obtaining an attorney and a warrant that prohibiting the sale of the suit against the state, but at the time of the arrest could be used against them. As a result, the destination of the truck could not be used as evidence.

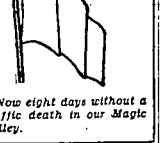

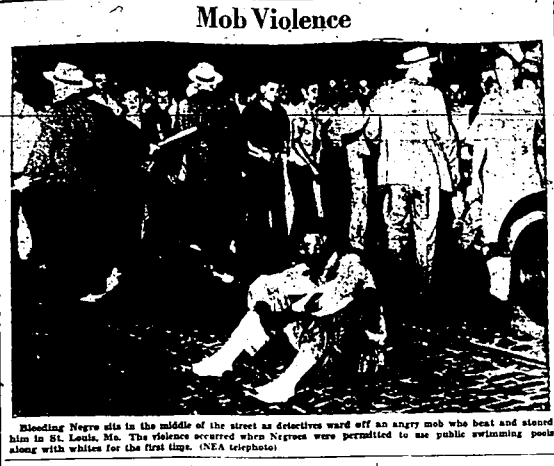

**Heroic Help Saves Boy in Rail Accident**

**PHILADELPHIA, June 24**—A father and two sons climbed beneath the wheels of a moving freight train Thursday night and applied first aid to a 12-year-old boy whose feet had been cut off by the train.

Police and physicians said the daring feat probably saved the boy's life.

The boy, Joseph Logiudis, was on a truck returning home with a group of picknickers. Suddenly the truck bounced heavily and pitched the boy under a passing string of slow moving cars.

Ghena Summas Aid brought Joseph Tomczak, 42, a longshoreman, and two sons, Raymond, 21, and Stephen, 24.

Leaving the cab of the truck, the Tomczaks found the 12-year-old boy under the moving cars 200 feet behind the truck.

With no hesitation, they climbed between the wheels beside the injured boy.

While the father held Joseph's head, his two sons applied tourniquets to the wounded boy's legs. They used their belts as tourniquets.

Engine halted.

Railroad employees signaled the engineer in the engine behind showing the cars. He was able to pull the freight to a halt just before his engine reached the group.

Physicians at Methodist hospital said the boy's condition is grave, but that the prompt application of the tourniquets had prevented undue loss of blood and had undoubtedly prevented immediate death.

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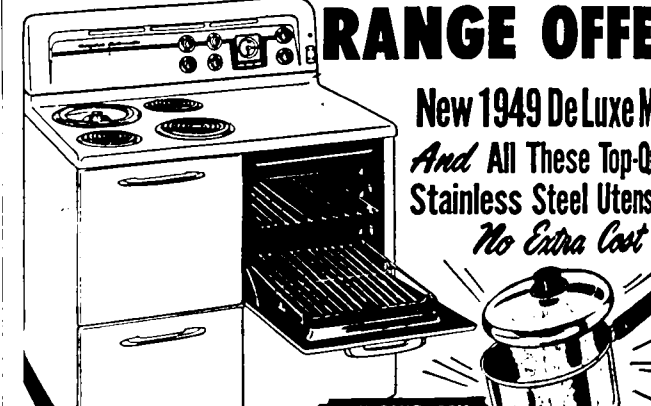

# Planes Used to Herd Idaho Swans

An airplane is fine for herding swan, the fish and game department concluded today after reviewing results of the first herding program in Idaho.

Marshall C. Edson, district conservation supervisor at Coeur d'Alene, reported 500 swan were flushed from polluted waters of the vicinity of Coeur d'Alene, and as many as 200 the previous year when the migrating birds remained in the area of pollution.

Edson recommended to the department that the plane drive be continued for at least two more years in an effort to determine whether harassment and moving action eventually will cause the swan to abandon the water where fatal disease is contracted.

Flights in a seaplane were made during March and April. The game department and the U. S. fish and wildlife service cooperated on the project.

As soon as swan arrived in the Harrison area and set down on the water that had previously caused serious losses the drive was launched. By swooping low over the lake, the plane forced the birds into the air. The plane then chased them for as much as 30 miles to make reasonably sure they did not return to the danger zone.

A ground crew with Edward Carter, U. S. game management agent, in charge, used boats and pistol flares to frighten the swan from the lake and get them in the air where they could be pushed by the plane.

Need for chasing the birds out of the Coeur d'Alene area developed because of losses caused by poisonous algae. This difficulty was first noted in 1933 or 1934. "A heavy flood occurred in the spring of 1933," Edson declared, "and it now appears that poisonous deposits that are being gathered in and along the lower river were forced out into the side lakes and sloughs. These solutions were sludges from numerous mines and mills operating in the area."

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# Move to Trim Funds Gaining Senate Power

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—Senate economy advocates today claimed 50 signatures on a petition urging consideration of a resolution that would direct President Truman to trim federal spending by 5 to 10 per cent.

Sen. John A. McClellan, D. Ark., leader of the petition, said 51 Democrats and 25 Republicans already have signed in favor of the resolution. This is well over half of the Senate's 100 members.

"I expect to have at least 60 names when it is presented to the leadership," McClellan said. "The petition calls on senate leaders to speed the budget-cutting resolution to the floor. However, it has no parliamentary status under senate rules."

Sen. Philip H. Hefner, R. Ind., came up with another proposal aimed at balancing the budget without a tax increase. He called the senate appropriations committee to look \$3,000,000,000 off the \$16,000,000,000 military budget by the house.
