## Another GOP Brawl Looms Over Top Job

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (AP)—The Republican race for Idaho gubernatorial nomination was heading fast today toward another public brawl over the party chairmanship.

The nomination will meet tomorrow on call of Chairman Fred Scott, Jr., to accept his resignation and to elect a successor. Powerful committee elements which helped bring about the nomination to remain in office are expected behind the candidacy of Committee Chairman O. G. Garrison, New Jersey, for the Idaho seat.

Chosen by Dewey

Garrison is one of several candidates who Scott has said publicly he would support. Scott favors an eastern Pennsylvania Democrat, who has been endorsed by the party chairmanship by Thomas C. Dewey a year ago after the New Yorker won the Republican nomination.

Dewey's humiliating defeat and the Republican loss both here and in congress last November led to an ouster more rapid than in a national committee in the case of the late Mr. Lister. Scott arrived in Idaho last night to drive his own campaign for the job, but he is expected to prevent a campaign to resign.

## State Agrees To Cheyenne River Parley

BOISE, Aug. 3 (AP)—Idaho members of the Snake river compact today agreed to a parley in Cheyenne with the Wyoming members to draft the actual plan for the river parley.

This information was shared in a letter today from M. W. Brent, Flax, secretary of the Idaho group, to C. Bishop, state engineer of Wyoming.

Brent advised, however, that the meeting cannot be held in Cheyenne Aug. 19 as proposed because of the withdrawal of the entire group and a number of technical advisers from the federal irrigation service will be attending hearings in Washington, D. C. The meeting in Cheyenne was willing to meet as soon as possible after the Washington hearings.

Wyoming and Idaho committee members reached an agreement on the parley plan last week in Portland.

They will restate the actual agreement it must be ratified by the legislature of both states before it becomes effective.

## West Solons Seeking Debate on Area Plan

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (AP)—Western senators declared today the program of the army engineers and reclamation bureau for development of the Columbia river basin should be placed before congress at the earliest possible time.

Senators Cain, R., Wash., and Chavez, D., N. Mex., voiced this view as Army Secretary Gordon Gray was testifying before the senate public works committee in support of the proposed Columbia valley administration.

## Jobless Reach 7-Year Peak; Employment up

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (AP)—Employment increased to the highest level of the year in July, but the number of jobless reached 4,098,000 the largest in seven and a half years.

Jobs were held by 69,720,000 persons during the census bureau's survey week in July, the commerce department reported today. This was an increase of 101,000 over June.

But the total of unemployed was 4,098,000 higher than July 1948, when it was 2,277,000.

The reason for the seeming paradox of increased numbers of employed and unemployed is the larger number of people entering the labor force.

Many Adult Workers

The number of adult workers in the labor force increased in July by 101,000 over June, according to the census bureau. This was the largest increase since 1937.

In contrast with the past two months, the rise in unemployment was not accompanied by a corresponding rise in the labor force. Adult workers accounted for most of the increase.

The unemployment level was the highest since January, 1948, when it stood at 4,000,000. Non-agricultural unemployment was 3,800,000, or 5.4 percent of the labor force.

The number of employed persons increased by 101,000 over June, according to the census bureau. This was the largest increase since 1937.

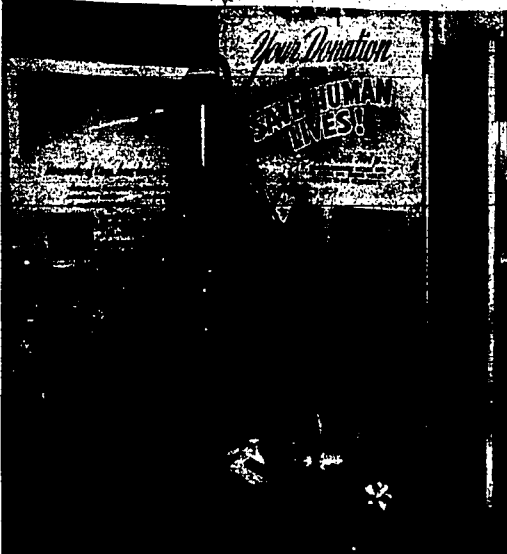

## TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—President Truman is making more enemies for himself among both Democrats and Republicans for his unbecomingly temporary quarters and in Washington's worst stretch of heat for many months. The White House says the heat is appalling. It is not as if he is needing their respective leaders into walking out on the White House.

