### Support Price Is Listed for Wheat In Region County

RUPERT, July 21—The government price support on the 1949 crop of wheat will be \$1.72 a bushel for farmers in Minidoka county, according to Carl E. Mera, chairman of the county agricultural conservation committee. Loans will be available through the commodity credit corporation through January, 1950, and will mature on April 30, 1950, or earlier on demand.

The national average loan rate for farmers for 1949-crop wheat is \$1.55 a bushel, which is 90 per cent of parity as of July 1, the beginning of the marketing year. Last year's rate was \$2.

Wheat support prices at terminal markets will range from \$2.16 to \$2.38 a bushel for 1949 crop No. 1 hard wheat in regular warehouses at specified terminal markets. The rate quoted for San Francisco is \$2.16 per bushel. Our wheat grading No. 1 or better, or No. 4 or No. 5 because of test weight or because it contains wheat of the classes durum and or red durum, will be eligible for loan purchase.

A schedule of premiums and discounts for various qualities of the 1949-crop wheat, differing slightly from those in effect for the 1948 crop, will be issued at an early date.

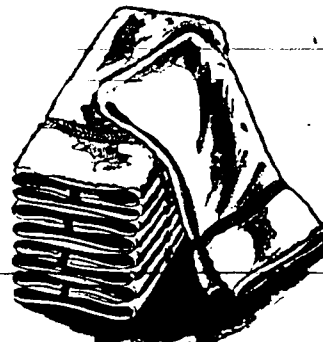

During committee hearings on economic cooperation administration funds, Senator Wherry of Nebraska—Republican floor leader—estimated the surplus farm commodities each ECA nation would need in the current year. It was a hostile challenge, for the Nebraskaian didn't think it would be met.

The effect of the secret clause is now to freeze these estimates into rigid legal requirements for the ECA.

But ECA never intended to stick rigidly to the estimates, either for particular commodities or for particular countries.

The current British dollar crisis symbolizes the deep-seated difficulties the Marshall plan seeks to solve.

But the attempt to distort the plan into a farm relief program stems from no reasonable doubt it reflects no regard at all for legitimate Marshall plan objectives.

A brief announcement said the present management of the Times-Herald will be continued.

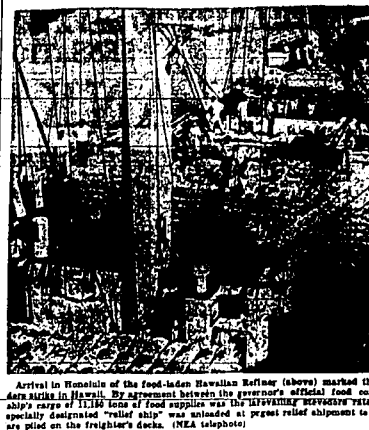
In Washington, the sale was announced in a one-cent box in an early morning edition of the Times-Herald.

## Crop Rotation Is Urged for Valley Farms

RUPERT, July 21.—Rotating so-called "cash" crops with hay and pasture adds life to the land and cash to the bank account, says Carl Mera, chairman of the Magic Valley county agricultural conservation committee.

He points out farmers have been preserving their land, first, to meet war needs and then for post-war demands and prices. And now, that supplies are catching up and in some cases passing demand, there is need to get more land into grass and clover.

Rotation of the improved ways to do that is to establish a good rotation for cropland. A good rotation plan for Magic Valley county may be obtained from the county agent, Mera stated.

Since one of the main purposes of the agricultural conservation program is to keep good land good as well as to protect erosion and depletion of the soil, a number of conservation practices in connection with establishing a good rotation are included in the program.

Mera advises farmers to check on seed supplies now if they are planning to put more land into a rotation. He advises early the chances are better for getting the kinds and varieties of grass and legume seeds which are best adapted to local conditions.

On sloping land which is subject to erosion, the county chairman recommends contour strip-cropping in connection with the rotation. The soil held the soil and help protect the land in cultivated crops.

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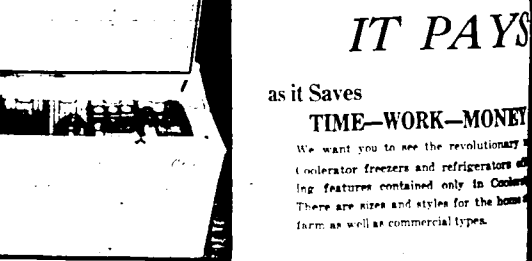

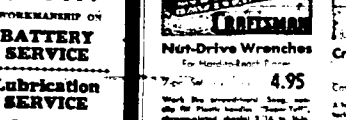

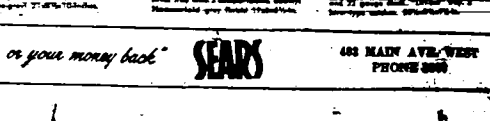

### Scott's Ouster Is Called Aid To Unification

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—Republican strategists hoped today that the ouster of Sen. Scott from chairmanship of the House national committee would end the party money drought. The political war chest is depleted.

