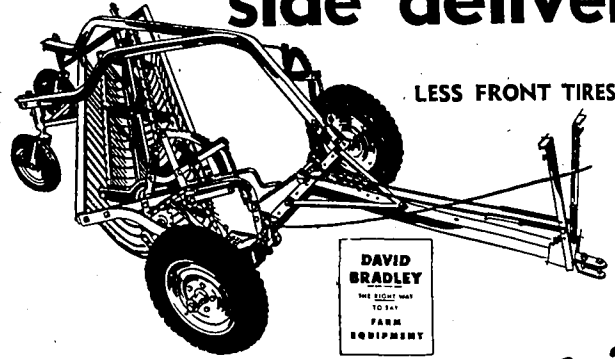

Monsignor Is Paid Honors In High Mass

Honoring the Rt. Rev. Msgr. J. P. O'Toole of St. Edward's parish, a silver jubilee celebration was held Thursday including a solemn pontifical high mass, a luncheon and an evening reception.

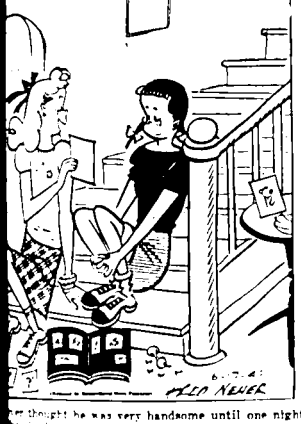

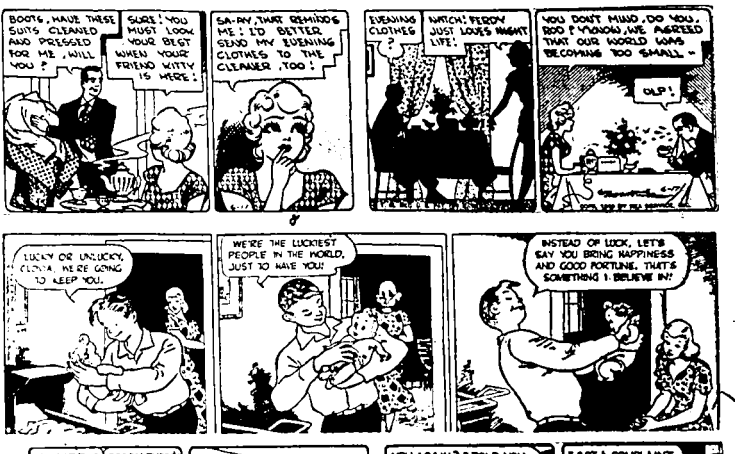