WASHINGTON—President Truman's legislative agenda beyond the day national legislature was supposed to reconvene in January is being put off by a bill which was last night passed by the House. The bill is the Truman-White House legislative program which will not be taken up by this session of congress, despite the Democratic majority in both bodies.

His own leaders, Speaker Rayburn and Vice President Barkley, have warned him that he must rest content with enactment of only three of his proposed bills in the North Atlantic pact and the housing law.

**THE U. S. SUPREME COURT**  
Although President Truman's appointment of Mr. Clegg Tom Clark as the successor to the late Justice Frank Murphy seems to be meeting with general approval, it does serve as a reminder that the composition of the U. S. supreme court is undergoing a change. It is supposed to have departed widely from the old idea that an appeals court should be composed of a group of qualified judges. For some years now there has been a heavy emphasis on high court vacancies.

Of the present eight justices only three had actual training on the bench before their supreme court appointments. Justice Fred Vinson served six years on a federal appeals court. Justice Wiley Rutledge had four years of similar service with the bench before his appointment. Justice Hugo Black served 18 months as a police judge.

To be sure, the picture is not quite that dark from the standpoint of general legal training. Justice Felix Frankfurter and Justice Owen Roberts were qualified teachers for years. Justice Robert Jackson and Stanley Reed were top government lawyers, the former serving as attorney general and the latter as solicitor general for the United States.

Justice Harold Burton, however, could point only to a regular law practice in Cleveland as his specific legal background. The Supreme court is the most august tribunal in the land. It is the last recourse for those seeking fair treatment in the face of laws that may be arbitrary and thus restrictive of freedoms.

It is the referee in disputes arising from the inevitable competition among the 48 states, with their separate laws and problems. It is a sober check and balance on the other main branches of government, the congress and the executive.

Can we not fairly ask then that at least a fair proportion of its membership be drawn from the trained judiciary? The plain truth is that not a single member of the present court ever had practising jurisdiction of distinction when he ascended the bench.

There is nothing wrong with picking a brilliant lawyer or legal scholar for the court. But there is something wrong with naming a vigorous judge for what is, after all, a judge's job.

Isn't it strange that we must always be looking to the senate and the justice department and other government administrative agencies for candidates? Through its internal conflict, reversal of its own views and similar signs of weakness Justice recently has done what would have been the work of the senate in recent years. And that is not good for the general well being of our country.

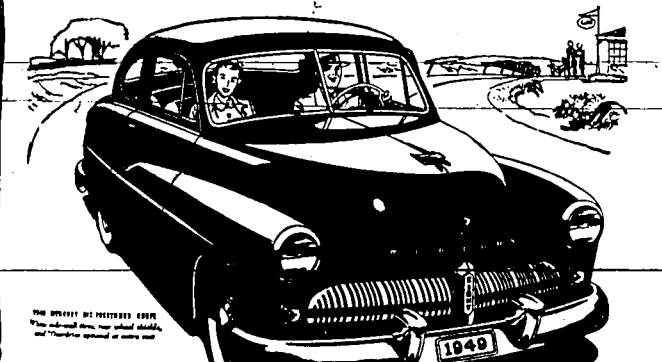

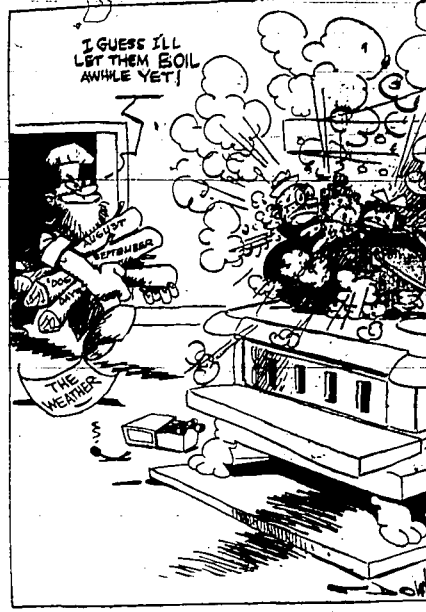

OMAHA, Neb.—(AP)—Wingless chickens are stirring up a lot of excitement these days, following the announcement of their breeding by a Des Moines, Ia., veterinarian, but around here wingless chickens get the bird.

