Suit Is Filed to Break 'Up duPont Empire'

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Attorney-General Tom Clark today filed suit to break up the duPont family empire. The attorney general announced that the action, under the Sherman and Clayton anti-trust laws, was filed this morning in the U. S. district court at Chicago. Among the major demands of the civil suit are a divestment of the E. I. du Pont de Nemours company, Wilmington, Del., from General Motors corporation, Detroit. It also asks that the du Pont family be required to release its holdings, described as controlling, in the United States Rubber company, New York. Clark asserted: "This case is directed to the breaking up of the largest single concentration of industrial power in the United States."

FAIRFIELD, June 30.—Experimenters today used smudging to keep temperatures from dropping below the freezing point. The experimenters used a mixture of oil and kerosene to create a smudge that would stay in the air and prevent the temperature from falling further. Two T. F. Men Die Instantly in Plane Crash at Rogerson

Woodson Crand, Twin Falls county coroner, said there would be no inquest. The mishap occurred one-fourth of a mile north and 200 yards east of the main street in Rogerson and 500 yards west of the Andrew Harrell residence. Harrell told Sheriff Jesse E. Carlton the plane was flying extremely low around his house.

RAY OF HOPE FOR PARIS

The four-power accord reached at Paris resembles the first shaky steps of the hospital patient arising from a long siege in bed. No one can be sure whether he'll soon be walking more readily or whether he'll flop walking more readily or whether he'll flop walking more readily.

In other words, it is impossible to put down at this time the real value of the agreements. They hinge on the good faith of the Russians. They can mean a firm stride toward peace, or nothing.

As the present tentative advance, we plainly owe much to Russia's feud with Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia. A major barrier to agreement was removed when the Russian union withdrew its claims of Tito's territorial claims in that Austria.

Russia also showed a somewhat more cooperative spirit in the knotty matter of German assets in Austria. The Kremlin yielded its former sweeping demand in this field and agreed to accept \$100,000,000 from Austria in settlement of its claims.

Beyond this, however, the western powers stipulated that the final settlement would give Russia all the assets of the Danube River Shipping Company in Austria. Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria, and substantial extracurricular and unexpecting rights in oil fields in eastern Austria.

The assets problem, furthermore, is still left open. And last-minute Russian maneuvering at Paris raised the question of whether Moscow would agree to fasten a straitjacket on Austria's economy.

WORLD AFFAIRS

IMPRESSIVE—The military displays and pageantry at Benning, Ky. and on the PDR were spectacularly impressive and comforting. It was that they revealed the military and economic problems and possibilities from the top men in those fields. It can testify that they "take their hat down," and to mix the metaphorical.

At all events, the military displays were treated to a detailed briefing of the group field to Port Benning, Ga., for inspection of the school of fire there. Next they went to Eglin field, along with the "Jimmies" military training in the air proving ground, and a fascinating place. Last stop was at the Norfolk base where they took off for a Franklin D. Roosevelt.

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FRENCHMEN—With the exception of the newspaper-magazine-radio section, few had ever met before. But within two days they were first-nameing each other and shaking hands and giving the other field managers gave their critics a tough time out of their animosity and mood. There never was heard a discouraging or cranky word on the whole trip.

And the industrialists, for instance had met a few labor leader until they ran into Bob Byron, general president of the River Metal Workers' International association. But after they heard him discuss labor problems on a brass tacks basis and listened to his delightful after-dinner stories, some heads of corporations committed.

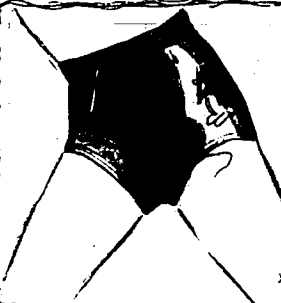

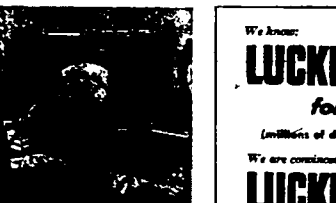

Farmers' Cash Returns Drop, Survey Shows

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Farm prices declined markedly in the first half of the year, and the survey shows that farmers' cash returns are down 14 percent from the first half of 1937.

