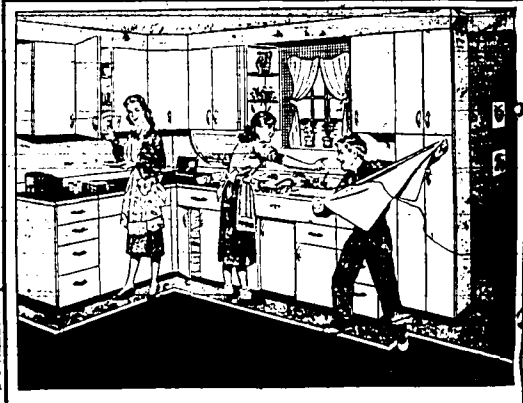

Market Easy After Tumble At Mid-Year

NEW YORK, July 7 (AP)—The stock market was up a point in the first half of 1949 and is expected to be up a point at the mid-year mark, the market is today looking up the pieces all the way out of the hole.

At the mid-year mark, there is little or no public support behind the recovery attempt, though, and the market is expected to be at least a point down at the end of the year.

Analysts generally expect the market to be up a point at the end of the year, but they are not sure of the market's adjustment.

Period of Uncertainty
From declined personal income figures, the unemployment figures were steadily increased, production in virtually every industry was cut.

The stock market celebrated this year and again by quiet bidding along one of the narrowest price ranges on record in mid-July at the very start of a one-month drop. The price level was almost exactly where it was on Dec. 15.

In mid-May prices started to slide. The price level broke through the 100-point mark in the first week of the month. The market was down for the first time in late February.

Chart on June 11
On June 11 the downward rush reached a climax. Prices plunged to a level not seen since the early 1930s, since January, 1943.

In the one-month period the market was down 100 points. The New York exchange was reduced by more than 100 points since June 11.

During the period since June 11, the market has wearily tried to come back and has a severe case of indecision in this interest, has managed to recoup about one-third of its loss.

Opinion Divided
Today market analysts are divided over prospects for the summer. The market is expected to be up a point at the end of the year. The other side of the same coin is that the market will drop through the 100-point level.

An increasing angle to the market's action is the increasing activity in behavior of various groups. Gold stocks, for instance, remained popular. Utility stocks, on the other hand, did fair. Transport, however, was down and total market value.

Does Below Par
On the lowland, a distinctly lower performance was turned out by railroad stocks and steel shares, although, not parking and automobile shares.

Bureau, City Power Plans Progressing

BURLEY, July 2.—As part of a long-range improvement program being undertaken by Burley, electric department in conjunction with improvements being made by the bureau of reclamation for power distribution here, work has been progressing in putting primary electric lines underground in the business district.

The main work of installation is in the alley behind the Burley-Anderson district office, where the bureau of reclamation is constructing a new overhead type steel substation. Work on the substation started last year, and the new installation will more than double the capacity of the present station. Plans of the increase to industrial and domestic use of electricity, the new substation was necessary, according to the bureau.

The new underground installation will eliminate the mass of overhead wires in the business district and greatly facilitate the distribution of electricity. Workers have been digging trenches for pipes for high voltage lines, as well as excavating for the large junction vaults through which the regulators will be installed.

The secondary electric lines through the residential area will not be affected by the change. When the work began on the new substation early last year, bureau of reclamation officials said the new station was symbolic of the whole project, where there is a great increase in the demand for more electricity. With the use of more electrical machinery and appliances in homes and on farms, the bureau has had to step up the electrical capacity to meet the need.

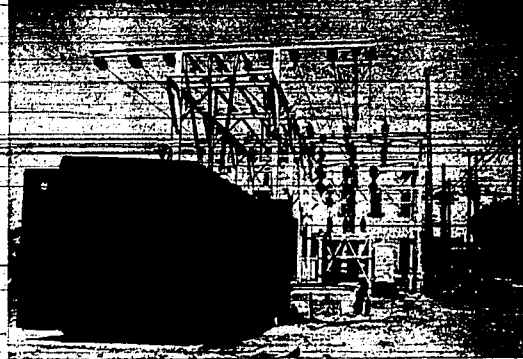
All 23 sub-stations on the project have been renovated during recent months to meet the need. The new Burley station ultimately will be able to distribute 9,000 kilowatts of power. New installations are also being made at Paul and Rupert.
