Beckstead said one of the four told him the men were those who escaped from the Cassia county jail, the Associated Press reported.

Mailed Revealed

The sheriff said this man, who he did not identify, said he had been in the car, climbed into an elevator shaft, and made their way out of the jail.

Shortly after the escape the Frank Motor company, just east of town, was burglarized. A 1941 sedan taken was worth \$100 in cash and \$200 in checks. Officers said the man arrested in the stolen car, which was recovered undamaged. Some of the missing cash was recovered.

Charges Listed

The four men and the charges on which they were being held, are: James Cook, 22, burglary and grand larceny; Edward J. Wainwright, 21, burglary; Charles Tarrant, 22, held for federal officers; and Augustus James Day, 23, alleged pay counter arrested last week by the FBI.

Tarrant originally was arrested in the 1944 school year.

BOISE, July 12—The early potato crop is coming in this week in southwestern Idaho and eastern Oregon, Worden Davis, Parma, manager of the Idaho-Oregon Shippers Association, reported today.

Davis said that the crop, which will be harvested between mid-August and mid-September, will probably total about 800,000 carloads of spuds. This he said compares with the 1,000,000 shipped last year.

Davis said there were reports of a 10 per cent increase in potato acreage, most of it in the new areas and most of it in the white and russet varieties. He said the crop will be harvested and the white russet potatoes will follow in about two weeks.

Russet varieties will start from this area in about mid-August, Davis said.

Davis also announced completion of shipment of green peas from this area. About 160 carloads were shipped, he said, and good prices prevailed for the product.

BURBANK, Calif., July 12—From an AP and UP reports. Two men fought a bloody battle aboard a loaded passenger airliner today just before it crashed in the mountains. Sheriff J. BOMBAY, India, July 12—A Royal Dutch Airlines Constellation carrying 14 American newsmen and 31 other persons crashed on a rocky hilltop 20 miles north of Bombay, today. All aboard were killed.

The plane crashed in a driving rainstorm while approaching the Santa Cruz airfield, 10 miles north of Bombay. It hit a hill near Ghatkopar, on the opposite side of the 80-mile-long island from Santa Cruz.

Search parties reported the wreckage was strewn over a two-mile area. Some 200 bodies were found and about 200 were partly charred.

Rat Problem Is Studied by Health Agent

BOISE, July 12 (AP)—Southwestern Idaho is free of rats—except for Boise.

That's what a survey of rodent problems has revealed.

The statewide survey is being conducted by Fred Hartman, entomologist with the U. S. public health service. He's completed a check of southwestern Idaho and is in the Twin Falls area this week. He will complete southern Idaho by August 1 and then study northern Idaho rat problems.

Clare Taville Rate

H. C. Clare, public health engineer, said Hartman remarked that several southwestern Idaho cities are infested by dumping garbage and trash too close to town and not taking steps to control rats.

A detailed report on southwest Idaho and Hartman's recommendations have not been received yet, Clare added.

Clare said the state public health department knew there were rats north of the Salmon river, in Boise and in the extreme southeastern tip of the state.

DIMAGGIO AN EXAMPLE
 Just what you're ready to do looking for a big glory without a communit hind somewhere in the pile of type along comes Joe DiMaggio.

Joe proceeds to carve himself an unforgettable name in 1943 history, and there's not a thing in the world that Stalin or Viskinsky or any of their comrades can do about it.

Of course, making a splash is nothing new to Jo-Joe. He's been in the base since he was a kid. He gets a special shout for the issue a little. He gets a special shout for the issue a little.

It's a crucial spot for DiMag. He's out of condition from inaction, and hasn't seen any fancy pitching for months. And here he is, facing a flashy Red Sox pitcher.

He's nervous, his hand is a ringing single and romps over the plate on a team-mate's homer. Next time up he finds a mate on base ahead of him. Now he aims a drive over the left field wall to count two runs and gives the Yanks' margin in a 4 to 1 victory.

