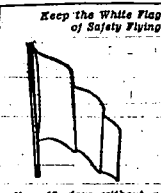

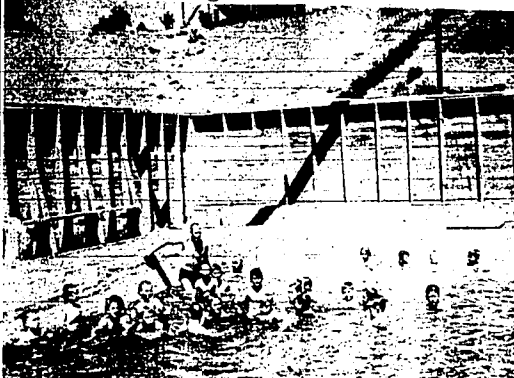

Signs on Canal Confirm Cars, Not Fishermen

BOHOSHOKE, July 22—Information of fishermen's complaints about "No Fishing" signs posted along the Big Wood canal, Manager E. W. Powell said the canal company doesn't object to fishing but is forced to post the signs because of interference from cars driven and parked along the one-way road on the canal bank.

Powell pointed out the road is private property and it is necessary for operation of the Big Wood Canal company. The watermaster and other officials make daily trips over it and have been hampered by searching for fishermen who parked cars blocked the road. He said most of the difficulty came from residents of the lower Glenns Ferry valley and Oregon.

"The canal in question is a stretch of some 20 miles from the Richfield diversion dam to bring a fork to other parts of the tract. Fishing is permissible, but towing or parking cars on the canal bank road is prohibited."

Powell also upheld fishermen's complaints that fish were left to rot in the canal after the treating season. He said the state game department removes the fish when the water is shut off.

WASHINGTON—A tentative program of "minimum conditions" for the re-entrance of the Kuo-Ming Tang in China has been laid before high administration officials disquieted about "waiting until the dust settles" and "waiting until the war is over" before the Kuomintang is admitted to Moscow from grabbing all the far east.

While the proposal to extend financial and military assistance so that the anti-communists may make a stand in southern China has not yet been approved, it has been approved in principle as a member of the Treasury Secretary's board said.

The White House journal of the Li Tung-wei memorandum and the favorable reaction of the State Department are responsible for President Truman's reported instructions to the secretary of state to "prepare a definite plan for China."

ISREK—Domestic politics, as well as the need to block a red conquest in this vast and strategic area, is behind the reported shift from a passive attitude to one of active assistance to the Kuomintang.

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

NEW YORK—The quality of the "journalism" of Drew Pearson has been rechecked by the incident reported last week in the "Washington Post" in which he attacked the first secretary of defense, General Omar Braden, for having "hopped upon" with gusto into the "graveyard" of Braden's life.

It is interesting to note that Pearson jumped out of a window during the attack on Braden, a storm of resentment by newspapers and magazines.

Most of it was quite generally and therefore was quite a novelty to the general public. It was a fight as to the living background which they were too busy to name.

Even during the very time that Pearson was hounding Braden and his own son, Frank Lee, of Lee Hays of Danbury, Conn., himself was in a hospital and enjoying a privacy which Pearson denied to Braden.

It was not until several weeks after I was taken into the navy that I could read the breach between Pearson and Knox by diving Pearson a break of two or three days on navy news that he could use in his production. It was through Pearson's rumor which I vaguely remember. I told those who tried to see him that I knew I couldn't satisfy Pearson but that I would talk with his representative who later came to see me.

This rumor was very accurate and it was regrettable that three weeks later a better relationship between his boss and mine, I agreed. He said they only wanted occasional breaks on navy news. Other departments were giving them duplicates of news releases three days in advance. Why couldn't the navy do the same?

LEWIS OWN PAPER, the Danbury News-Times, killed two dispatches dealing frankly with Pearson's treatment of Braden. Lew could understand use of good men but he couldn't take fair, honest discussion.

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PEARSON'S "COLUMN", a jerky, inaccurate journal of potshots, most of it beyond the point of usefulness to the most discerning reader, and an entirely credit to his boss, is now secondary to his broadcast work as a source of revenue and a weapon.

Nevertheless it still has a fearsome reputation among the bureaucrats. Grange Leader Asking Probe Of Food Costs

PORTLAND, Ore., July 22 (AP)—The leader of the Oregon State Grange has asked for a "long-range" study of food prices, and has accused the government of "hoarding" commodities.

He declared that nearly retail prices are due to "high markups by processors and distributors," and asked the secretary of Agriculture to lead the inquiry for a "full-scale" investigation.

As an example, Thompson cited as the retail price of potatoes—about 2 cents a pound with the support level set at 15 cents. He said the support level has dropped from \$135 to \$140 for 100 pounds. 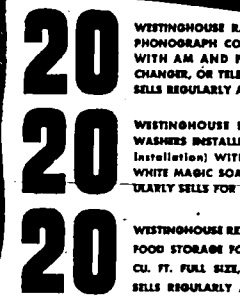
