Man Paroled for 6 Months After Charge Reduced

April Reports Show Dips in Idaho Births

April reports of the state department of public health show a decrease in the number of births in the state, although the total was greater than that reported for January and February.

Marriages increased and divorces decreased, although the number of divorces was still considerably greater than in January and February.

Total Idaho births were 1,220, with 870 deaths reported.

Divorces Lead

In three Magie Valley counties, Twin Falls, Blaine and Minidoka, the number of divorces exceeded the number of marriages.

Births in Magie Valley totaled 266, of which one was a stillbirth. By counties they were: Blaine 11, Camas 3, Cassia 4, Elmore 23, Gooding 16, Jerome 39, Lincoln 21, Minidoka 18, and Twin Falls 77. The stillbirth was reported in Jerome county.

Four infant deaths in Magie Valley included one each in Cassia, Gooding, Jerome and Minidoka counties. One death from premature birth was reported in Jerome county.

Figures by Counties

Marriages and divorces by counties in Magie Valley were: Blaine, 1 and 2; Camas, none; Cassia, 2 and 1; Elmore, 1 and 3; Gooding, 3 and none; Jerome, 6 and none; Lincoln, 2 and 1; Minidoka, 3 and 4; and Twin Falls, 15 and 24.

Of 58 deaths in Magie Valley in April, 21 were from heart disease and from cancer, 1 each from diabetes and nephritis, 1 from cerebral hemorrhage and 5 from accidents other than automobile. There were no deaths reported in Camas county and none from automobile accidents in Magie Valley.

In the state as a whole, heart disease was responsible for 33.2 per cent of the deaths.

WASHINGTON, June 18—Two aerial photographic units with a combined strength of 150 officers and men will be transferred in late June from the Alaskan air command to the Mountain Home air force base, it was announced today.

One unit is the 72nd strategic reconnaissance squadron, which has been photo-mapping drovite areas in the Arctic from its base at Lead air force base, Fairbanks, Alaska.

The other is the 7th photographic technical unit, which has been attached to the 7th bomber group during the present mission.

The 72nd, known as the 46th very long range reconnaissance squadron until a year ago, undertook its assignment in Alaska in the summer of 1946. It has mapped more than 200,000 square miles in its four-engine Boeing B-29 Superfortresses, modified for aerial photographic mission.

The squadron's responsibility was to photo-map the Alaskan area for the strategic location of defense units, explore for regularly-scheduled air routes and look for oil resources.