The fans and sportswriters cheer the hero's comeback showing. But it isn't enough for Joe to want things a bit more definite. He's got to lead early and seem sure to win. A confident Boston hurler walks a couple of Yanks in the fifth, and up comes DiMaggio again. He plants a big smash over the left field wall for his second homer of the series and his team is back in the game.

Soon after that the Yanks make it a 7-7 tie and Joe has another turn. Result: a screaming drive that clears a 40-foot-high wall and screen and wins the game for New York.

Like the others, the third game is close. Leading 3 to 2 in the seventh inning, the Yanks get two men aboard the bases. Boog Powell, who is hitting tonight, times against Mel Parnell, Boston ace.

With a count of three balls and two strikes, DiMag crashes a terrific liner to left that smacks an electric light tower for a three-run homer to tie the score. The Yankees triumph. That's the story. In three games, Joe hits four home runs, all decisive. He collects five hits altogether and drives home nine runs. Single-handed he dumps a score on Boston twice in his career. And remember he's out of practice and he's got a bad leg!

Joe's success was achieved in the tight little baseball world, where events don't resemble too closely the bigger realm of national and world affairs.

In Joe's world, action is direct and conclusive. Usually when you play nine innings you get a result. It is clear—nobody argues about what you've done. There's no effort for your decision, real and complex.

Our athletes might say that given some talent, achievement in this compact world of Joe's isn't exactly startling. After all, it's a game.

But we wouldn't agree. Skill and grace and wit and courage are always a lesson no matter how small their arena. It might be a breathy thing for some of our timorous sportsmen in the big world, but look at Jo-Joe. A spark follows all the way.

The program calls for newspaper advertising for potatoes in some 40 major midwestern, southern and eastern markets on the same scale as last year.

The onion advertising campaign will be limited to trade publications in August and September.

Final details of the two campaigns and a tentative budget will be set after more accurate information is available on the size of the two crops in Idaho this year.

Growers are taxed one cent per 100 pounds for each product moved into commercial channels.

Cherry Trees Surveyed for Disease Signs

A statewide survey of cherry orchards to determine the extent of "little cherry" disease in Idaho is being made, according to Carl W. Nichols, supervisor from the University of Idaho agriculture extension department.

Anyone in Magic Valley having trees which might be infected with the disease is urged to contact the horticultural inspector nearest to Twin Falls.

Crew Working
The "little cherry" inspection crew includes Nicholas, R. C. Stevens, horticulture inspector from Idaho state department of agriculture, Caldwell; and C. A. Hanson, student inspector at the University of Idaho, from Caldwell.

In 1943, 2,654 trees were inspected in this area on 11 properties and no "little cherry" disease virus was found.

Of the 201 properties inspected in the state, 43 had one or more cherry trees showing "little cherry" symptoms. Of the 58,179 cherry trees inspected, 901 were found infected.

Infection Areas Told
Areas of infection were found in southern Idaho in Gem, Payette and Canyon counties. No infection was found in the areas north of New Perce county or east of Gem county.

In the 1944 survey, cherry orchards in the commercial cherry-growing areas will be made to inspect and attempt will be made to inspect many of the home orchards mowed in 1944. Nichols said. Growers were asked to cooperate with the surveying crew.

Gain Reported in Income of Meters

Highlight of the meeting was a talk by Forrest Cooper, Lakeland, Ore., attorney for the organization, who spoke on the CVA bill. Hearing set. Hawkins reports it was announced there will be a congressional hearing of the committee on the bill in the near future. Cooper said county governments in the Columbia basin are not taking any action on the CVA bill because they are afraid of government, believe there are plenty of spokesmen on both sides.

Close Tax Problem

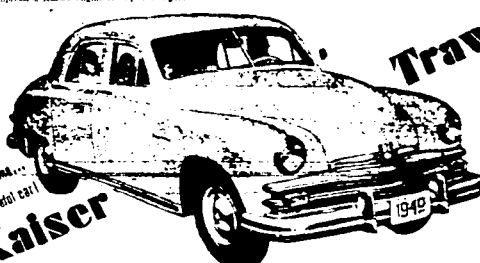