Prices paid by farmers as of May 31, 1938, were 85.2 percent of the 1937 level, according to a survey by the U. S. department of agriculture.

The decline was due to a number of factors, including a drop in the price of wheat, which fell 12 percent from the first half of 1937, and a drop in the price of corn, which fell 10 percent.

The scientists, armed with testing balloons carrying detectors, will leave from the west coast on a ship made available through the cooperation of the navy and the office of naval research.

Prices Paid by Farmers in 1938

A year ago farm prices averaged 85.2 percent of the 1937 level. The mid-June farm price level was 85.2 percent of the 1937 level. This compares with 85.2 percent in mid-May, 85 percent in January, 1938, and a record of 90.5 percent in January, 1937.

Prices paid by farmers in mid-June were 26 percent higher than in mid-June of 1937, a year ago, which was the highest on record.

The drop in price was rather general. Farm prices were higher in wheat, the main exception, where it was 14 percent of the 1937 level, and down 90 cents a bushel, and chickens were off about 2 cents a pound.

West Europe Navies Stage Mock Battles

Air Forces Affairs Analyst
More than 100 warships—British, French, Dutch and Belgian—are assembling in Biscaya bay, on England's west coast, for naval exercises. These operations are purely defensive; aimed at apprehensions for any quarter. The international aspect of this fleet in peacetime maneuvers probably is unique. Mentoring, British, American and Dutch warships are waging over Britain a mock war which is designated as "operation wolf." Its purpose is to test John Bull's defenses against an attack with atom bombers—from any quarter. Here again the international aspect is unique.

First A-Bomb Defense
This is Britain's first major test against atom bombs. On the second day of the operation London (which suffered no terrorism from bombing during the late war) was "saved" by the defensive air fleet, though several midland and coastal cities suffered "extensive damage." The official releases withheld comment on this, but the British defensive forces were jubilant. These two operations are being carried out without flare of trumpet, although they comprise a historical event. There is no comment from the government concerned as to the meaning. The event is left to speak for itself, and broadly it does. However, we shouldn't dismiss it lightly.

HAZELTON, June 30 (AP)—Possibility of an embargo against certain live chicks to halt the spread of Newcastle disease is under discussion, the University of Idaho extension service reported today. The problem will be brought before the annual convention of the Idaho Poultry Improvement association and the Idaho Poultry Council in August, the service reported. Reid Merrill, extension poultryman for the university, said there have been several cases of Newcastle disease appearing in chicks shortly after arrival in Idaho from other states. He said there had been no case of the disease reported from Idaho hatcheries. The disease, he said, has appeared in every area of the state. Merrill and Dr. A. F. Schneider, state veterinarian, urged purchase of chicks locally to avoid shipping of disease.

In the Jerome area, beet thinning and berry remaining to be thinned in Minidoka and Cassia counties, while Twin Falls county reported the completion of beet thinning and a current surplus of all types of labor. In the Jerome area, beet thinning and hay stacking is completed and bean hoeing has started, but there is still a surplus of workers. 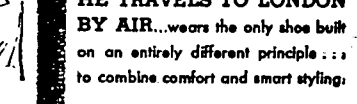

BERLIN, June 30 (AP)—The Russian reversal of traffic stands today and permitted free travel between Berlin and the western zone.

The sudden about-face was just as unaccountable as the Russian highway activities conducted over the past two days.

German highway police reported that at late afternoon hour that all trucks, leaving or entering Berlin were conducting through the Soviet checkpoint without trouble.

Cargoes belated earlier in the day 30 heavily-laden trucks, mostly food carriers from Frankfurt, were stopped, their papers changed and their cargo seized. They were being released later, a few at a time.

Allied sources said the recent incidents were caused by an agreement between two Soviet checkpoints. The agreement was ironed out, at least temporarily, by higher Russian officials.

