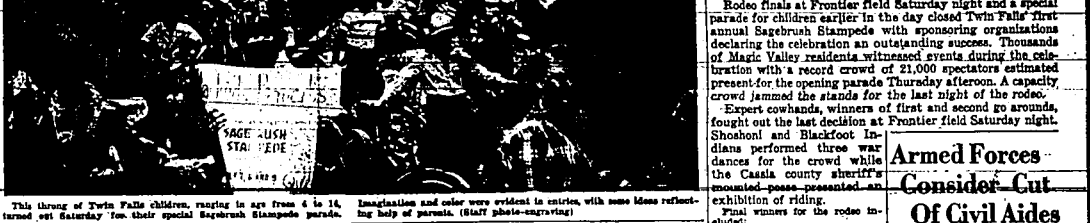

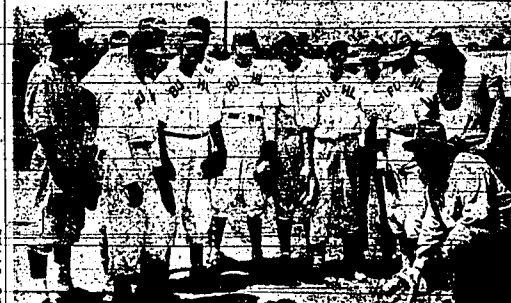

Sportsmen's Leader Asks Silver Creek Be Left Open to Fishing

CAREY, July 9.—A recommendation to leave Silver creek open to fishing through the summer was made here by R. Admonson Carey, president of the Fourth District Associated Sportsmen's club. The recommendation was made after a fish biologist for the fish and game department inspected the stream. Several sportsmen's clubs in Magic Valley have proposed the stream be closed by an emergency order because of the lack of protective moss, good size fish and water conditions. The groups claim fish are an easy prey for anglers because of the conditions.

Sportsmen argued the point at a meeting of association directors July 29 in Jerome. J. Admonson said Forest Hawks, the biologist, completed a survey of the stream this week and reported the following facts: Silver flow is above normal for the time of year. Fish population has been hurt some to extremely heavy fishing on the stream on its opening July 22. Because of present conditions it is felt it would do more harm to close the stream than to leave it open, because of the extremely heavy fishing it would receive next year, if closed all this season.

Recommendations to the state game commission will be to leave Silver creek open, with a closing date of one month earlier this fall and with a fall socking of the stream in an attempt to bring fish creek fishing back to normal. J. Kelly Ezelle Arrato has won the Britton stakes four times since 1941.

Canning Unit For Gooding Is Remodeled

GOODING, July 9.—Work is being pushed this week on the remodeling of the Gooding canning kitchen. An addition of 20 feet in size has been built on the west end of the old building, which will be used for an office and also for storage.

The concrete floors and drains for the east end addition, which will be about the same size as the kitchen, and covers are busy this week putting up the building. According to the plans, this new kitchen will be used principally to handle the returns and clean letters for the old building for a food preparation room away from the heat of the kitchen.

It is planned to house the boiler in a shed at the rear of the plant and cover it with asbestos. A boiler also will be installed.

After inspecting the plans for addition, the state canning supervisor reported the work will result in more efficiency in the production of cans for the state, and should save up to 50 percent on the coal bill. The vacant lots adjoining the plant have been graded, and will be graveled lightly for use as parking space for delivery cars. All efforts are being made to have the kitchen open by the middle of July.

Last season the kitchen was so crowded that food had to be prepared on improvised tables outside the building, and also in the rear of pick-up and auto trucks.

Mrs. LeVina Scanlon, who served as supervisor last year, will be in charge of the kitchen again this year. The remodeling is being directed by William Kyle and Mrs. Scanlon.

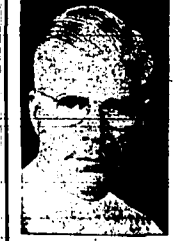

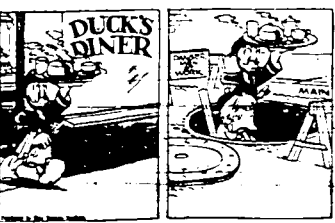

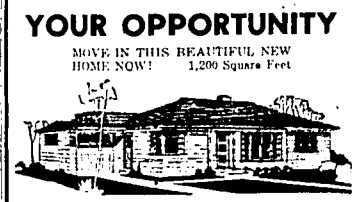

 Qualified voters must be present for more than 30 days of the school district in which they vote, and have property taxable on the roll of taxes in Twin Falls county, included within the school district. Husband or wife of such taxpayer are eligible.

The proposed bond issue would provide \$60,000 to construct buildings for Tugues vocational agricultural buildings in Burley and Malia; \$120,000 for heating and lighting facilities improvement in Oakley, Almon, Declo, Almo, Elba, Malia and Burley; \$10,000 for three new school buses to eliminate all double runs in the county and improve transportation in Declo, Almo, Almon, Elba, Oakley, and Malia; \$25,000 for bus department improvements in Burley, Malia, and Oakley high schools; \$5,000 for improvement of lighting in Oakley high school; \$3,200 for roof repairs for Malia, Declo, Oakley and Burley; \$500 for a new water supply line at Almon high school; and \$20,000 for new music departments at Burley and Oakley.

School officials say the bond, together with the present debt of \$177,000, can be paid in 10 years on a four mill levy. The major part of the county has for years been on a five mill levy for school purposes. This makes it unnecessary to increase taxes in order to supply these badly needed improvements, they say.

Chief of the new agricultural building, since Smith-Hughes support will be withdrawn from Burley if required improvements are not met. All high schools in the county have received warnings from the state board on various parts of school curriculum or facilities, and school authorities are being hard toward passage of the bond issue on July 18.

Rite Is Scheduled For War Fatality



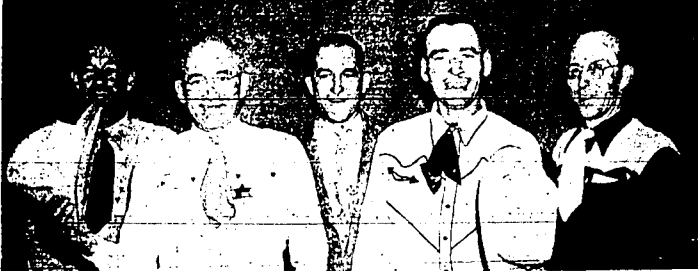
