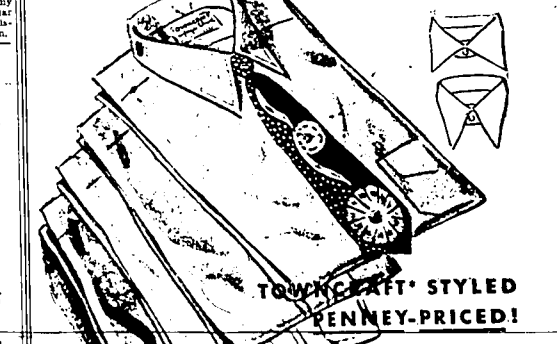

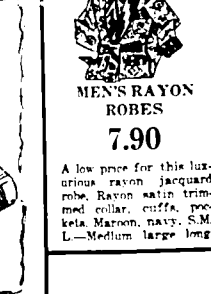

# Old Schoolmaster Avers He Never Spanked Any Students

By CASLEDA STEELMINTH

BURLEY, June 15—When 38 former pupils of Sublett and Beecher schools gathered for a reunion here today, they elected their school teacher, Charles Reeves, Buhl, it was a rare occasion, since only one living teacher has returned to hold a reunion with his pupils of more than 50 years before.

Reeves, who calls himself "the old schoolmaster" in the many poems he has written, greeted 38 of his former students in person at the meeting at the third ward LDS church, and letters from 11 students who could not come, and inquired about the remaining five who could not come or send letters of greeting.

In speaking of schools of today and yesterday, Reeves said that pupils of 50 years ago stored many of their lessons in their memories because school books were few. Much of the figuring in arithmetic was done "in the head" because of the lack of carrying paper, and his pupils learned long passages from the old classics.

As for the problem of discipline, there wasn't one "in my years of teaching. I had 60 children in my schools, and I never spanked any of them." Reeves said "I was proud of every one of them, and none of my children got into trouble in later years." "I tried to instill in them a love for their country, first, and then a love of their community, and tried to teach them to be good citizens."

Although he is 87 years old, he is looking forward to another reunion with his "boys and girls" next July.

The celebration was really a two-day event, with outdoors, their children, and grandchildren calling

Not only a teacher and a lawyer, Reeves served the United States with the Texas Rangers on the Mexican border and in the Philippine islands before going to Sublett.

Hisop Lawrence Tolman, a son of Judge Hunt, who was former pupil of Reeves, received a family portrait book, given in honor of the reunion, who had 16 children, all here readers in their communities. Reeves presented his pupils with copies of his poems, written in memory of their school days.

A pleasant picture of Western Idahoan writers, by Reeves, was presented by Mrs. Lawrence Tolman.

At that time she wrote a number of letters which she later included in her book "Over the Hill," a book of poetry which she says is a "by-product" of her teaching. ### Gooding County's Seed Warned by Agent

GOODING, June 18.—Gooding county clover seed growers were warned by County Agent R. H. Higgins Thursday that the production of clean seed is becoming increasingly important.

He declared it will pay the grower as well to do a good job of roguing because a support seed and because seed dealers find it hard to sell polluted seed. Higgins said a good clipping and roguing program will bring higher quality seed and higher prices.

The county agent said sweet clover seed is the worst offender. It is a biennial plant and produces seed only the second year. Early roguing helps remove it. Higgins said red clover seeds should be clipped for hay now. After clipping care should be taken to remove sweet clover plants before they seed.

Other seeds that need to be rogued by growers are dodder, wild docks and buckhorn. Although some of these seeds can be cleaned out they will lower the price of clover seed, Higgins warned.

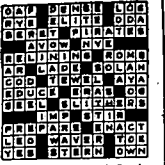

**Budget Deficit Looms Bigger Than Estimate**

WASHINGTON, June 16 (AP)—A budget deficit more than double the \$600,000,000 forecast by President Truman now appears in the making for fiscal 1949 when it ends June 30.

Some officials said the seasonal shift in income tax collections from quarterly payments which fell due yesterday will have to be impressive to hold the deficit as low as \$1,200,000,000 or even \$1,500,000,000.

With the government heading that deep into the red this year—after two consecutive years of surplus—there was some speculation over whether the President might take the occasion to renew his January request for a \$4,000,000,000 tax increase.

The budget outlook has turned worse since Mr. Truman asked the tax increase to (1) overcome a deficit he estimated at \$210,000,000 for the new fiscal year beginning July 1, (2) reconstitute staff estimates say this will be tripled in actual practice and (2) to permit a substantial reduction in the \$231,600,000,000 federal debt.
