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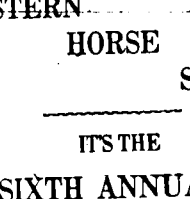

Quakers Give Factual View About Europe

 The American Friends Service Committee has issued a report which is a realistic view of Europe, the situation which challenges the attention of every student of the world war.

It is a year's work by a committee which has studied with special regard the political and economic situation in Europe, and which can come as a relief to many who are alarmed by the reports of a new European war. It would make greater use of the United Nations. In particular, it would deplore atomic weapons with the use of nuclear energy and international cooperation over and above the national sovereignty of the world.

It calls economic warfare a two-edged sword, which by cutting both ways has only a small net bearing on relative war potentials. It believes the value of east-west trade in the recovery of western Europe is more important than the aid which would still further, and have western Europe included in President Truman's "point four" program for the export of American capital and American technical aid to underdeveloped areas.

It believes that American tariff barriers should be raised for these as well as for other countries in the light of the expanding international credit position of the United States.

97,876 Books Are Circulated In Year's Time

Nearly 100,000 volumes were checked out from May 1, 1948, to May 1, 1949, at the city library, according to a yearly report submitted by Librarian Jessie Fraser to the city council.

Actual circulation was 97,876 volumes of which 10,454 were checked out during February, the busiest month.

Receipts during the 12-month period were \$30,772.91 of which \$16,748 came from an appropriation. Expenses totaled \$17,943.23 of which \$2,429.94 was spent for salaries, \$2,248 for books, and \$3,264.25 for building supplies and equipment.

As of May 1, 1949, there were 24,383 volumes in the library. During the year 1,072 were discarded, 42 donated, and 1,532 were added. Total registration and re-registration was 2,235.

The librarian's report for June shows 148 new readers were registered and 92 books were purchased. A total of 7,861 books, 1,275 more than June, 1948, were issued during the past month.

The largest daily circulation was 400 with 246 the average daily circulation.

Total of \$182.00 was collected from fines, the pay sheet and non-recurring will.

Reds, Church Struggle Over Europe's Rule

The American Peace Officers' Union in Italy and France are attempting to persuade their followers that communism and capitalism can exist side by side despite the Vatican's recent re-announcements of its policy.

It is a different story behind the iron curtain, where communism and capitalism are carrying heavy pressure on the church. Roman Catholic priests are being ordered from the communist government there to denounce Joseph Berry, archbishop of the Vatican in the church-state war.

Pope John XII has told German Catholics, and through them Catholics everywhere, that no priest may say that communism can survive.

Palmito Tagliani, Italy's leading communist, told 2,500 of his followers in Rome yesterday that they should be committed to good Catholics at the same time.

Vatican Dismisses

The Vatican says not an archbishop in the world is "informed" of its policy. It says that those who subject themselves to excommunication by supporting communism are subjecting themselves to the church's sacraments and association with the faithful.

Tagliani referred to the Vatican's action as a tactic "dragged from the chest of the bourgeoisie."

He declared excommunication would never destroy communism.

French Communist Party followers of the line that Catholics and communists could work together in a "people's front" against the United States, France's top communist leader, said in a speech in Grenoble.

Phosphoric Acid Production Starts at New Wendell Plant

WENDELL, July 15—A new industry in southern Idaho, the Gates phosphate plant has launched its phosphoric acid production and will begin making sulfuric super-phosphate fertilizer in 90 to 90 days, President Charles T. Gates announced.

With acid production already started and output of fertilizer in eight days, Gates revealed that new plants were under way to add a superphosphate production unit.

The production of phosphoric acid started pouring into huge thickener tanks and from there into storage tanks during the week. Application of acid will begin this week on the open market. The firm will have a surplus supply of the acid even after the start of fertilizer production.

A. C. McDonald, chief chemist who will supervise production activities, said the storage tanks had a capacity of 200 tons. The liquid is mixed in a granular form. While in the tanks, it is mixed with sulfuric acid to the bottom of the tanks and the granules are not removed until the storage receptacles.

Gates said the plant would produce 100 tons of the treble superphosphate a day at first, with output to be stepped up considerably as more full-scale operations. The new plant is owned by the Gates family.

Trip to Moon Set for 1960 By Canadians

TORONTO, July 15 (UPI)—A rocket trip to the moon, possibly with side excursions to other celestial bodies, is being planned by the Canadian Rocket Society for "about 1960," says Dyke, vice president of the society said today.

Dyke, coordinator of activities for the group of scientists and scientists, and the man in general charge of planning for the trip to the moon, said the date 1960 was not only "plausible," but "the earliest date we are working toward."

"Moon Ship"

The trip, he said, would be made in a "moon ship," the shape of a gun projectile, 200 feet long and 60 feet in diameter, weighing 100 tons when fully manned, fueled and stocked with provisions.

Total costs of the ship and incidental for the two-way trip to the moon, with the possibility of side excursions, were expected to reach \$3,000,000, Dyke said. He added, however, that "hundreds of millions" of dollars would have to be spent in preliminary research and trials.

Should Be International

"The job should probably be done internationally," he said. "But it could be done wholly within Canada."

The first major engineering problem is the choice of metal for the moon ship with the tremendous speeds involved in an extra-terrestrial space and the necessity of keeping weight to the minimum. It was difficult to determine the type of metal to use to withstand high temperatures caused by friction of the air at the take-off and stresses of the take-off speed.

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Britain Takes Drastic Action In Emergency

LONDON, July 19 (AP)—Commonwealth financial leaders have announced Britain's appeal for help by agreeing to slash about 25 per cent from the \$100 million dollar loan spending in the western hemisphere.

The emergency action was taken to halt the drastic drain on sterling area gold and dollar reserves. To meet the commonwealth nations, including Britain, this year will spend about \$500,000,000 less in the United States and other dollar countries than they did in 1936.

Eight Agree

The financial minister of seven British dominions and Southern Rhodesia, a self-governing colony, said they would recommend to their governments a ration comparable in amount to that already decided upon by the United Kingdom.

The chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Stafford Cripps, explaining the formal communique, said that meant to effect a cut of about one quarter of the one billion dollars buying in 1938 by the commonwealth nations including Canada and the United Kingdom.

Going to Washington

Addressing the house of commons later, Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin disclosed he will accompany Cripps to Washington this fall for further conferences with American financial experts on Britain's dollar situation.

"I don't want this house or the country or America to believe the Marshall plan because we have another problem to deal with," Bevin said in the crowded house. "The Marshall plan has helped to organize Europe. It must not be abandoned but must be allowed to be carried to the final fruition of a European unity and cooperation."

Promise to Pay

Bevin said any loan made to Britain by the U. S. would be returned "in the years to come fourfold."

Turning to trade relations with Russia, he said:

"In foreign affairs debates I am often called upon to try and find a solution to the great Russian problem. It will have to be found some day, and the best contribution we can make towards it is not to refuse trade."

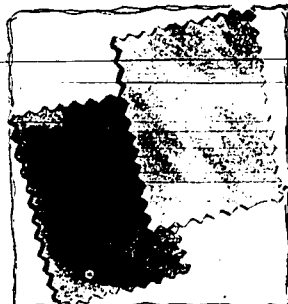