First, there's nothing new about them. As far back as 1924, people were successfully developing a wingless strain. In the second place, they turned out to be less merely than the normal, winged variety. Records show that in 1924 W. L. Frank, Sherman, Tex., developed a wingless chicken. He called it a "Kiwit," after a wingless New Zealand bird. He even started a Kiwit

have an idea period of about 10 weeks when their wing feathers were in the process of growing, no moult, no idle period, he figured.

The wingless breed did lay up to 21 eggs a year, which is better than normal. But after the breeding records and notes over to a graduate student who wanted the information for a master's thesis.

In 1934, a wingless rooster was born at a farm of nature in Rose Hill, N.Y. Scientists of Princeton university got hold of the bird and watched it develop. They concluded, after X-rays and pathological tests, that it was a pleasant creature, but would be useless in the pot.

The breast muscle of birds, which are the largest source of white meat, are their wing pullers. "Wingless," as the scientific Princetonians called the freak, had no wings, he needed no wing muscles. Hence, "Wingless" was also breastless. All he had to offer for dinner was drumsticks, back and neck.

The current wingless breeder, Veterinarian Peter Bauman, Des Moines, claims the grounded chickens would develop tremendous, hideous musculature, since they do so much walking.

Not so, answers Frank H. Musick, chairman of the poultry department at the University of Nebraska.

"It's away the wings and soon you'll be getting wingless runts," he says.

He thinks that, without wings, the chicken is liable to become thin and lean. He, like the Princeton poultry profs, knows that the wing muscles are what make the breasts so thick and tender.

Of course all the pro and con chicken talk about while meat and drumsticks ignore one large segment of Americans—those who like wings.

### Finland Gets Loan on Debt Mark in Past

 Treaty and a half million dollars is a mighty sum item in international affairs. It is a sum which when it is loaned by the west to a country bordering Russia it becomes front page news.  
 Intriguingly, the loan of this sum to Finland by the world bank represents a business proposition. Eugene Black, president of the bank, says politics is not involved. "It is a business proposition," he says, and then adds:  
 "It is an independent government."  
 He suggests that larger loans may be forthcoming.  
 The loan was made after a bank mission reported Finland had made substantial progress toward recovery but needs help in further construction and modernization of the country. That was one of the prime purposes for establishing the bank, he said. It is known as the International bank for reconstruction and development, in which 15 nations cooperate.  
 But this is the first loan to an eastern European country. It is a good risk, it is as much as Finland is entitled to in the light of its history being taken over by Russia, a country which was the enemy of the west. It was one of the first to join the Czech pact in 1938, when Hitler's fall is necessary to accord to Moscow's demands for a military assistance treaty.  
 Finland first invaded by Russia and thereafter an ally of Germany in World War II.  
 While the world bank is operated by 48 nations, it is headed by the United States which subscribed more than 28 per cent of its capital. Other nations include the British commonwealth, France, the Netherlands, Canada, Belgium, Luxembourg, Greece, Italy, and the Netherlands. WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (AP)—Nose written by a young navy pilot struck with polio—in the hopes that it might help "find a cure for the disease."

He was going, but he could only answer to a scrawl.

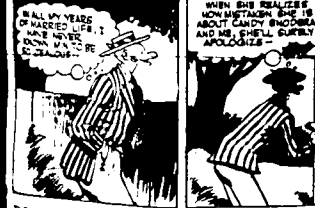

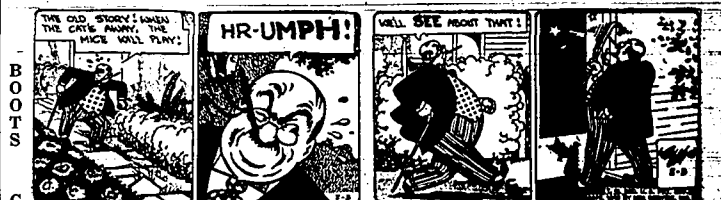

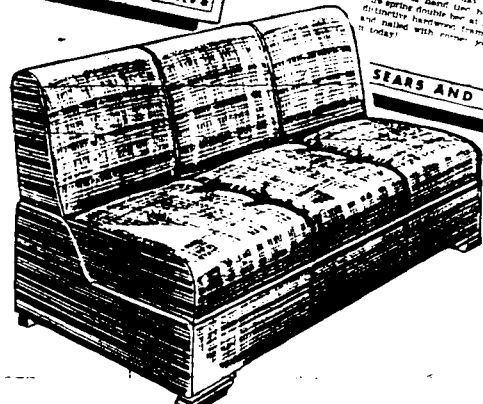
