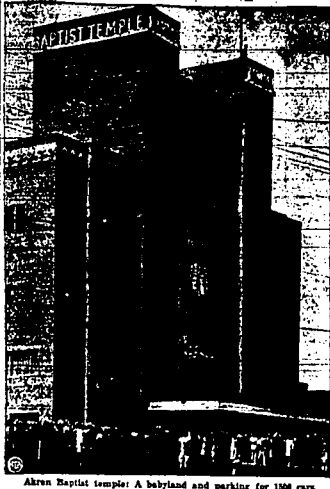

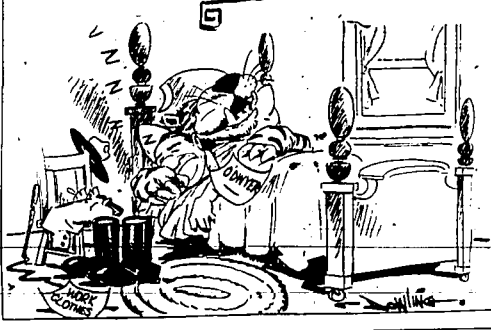
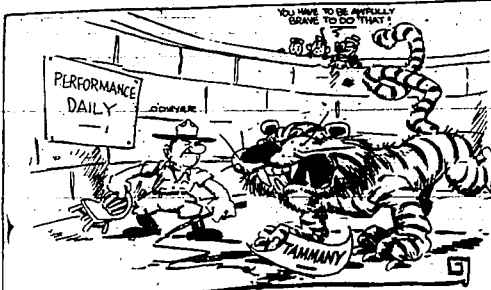

Ardent "New Dealer"

Miller, 44, and also from Charlottesville, is an ardent Roosevelt-Tanquerel Democrat who Byrd was frequently at odds with both Presidents.

Edwards, 44, broke with the Byrd organization last summer and is campaigning as a "middle of the Road" man.

Miller and Miller supporters picture the contest as a fight between Byrd, but Edwards sympathized to prevent Edwards from drawing strength from both sides. None of the candidates, except Arnold, predict that the Petersburg man will vote later than fourth.

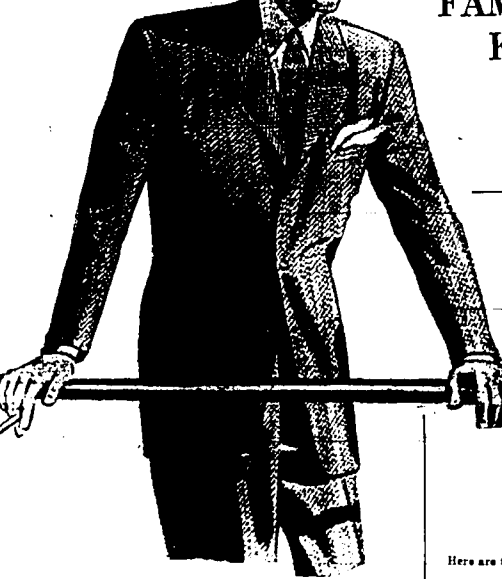

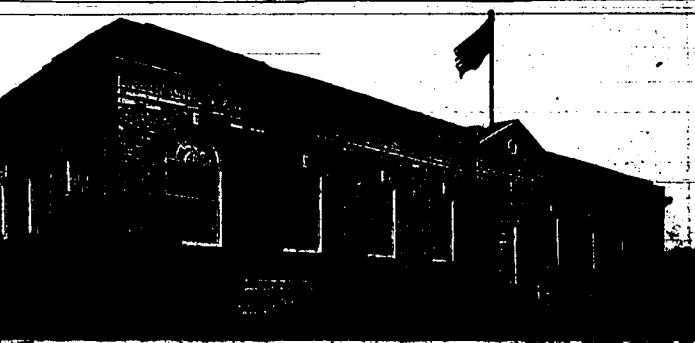
