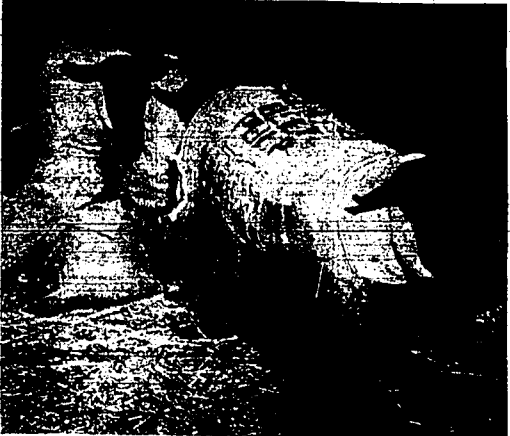
The plea was voiced by W. M. Spikes, director of the National Potato Council, in a special message to congress.

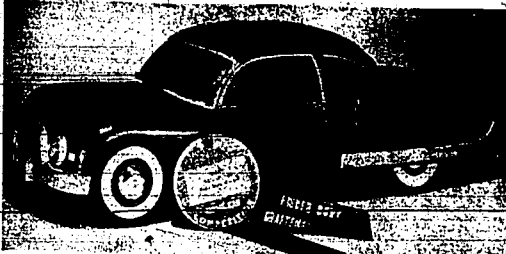

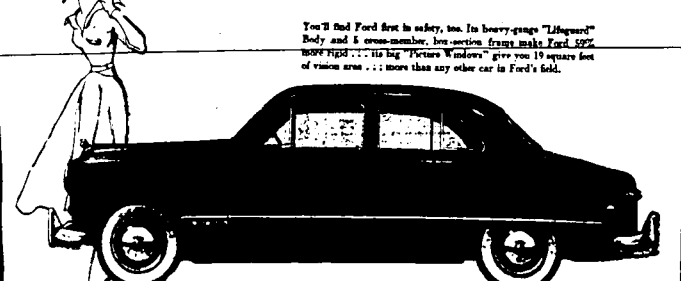

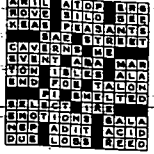

At the end of the year, last June 30, the total deficit for that year was \$111,640,000. Treasury books showed the government spent \$1,497,823,000 during July while taking in \$1,248,828,000 in taxes and other receipts.

U. S. Policy For Asia Is Knotty Affair

The question of what to do with the material aid American can make fully goes to hard-core nationalistic China in her fight for survival against the Chinese communist revolution has again become a burning subject of public debate.

Meanwhile, the Washington state department is engaged in creating a new pattern for far eastern diplomacy, including the policy for China. Philip C. Green, ambassador at large, is heading a group of experts who are preparing an exhaustive report on public opinion toward China, supposedly to clear the way for a fresh policy. This report expected to be published in the immediate future.

No Official Hints
Thus far there has been no official indication of the trend of the projected diplomatic bill, as a matter of speculation one would expect that the Chinese policy would be made to fit into a general far eastern program for halting the spread of communism in that vast area.

The major question is how American and far democratic allies can build a dam to prevent the spread of communism in the orient. In considering this problem one envisages the creation of a series of positions which would form a huge arc about western and southern China, from Japan to India.