The Russians claimed that the trucks required a Soviet signature underneath the Soviet stamp which was put on their travel orders when they crossed into the Soviet zone at Helmsdorf.

West Europe Trade Easing Seen in Pact

PARIS, June 30 (AP)—An agreement on liberalization of trade between western European nations appeared today on the basis of compromising proposals to reconcile opposing British and American views.

The net result of the agreement probably would be small in terms of actual trade, but the principle of more competition, favored by the U. S., would be gained.

Officials attending the meeting of the organization for European economic cooperation (OEEC) were spurred by a proposal yesterday of Paul-Henri Spaak of Belgium, president of OEEC, for discussion by Britain's Sir Stafford Cripps.

The organization's seven-member consultative committee met today with W. Averell Harriman, U. S. ambassador-at-large for the Marshall plan, to consider Spaak's proposal.

Both Are Pleased At the conclusion of the session, Sir Stafford said: "Everything is going nicely." Harriman told newsmen: "I am always optimistic."

The points for compromise are known to be the same which Sir Stafford refused to accept last week at a four-power meeting in Brussels. His apparent acceptance yesterday led to the hope that he would be more lenient to some degree.

Actually Sir Stafford has always indicated that he was not opposed to the principle of multilateral trade. The United States has been insisting on the introduction of competitive European trade.

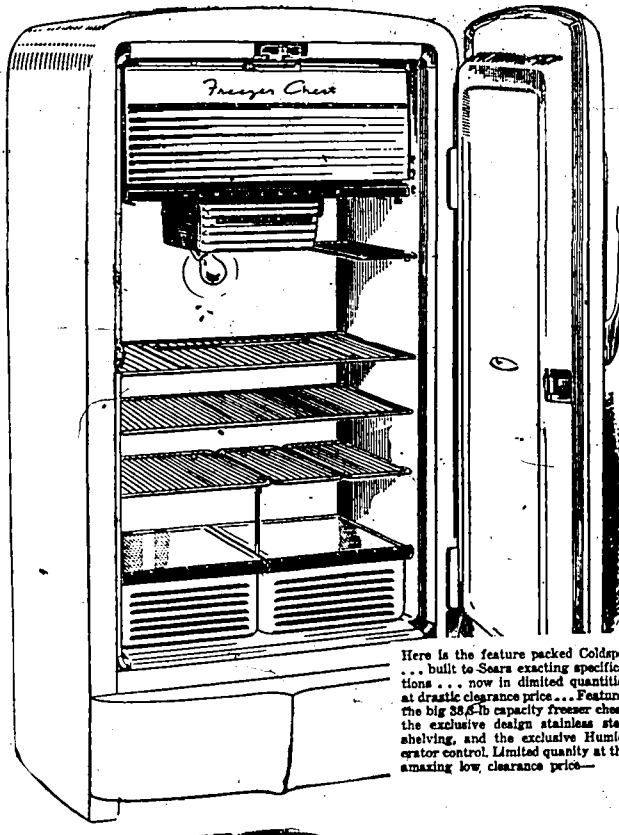

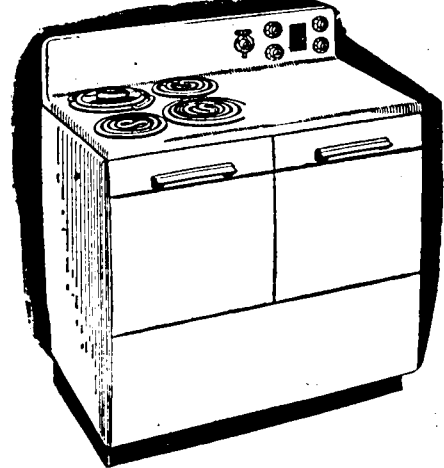

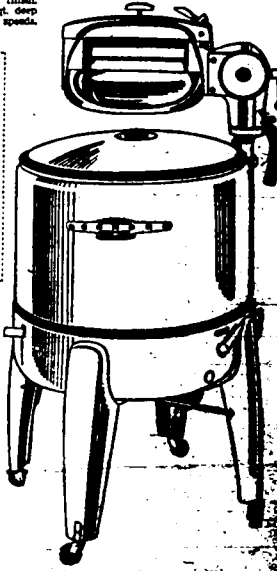

MOOSEW, June 30 (UP)—Should Junior drive a car when he goes to college?

