The original vessel on the slope was destroyed with two bags of mail from the Amstar's navigator and the rest of the trip to Hong Kong.

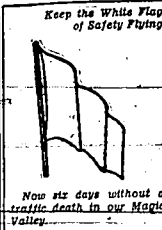
Dramatic details of the Amstar's escape were reported by Vice-Adm. A. C. O. second in command of the British navy for the Pacific.

As an example, Bradford said fire bricks made at Cannon City, Colo., and sent to Tacoma, Wash., must be shipped eastward to the Union Pacific in Denver to obtain a through rate of 70 cents per hundred pounds. A member of the commission said the report's reference to the atomic energy program was not intended to suggest that the United States should have a program of atomic energy production.

In a statement issued at the same time, President Truman declared the atomic energy program would continue to go forward with undiminished momentum and effectiveness.

"I firmly believe that the people of the United States and all who rely on the strength of this nation have reason for reassurance and faith," he added.

Chance Seen For Passage Of Mine Aid

 WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—There is still a possibility that legislation to aid the suffering metal-mining industry may be passed at this session, in the view of western executives.

Two procedures are under discussion:

—Higher import duties.

—Federal financial aid for expansion for development and production of new iron tonnage.

Active

"I think it is still possible to get action on remedial legislation at this session," Senator Murray T. Hays, said. He added that if the efforts should be abandoned for some reason this session, at least the ground would be laid for early action next year.

Senator Watkins, R., Utah, is insistent that some action be taken at this session.

"We must find some way to prevent the closure of more western metal mines and to halt the cutbacks to employment," he said.

Heavy Sues West

Numerous western copper mines were closed or curtailed operations as the demand and price for metals has dropped in the past few months. Watkins was criticized with buying policies of the multimillion dollar which operate the national stockpile.

He inquired about contracts with Canadian copper producers and was disturbed by the blunt statement by the U. S. P. Secretary, acting director of the board's industrial program.

The multimillion board's objective is to no sense to guarantee the American across the board. He said he would not to underwrite domestic production.

He contrasted the statement with the promise of the legislation to "encourage the development of mines within the United States and thereby decrease and prevent, whenever possible, the United States' heavy dependence on foreign sources for essential minerals." He said that "it is a serious criticism" that the legislation immediately, which is applicable to the administration, and which will keep our workable mines operating and stimulate a search for new reserves."

Saltair Roller Coaster Gets Fire Damage

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 1.—Fire early today destroyed part of the Saltair roller coaster, located on the south shore of the Great Salt Lake.

Firemen, aided by the storm of wind, extinguished the blaze in about three hours and prevented the flames from spreading to the rest of the resort, built on a 1,000-acre plot driven into the salt and sand of the lake shore, 18 miles west of Salt Lake City.

The fire started on the first hump of the plant tower and spread out to a 30-foot section of double track. Firemen blamed it on an overheated roller bearing. The heat had closed before midnight and the pavilion was almost deserted when a watchman found the fire.

Earlier tonight, Hammond had visited the roller coaster. He had a record time, which reached 10 seconds in Salt Lake City.

Third Major Fire

It was Saltair's third major fire in 34 years. Original building, built in 1915, was destroyed in 1920. The roller coaster, burned in 1931 and was rebuilt the next year.

Seven workers narrowly escaped injury in today's fire when the chain hoist mechanism collapsed at the top of the roller coaster. The above of Utah's great inland sea, firemen used fresh water from the track tanks rather than pump 27 percent salt content through their hoses.

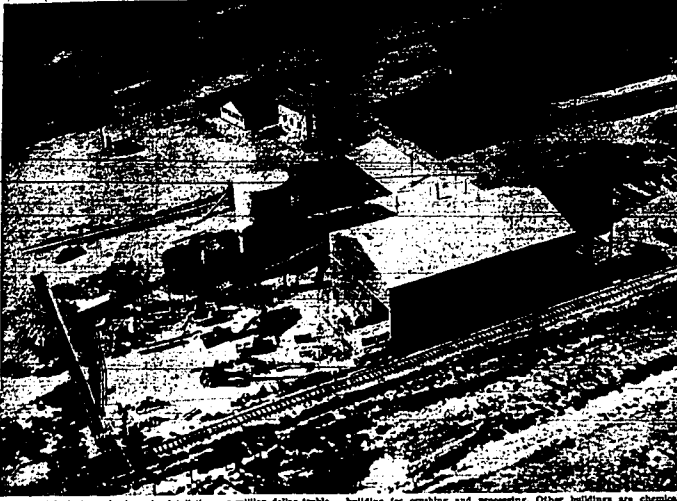

Governor Scheduled to Dedicate New Fertilizer Plant at Wendell Thursday

WENDELL, Aug. 1.—The new million-dollar Gates fertilizer plant here will be dedicated and opened officially at ceremonies scheduled here for 3 p. m. Thursday, according to President Charles T. Gates, Gov. C. A. Robins and Idaho Farm Bureau President John Fredrickson. Gates will head the list of guests who will participate in the ceremonies.

Gates said the general public, particularly Idaho farmers are invited to attend and see the plant in operation.

The Wendell industrial plant will present Governor Robins and President Fredrickson and the governor will personally cut the ribbon and dedicate the plant to signify the formal opening.

Governor Robins will speak briefly after introduction of other guests, who will include prominent officials of the state, Union Pacific railroad, Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company, Idaho power company, major local business firms and directors of the Idaho Farm Bureau.

Bert Weston, sr., Wendell, American Legion national executive committee member, will represent the Legion and express appreciation to the Gates firm for the policy of giving preference to veterans.

"We intend to have a party on the industrial development of our state," Gates said. "We'd like to issue an invitation to every resident of Magic Valley to attend the formal opening of the plant and see it in operation. Our plant officials will be on hand to conduct personal tours through the buildings and see their operation."

The million-dollar project began operation two weeks ago. After a two-year construction program, the triple superphosphate fertilizer will be known as Gem State Phosphate, and the entire output will go to Idaho Farm Bureau, which is now being produced in the state of Oregon and Washington.

Construction of the plant was made possible through a \$100,000 loan from the Federal Government just southwest of Wendell, which has been authorized during the past year.

Engineer District Post Is Changed

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 1.—Effective today, O. Neil of the Denver district, became executive officer of the Walla Walla district, corps of engineers.

Col. William Whipple, Walla Walla district engineer, announced Neil will replace Lieut.-Col. V. Priddy, who has been assigned to the operations division to have charge of all utility relocation including railroads and highways in the district.

A large portion of Col. Priddy's work will be in connection with railroad and highway relocation made necessary by construction of McNary dam, Col. Whipple said.

Neil, who has been with the corps of army engineers for 20 years, served as an officer in World War II and returned with the rank of colonel. He has spent the past two years in the Denver district as chief of operations.

Ford Points Out Danger of Threat

DETROIT, Aug. 1.—Ford told his 100,000 production workers there are likely to be off a long time if they come out their strikes.

The warning was in a company publication urging all 80,000 Michigan Ford workers to work on in a state-conducted strike poll started a week from today.

The auto industry workers' union, which has a charge that Ford is trying to break and liberate its workers from their union.

Quoting the UAW's position, the company said that the union would be in a position to bring the Ford production line to a halt.