Contributors have been drying up. The national headquarters has been spending three or four dollars for every dollar of funds. This contributors strike helped put the economy on a "red" tint.

The resignation under pressure will be submitted at a committee meeting here today. Party strategists want a chairman who will do some behind-the-scenes pacifying to curb party rivalries and merge forces which have plagued the GOP since the 1920s disaster which almost overwhelmed it last November. And they want a money raiser.

Sure Bet

Until last night, former Sen. John A. Danaher of Connecticut looked like a sure bet to get the job. But Danaher suddenly withdrew from consideration. He said many leading Republicans had approached him about his availability and that he was "greatly honored" but that he was sorry—the vast private law practice made it impossible for him to consider the job.

Danaher's decision put Guy O. Caberton of Nebraska and former front-runner's spot. But there are still considerable agitators within the party for a microwarmer or far westerner to take over Scott's post. Among those mentioned are A. T. Howard of Nebraska and former Rep. Edgar Chenoweth of Colorado.

Sons of the steers went out of the Danaher boom hours before he was named. Danaher's ouster was weakened by a statement of Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio that he was not making any candidate for the job. Taft said Danaher would be acceptable to him, but that so would several other individuals, including Howard and Chenoweth.

R. H. Crawford, national committee man from Texas, also deflated the Danaher boom. He described a "not true" political statement that Crawford, Thomas E. Dewey, Taft and Harold E. Stassen were in a "race" for the job. Dewey is a GOP old guard member who was a supporter of Danaher in opposing Scott's ouster.

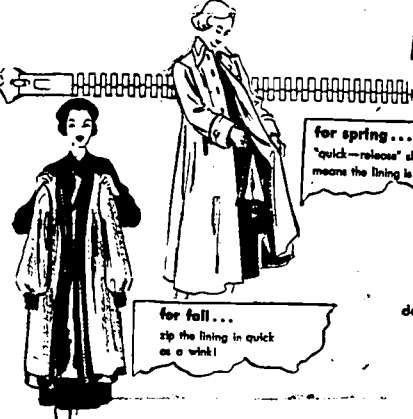

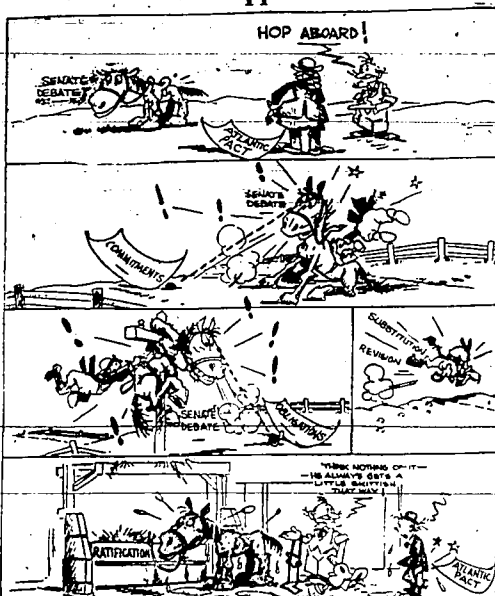

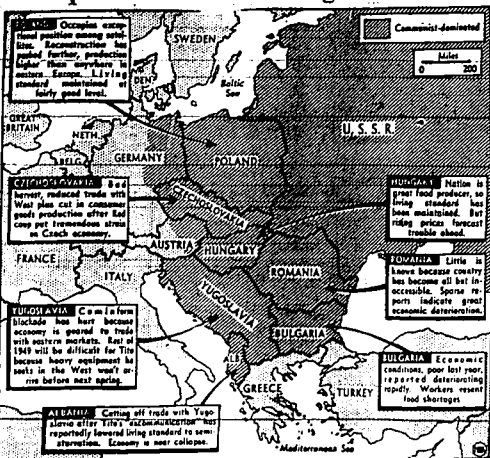

### Neutral Belt Is Offered as War Solution

**By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr., AP Foreign Affairs Analyst**

The American Friends Service committee report on possible peace with Russia suggests a "neutral belt" between the two super powers.

The report has no suggestion of what other nations might be utilized to complete this belt. It is specifically stated that neutralized Germany is to be achieved in the face of a Russian ultimatum. The committee's obvious determination to hold on to the eastern zone of Europe is a clear recognition of her failure to infiltrate the west.

**Not in Criticism**

This is not to criticize the report. It is an aspirational effort by a working committee with realistic and unambitious goals. The first 10 pages of the report constitute a very balanced statement of the public discussion should not be devoted more to ways of winning peace than to ways of losing it.

The report has not shifted away from the basic premise that the world may involve tremendous difficulties. But the idea of a neutral belt between Germany and Russia presents tremendous difficulties indeed.

First announced in the very conception of trying to make 60,000,000 people with the national traditions of Germany and Russia internationally sterile.