President J. E. Buchanan of the University of Idaho says that "only hazards to pocketbooks, pocket-trains and the pursuit of knowledge."

Buchanan wants Mom and Pop to know that primarily life shouldn't be as expensive as Junior might lead them to believe.

Camper convertibles and heavy clothes don't fit in with the university's ideas of educating more students at lower cost.

Must Show Need

That's why the academic council ruled students must show they need cars to get permits to drive them on the campus. Buchanan said about one-third of Idaho students had cars last year. The total was \$100 and he estimated only about 100 of them were necessary.

"At some institutions of higher learning," Buchanan said, "a car may be the most feasible method of transportation. At the University of Idaho, two legs serve nicely."

That's because Idaho is a small, compact college city. Students probably can go everywhere. Mom and Pop would want them to go without a car.

Save Gas for Clothes

"The same thing goes for clothing," Buchanan said, "but clothes are not designed to be big."

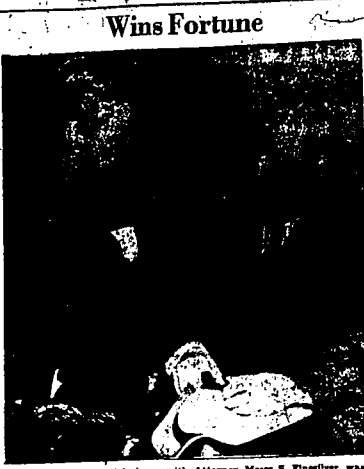

Henry Shocked at Red Tint Of Gaiety in Satellite Areas

Reading John Gunther's latest book, "Behind the Iron Curtain," it was hard for me to realize that the countries now writhing in the coils of communism were the ones which had such a gay and happy time a few years ago.

Gunther's description of the Hungarians in Budapest, that magnificent hotel on the Danube, as it is today, gutted by bombs, bullet holes and fire, was a real wringer at the heart. There we had a lovely room, with a balcony that hung almost over the Danube, and there was a fine night of night or day when the activity on the river wasn't a whacking good show. We were fortunate enough to be there during St. Stephen's week festival when people from every province in Hungary, wearing the costumes of their section, arrived in Budapest to celebrate the birthday of their patron saint and have a good Hungarian look for themselves. The whole city looked like backstage of a vast musical comedy, and all Hungarians seemed to know, was that the government, in an effort to popularize the wines of its country, practically ran open house in the state wine shops which could be found every few blocks. You were perfectly welcome to walk in and taste every kind of wine for sale.

I remember how Jean, dining at a sidewalk cafe, almost caused a riot by ordering cantaloupe and vanilla ice cream, and then fixing herself cantaloupe a la mode. The waiter went screaming for the headwaiter to come see the crazy American woman, other diners fled about 200 feet, and scores of passerby came in from the street to see this unbelievable culinary concoction.

Few comedians ever caused the laughter that Jean did when she actually ate that cantaloupe. The happy folk are wearing an iron yoke. It must chafe them clear down to their hearts.

Gunther's description of the tragedy of Czechoslovakia turns my memory back to Prague. The Czechs at that time were even more fiercely patriotic than Americans. If that is possible, and so very proud of their new republic.

We had a hotel room next to a group of opera singers from Italy. They pushed a piano out on a balcony and started entertaining the populace of Prague. It wasn't long before half the guests in the hotel were in the singers' rooms, joining in the singing as if they too had sung at La Scala. This went on every night, followed by a round of the restaurants and night clubs. I was often asked to stop singing.

