Byrnes Again Raps Welfare State System

COLUMBIA, R. C., July 6 (AP)—Former Secretary of State James F. Byrnes has reiterated his stand against a "welfare state" and called for a strong active military establishment.

"We do not want the federal government redistributing our lives from the cradle to the grave," he said. "The socialistic concepts of the South Carolina American Legion. He said the Soviet union has no intention of backing down in Germany in its cold war expansion program and predicted that the Soviet would follow a policy of disarmament and militarization in their sector of the occupied nations. He declared the federal government is not backing down in Germany and social agencies from the states in which it could be put to a better advantage by remaining in the individual state. He referred to a recent address at Washington and Lee university in which he had expressed similar views. He said, "I was interrupted for some 20 minutes by a single out-of-the-individual party. Few Pledges Are Fulfilled By Congress

WASHINGTON, July 8 (AP)—Congress failed the household budget today with few of the Democratic party's campaign pledges fulfilled before this session of the house and senate are convened.

The house will sit in the new office building, Berlin, on the new house and senate chambers, and the new senate chamber, which will be used for the first time in the second session of the 76th congress in January.

Those meeting out Congress now has before the time will be to make good on the program proposed to the voters by President Truman and his cabinet.

Adjournment now expected in early August, although congressional negotiations in 1943 sought to impose on congress responsibility to do its chores by July 1.

The administration took its first step in the last week when it refused to repeal or even substantially to change the Civil Control Administration, which was set to expire on July 1, and to allow it to continue until the end of the 1950 general election.

Truman's victory would have had a far-reaching effect on the program through congress. But with the 76th Congress, a tremendous \$1,000,000,000 deficit for the fiscal year, along with bad economic news from Great Britain which is the main reason for the economic situation in Europe.

Truman's victory is a report on economic policy for the first six months of his term. It will be followed shortly by the British government's report on the economic situation in Europe.

The report will indicate how the government is handling the war and the economy.

\$298 in Damages Sought in Court

Federal Housing Project May Get Early 1950 Start

WASHINGTON, July 8 (AP)—The administration hopes to start work on about 50,000 public housing units in the first year under the new housing bill.

This was announced today at the White House by Housing Administrator Raymond Poley, after a call to President Truman.

The housing legislation, now in the Senate, would provide for \$100,000,000 in public housing units in six years.

Poley said he was able to assure the President that government agencies are "quite well set up" to get into operation without delay.

He said a request for the necessary appropriations for his fiscal year's operation will be made to congress as soon as the bill has been signed.

Chiang Seeks U. S. Help in China's Battle

NEW YORK, July 8 (AP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek said today he will lead nationalist China's struggle against the communists and asked the United States to help if it wishes to avert another world war.

Chiang broke his long silence in an interview with *Credex* news agency in Chungking, the wartime capital, and another American reporter at Taipei, Formosa.

The 62-year-old Chiang, who has been absent as president of nationalist China last January since the way for the government to make its futile attempt to negotiate a settlement with the communists. He still is director-general of the Kuomintang (government party).

He told the two American newsmen:

1. Although he may never resume political office, he cannot give up the "revolutionary leadership" of China he inherited from Dr. Sun Yat-sen.
2. "If Communism is not checked in China, it will spread over the whole of Asia. Should that occur, another world war would be inevitable."
3. "The first step, it seems to me, is for the United States to react to the policy of giving moral support to the Chinese government in its fight against communism."
4. "It is impossible for anyone to reach a settlement with the communists."
5. "Any suggestion that the Chinese communists might break with Moscow is insidious propaganda, designed to confuse."
6. "Russia has not observed her treaty obligations" and is bent on world domination.
7. "The erroneous impression that the present situation in China is beyond repair has been created by communist propaganda in dissembling defeatism."

2 Officers Hurt, Girl Shot When Riot Hits Resort

NEW YORK, July 8 (AP)—Two policemen were hurt, a girl was shot and a riot that burst out after a youth pulled out his shirt and stung around a parade route last night broke down the way up.

The two officers said they were knocked to the ground and beaten when they tried to arrest James C. Johnson, 19, for wearing no shirt on the steps of the Roosevelt Hotel in Queens.

A crowd of some 500 persons milled around during the incident and a general riot broke out when the riot squad headquarters.

As the crowd closed in on the officers drew his gun and fired a warning shot.

The bullet struck Despena Metropoulos, 21, who was watching the disturbance from a second floor hotel room window. She was taken to a hospital with a wound in the left side of her face.

Six youths, all from 18 to 20, were booked on charges of felonious assault in the case.

