further notice. Further information and application forms may be obtained from the commission's local secretary, H. F. 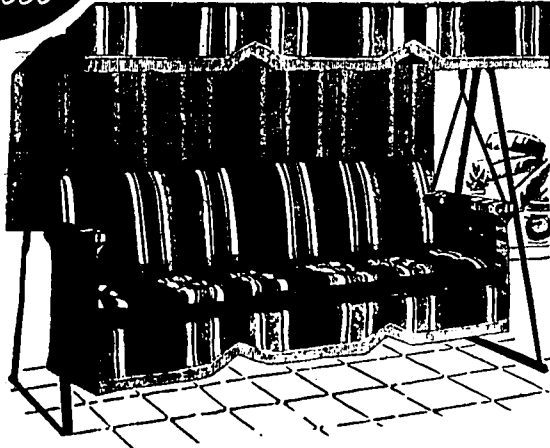

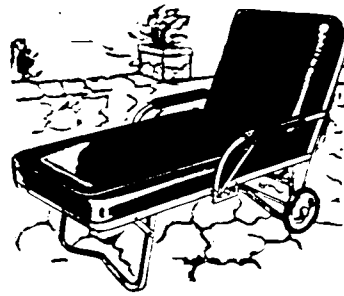

### Chinese Reds Retaining Ban On Reporters

PUSAN, Korea, June 15 (AP)—Up to the time I left Peking last week, the Chinese communists had shown no signs of lifting the ban against foreign correspondents.

The ban was imposed Feb. 21. On that day 17 persons listed as foreign correspondents received a formal order forbidding them to gather or file news. It was signed by Gen Yeh Chien, head of the communist military committee.

This action, the notification said, was taken because Peking was a military area.

Letter Unanswered—A letter to Yen asking him to say when the ban might be lifted went unanswered. Paced with a wall of silence, correspondents began to leave north China, and today only a handful still are there. Whether they will be able to file news again is problematical.

The communists came into the

great cities of Peking and Tientsin not as "scapegoats" but with determined plans to break the graft and corruption of the past.

Best of Great Yonderies—Even foreigners opposed to communism concede red leaders have displayed none of the get-rich-quick tendencies of previous conquerors. They are convinced, too, that those leaders would take stern action against any of their own number who might be found succumbing to the lure of easy wealth.

However, foreigners believe the communists will have an uphill battle to eliminate graft.