To be proposed, Germany would have to be demilitarized. Because of international custom such as was used after the first world war, it would first be necessary to have the peace between east and west. The means would have become the end—children-and-war proposition.

**Military Occupation**

Decided as the report points out, would mean an end of military occupation. This would reverse the usual procedure and other allied fears of Germany. As a fact rather than a theory, a neutralized Germany would become the cockpit for all the old as well as the new conflicts of Europe.

A "neutral belt" would mean withdrawal of the allies from contact with Russia satellites in eastern Europe. What would comprise the "neutral belt" depends in a large measure on the political views of the United States. It is hardly able to assist without economic support from one side or the other. Italy and France are standing firmly on their own, and therefore not subject to neutralization.

And what of the Russian satellites in east Europe?

It is accepted as an accomplished fact that these countries represent a problem in east-west relations. There has not yet been any policy by western diplomats. No policy for their liberation has been pronounced. It is as definitely true as anything has been abandoned.

The Quakers also urge the inclusion of Germany in an armistice or disarmament agreement. The answer is that the United Nations A French plan for an armistice as preliminary to an armistice movement received committee approval. It is then the Quakers said: "Soviet refusal to submit figures apparently drops the plan before it gets fully in approval however."

### Condon Asks Protection of Citizen Rights

**WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP).**—Dr. Edward W. Condon, Wednesday advocated legislation to protect the rights of citizens accused by such congressional groups as the House committee on un-American activities.

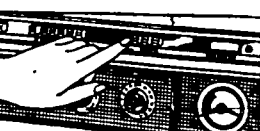

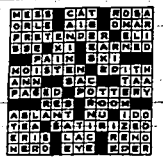

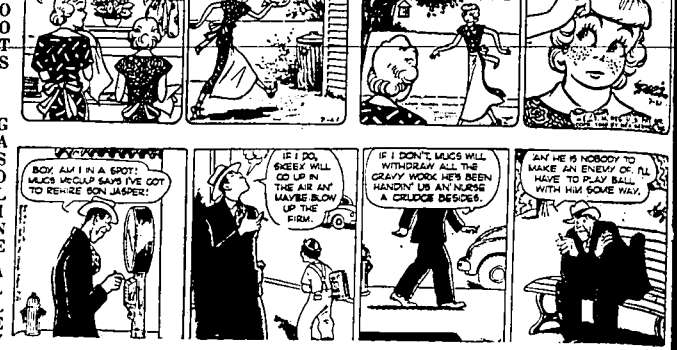

### Roosevelt, Jr. Wants to See Stronger U.N.

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., has lined up with members of the House who want the United Nations to be strengthened by developing the United Nations into a world federation.

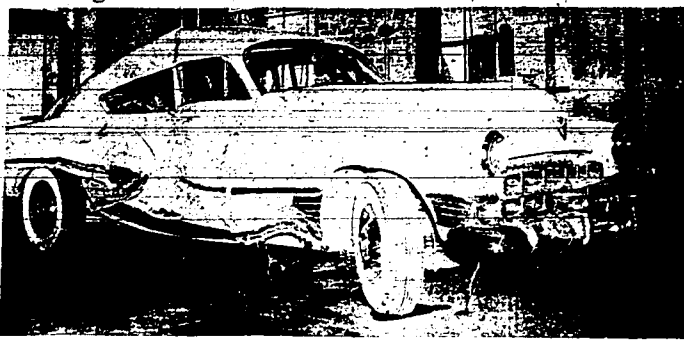

## Weeds at Road Intersections Are Termed Hazard to Driving

A driving hazard in this area which could be quickly eliminated is the continuous unweeded, according to law enforcement officers. The hazard is the weeds growing at country road intersections.

Evidence of the danger created by high-growing weeds is two accidents occurring within a few days near Twin Falls. At least one accident could have resulted in a traffic fatality, according to Deputy Sheriff John Wilkerson, who investigated.

The need for clearing weeds from country roads cannot be stressed too strongly, said Sheriff Jesse E. Carlson. He disclosed almost every road crossing in the southwest part of Twin Falls county is obscured by weeds from three to five feet tall.

Woods in Merlot valley and around Clear Lake are also bad, Carlson said. "Cutting the weeds cleared in some may save a life," he pointed out.

The supervisor of the county police road weed bureau, H. O. O'Connell, said rural country roads have been particularly bad since early June and will continue to be dangerous until after the first heavy frost or until the weeds are cut down or killed by chemical.

D. B. Bismar, director of the Twin Falls highway district, disclosed his men have been clearing country roads for six months of training supervision.

Land from the edge of borrow pits to the edge of cultivated fields may be cleared if control is to be effective. Thus making it largely a job for the individual farmer, Bismar predicted a strong move in the local Orange to have weeds cleared.

According to Creed, farmers should be forced to clear weeds from their land and should remove hedge that block vision at corners. Managers of the Twin Falls Orange supported a weed-clearing project last season and are expected to revive it soon.

Sheriff Carlson urges drivers to use "utmost caution" in approaching rural intersections until weeds are removed.