It was in Prague that we thought we had made a wonderful find in the way of a restaurant. We just happened to turn into it one night and found the food to be not only out of the world, but out of the

Exclaims Boyle in His Prairie

NEW YORK, June 30 (AP)—Oh, I tell you New York is a wonderful town!

It must be fine or there wouldn't be so many people crowded here to get to enjoy it.

It's really a terrible place to visit or die in, but a grand town to live in.

For here the poor man has courage, and lights for his rights. It's as good as a million-airs any day, and he'll stay up all night to tell you why. Yes, rich or poor, you're just another number.

There's one thing sure: You can never be Mr. Number One. Because nobody is big enough to be really important on this 34 island. You have to belong to it—it can never belong to you. This is a man's town, and it's out for him. It has outgrown everybody who ever lived in it—and it's still growing.

And the people who live in it are growing, too. The fat-voiced tourists

come here and look around and shake their heads and leave again, saying, "After all, New York City isn't America."

But New York City is America. Because here people are really working toward the kind of democracy that most of the country reads about in high school civics books.

There are only a few cities in the world that are really cities—London, for instance. Paris, for instance. Athens for blue skies. Cairo for gold and intrigue. Naples for a merry heart and a dirty face. Berlin the tomb and womb and snarl of war. Moscow for mockery of human rights, and Washington, where every man who has been elected twice can hope for a marble monument.

And, of course, there are smaller cities with a breath of mind—say Philadelphia, say St. Louis, say Baltimore, say New Orleans, say San Francisco, the city with the singing name, or Boston, the only place I know where nobody bothers against \$2 bills. They are all old cities, each marked by an antique bigotry or prejudice of its own and stamped by an individual careless freedom, top, as all old cities are.

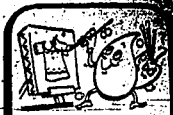
Wrap them all together and you'll almost have New York—but not quite.

For there is nothing as tremendous as this tremendous village, America's long dream pushed into a few square miles of streets and grove, where people more like moles underground and hope in terms of power.

Never a day dawns here but my spirit feels taller on the way to work from seeing the Empire State building shoulder the morning mist, comforting as a fairy tale in an hour of fear and never an evening sun sinks down without my spirit weary.

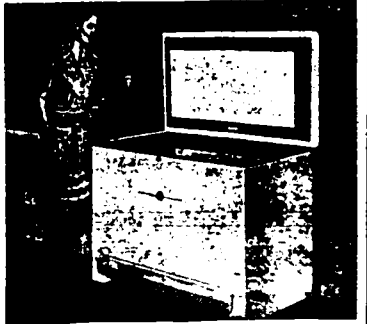

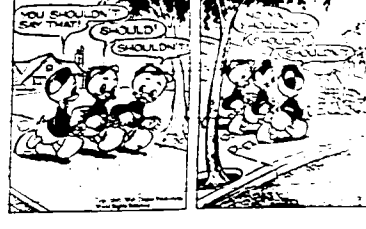

Miller Wants Work Started In Four States

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Sen. Bert H. Miller, D. Ida., has introduced a bill to permit the reclamation bureau to start work on the share of Columbia river projects under the treaty-army engineer comprehensive development plan.

This plan has been endorsed widely by opponents of the proposed Columbia valley administration as a OVA substitute.

Miller's measure would authorize the secretary of interior to carry out the reclamation bureau recommendations made in the May 1948 comprehensive plan for the Columbia river.

The bill specified some of the reclamation projects included in that overall plan. Those named were the Mountain Home, Cambridge Bench, Council and Mann creek—all in Idaho—and Hells canyon, Idaho and Oregon Bitterroot valley, Crooked river, Ore., Bully creek extension of the Vale project, Ore., Canby, Ore., west side of The Dalles, Ore., upper Bull valley, Wyo., and Coulee dam.

Miller's bill said the reclamation bureau should carry out its work with due regard for its agreement with the engineers as to the division of project work between the two agencies.

His measure was referred to the interior committee. The Columbia valley administration bill is pending before the senate public works committee.
