### Western Mine Business Hit By Big Slump

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—The western metal mining industry is taking some heavy blows. Many mines are closing down, and others are curtailing output, and under the impact of tumbling prices. The full extent of what has happened is not yet clear. But falls is growing in contrast among mining state senators and congressmen doing something to relieve the situation.

**"Black March"**  
Take the case of copper, lead and zinc. Producers of these metals for 1938 all may put down March of 1938 in their books as "Black March." That was the month the positive market cracked for them. On March 26, copper was listed at 22 1/2 cents a pound, the bottom out, and on June 15 was selling at 16.50 cents.

The break in lead was equally bad. From 15.00 cents a pound on March 8, prices crumbled to 12 cents by May 23. Zinc followed suit, dropping from 18 cents a pound on March 22 to 9 cents by June 15.

**Compensated Limited**  
Industry figures talk about two months to reach the analysts of business. For that reason, the bureau has no complete figures yet on the overall effect of the metallic copper market. It listed these companies as having closed down or curtailed operations: Consolidated Copper Mines, underground working; Arizona; Copper Queen mine, Phoenix; Arizona; Pacific Bridge company; Colorado; Rio Argentine Mining company; Michigan; Idaho; Royal Mining company; Calumet and Hecla Mining company, mines only; California.

**Operations Trimmed**  
Curtailed operations: Idaho; Bunker Hill and Sullivan mining, five-day week; Nevada; Kennecott Copper corporation, 40 hours; Missouri; Peawick mine, one shift only with 40 workers; Louisiana; Montana; Adams Copper Mining company, 40-hour week; Representative M. ### Russia Needs Time to Rest On 2 Fronts

The grumbling which is going on in congress about the European rearmament program seems to be largely academic, and changes are not likely to follow the Atlantic pact through the legislative process at this session.

Senator Vandenberg and other sponsors of the pact feel the administration "wants to win" with regard to good legislative procedure, by trying the arms measure so early in the session.

But actually it was the questions and answers during the separate committee hearings on the pact which made the matters important. The fact that other questions were being asked at the time also has served to telescope action on the two issues into the final days of the session.

But Dean Acheson's return from the Paris conference, with a picture of dramatic events in Europe which must not be allowed down just when the Russians are being lulled by their own propaganda, has had its effect on congress.

Vandenberg, Connally and other opponents of the pact have been approved into the pact may let it ride through the session, but they still express doubts about the situation regarding the pact.

Proponents of the dual program point out that the dual program is in line with the administration plan to rearm the western allies.

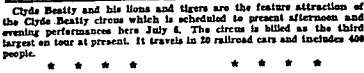
It is plain that Russia desires to turn her attention from the east to China and to her troubles among the European nations—and that continued western pressure will hamper her in that.

### 1,500 Priests Missing, Says Rome Report

VATICAN CITY, June 23 (AP)— Vatican sources have reported that more than 1,500 Catholic priests have been arrested or have disappeared in Soviet-dominated eastern Europe since the end of World War II.

They said an undetermined number of priests had been executed. The rest, they said, had been imprisoned in camps, or had just vanished.

The campaign against Czechoslovak Archbishop Josef Beran is only the latest chapter in a long series of anti-church persecutions being conducted in eastern Europe, Vatican sources said.

Stripped of authority  
They said the church had been stripped of most of its authority in Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Albania, Poland, Romania, Yugoslavia and the Baltic states.

The exact number of priests who have been deported, killed or killed in eastern Europe cannot be known under present conditions," he said. "But 1,500 would be a conservative figure based on actual reports received. We fear the figure may really be higher."

Poland—At least 300 priests in the Lublin diocese, Cardinal Mindzenty, have been imprisoned, and reports are incomplete.

With bright and gay chintz at the windows of their three rooms, the Hoopers, Harry and Anita, who have already been nicknamed "Squab" by some of her friends, are having fun and laughing at all their present inconveniences for better days are in store for them.

Harry was born and raised on a farm near The Dalles, Ore., and is located on the Columbia river in the fruit and wheat country of Oregon. He had a hard time of it during the war. As a radioman in the navy on the USS Pope, which was sunk near Hawaii or Java sea, he was taken prisoner of the Japanese, after spending six months in that camp. He was released from that camp in 1945. He was taken to the navy hospital at Corvallis, Ore., and then to WAVE, Astoria, where he later married.