British Critics

Assail USAF Claim on B-36

WASHINGTON, July 8.—British critics have jumped into the breach of the B-36 bomber that U. S. air force claims for the super-bomber are cloudy if not downright deceptive.

The House aviation committee today announced that it has ordered an investigation to begin soon.

In an article now being circulated widely here, a busy author who signs himself "Pavlovsky" says that the air force is so far gone on the 10-engine bomber that it lacks "the nerve to tell the truth." This is so, he says, in spite of the fact that the B-36 "is at least a doubtful baby for the cradle of an atomic age as Pavlovsky is sure royal air force jet fighters could demonstrate.

Navy is Pleased

The British critic appeared first in "Flight and Aircraft" magazine, an official organ of the highly respected and influential although unofficial flying club. It is very curious that the challenge the B-36 strategic bombing claims are studying the Pavlovsky article with interest.

The air force claims that the B-36 super-bomber will be able to drop a five-ton bomb about halfway and stay above 60,000 feet for an adequate portion of the mission. It believes interception by enemy fighters at this altitude will be extremely difficult although not impossible.

Prevents Landing

Pavlovsky says that it isn't so. He adds that the B-36 loaded for combat would not get at the target 8,000 miles distant from its base. He writes on known aircraft carriers. Anyway, he says, the air force is mistaken if it thinks jet fighters can't intercept the B-36. He says the British Vampires have a service ceiling of 40,000 feet. It is hard to believe Russia lacks similar craft.

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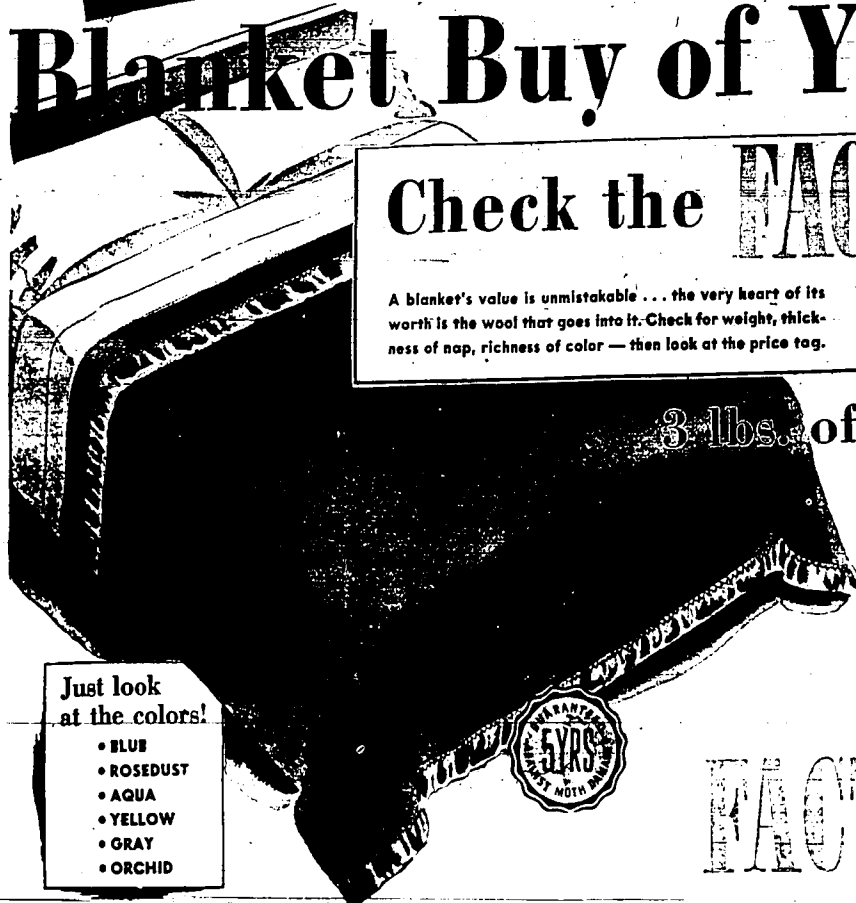

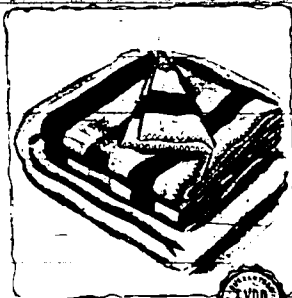

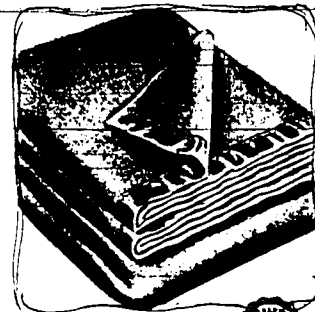
