Former Local Veterinarian Conducting Study of Sleeping Sickness in Horses

A scientific study of equine sleeping sickness, a disease once common in Idaho, is being made by Dr. E. R. Price, former city veterinarian in Twin Falls. Price and his two assistants, Maurice and Monica, are working with the Idaho State health department, the Kansas City area. He was a member of the American Veterinary Association and his home is in Kansas.

Price's study is the fact that these transmitters do not carry the disease in their bodies during the winter. Dr. Price said "Our problem is to find where the disease stays in the winter."

Nothing birds have also been found to be an intermittent host to the disease.

Dr. Price works mostly in a three-county area, Allen, Anderson and Blaine in Missouri. Statistics obtained from reports on horses indicate that if there is an epidemic of sleeping sickness in the midwest, those counties "will have their share" of the disease.

There was a bad outbreak of the disease in the Twin Falls area in 1938, Dr. Price said. He noted the virus is closely related to polo.

The disease causes paralysis of the throat and eye fiber in horses, causing them to go backward instead of the left. They die from 8 to 14 days after the disease is contracted.

In his work, Dr. Price uses all kinds of animals for experimentation.

"It has been proved that there are as many cases in urban areas as on farms," he said, adding that in 1940 the horse population of Kansas dropped sharply because of the disease.

Dr. Price is in charge of a field investigation unit. The staff consists of an ornithologist, entomologist, epidemiologist, a laboratory technician, two medical students and a veterinary student.

"We have a mobile laboratory which will go anywhere in the country where there is an epidemic of sleeping sickness," he said.

WASHINGTON—The senate appropriations committee has in the bill's secret weapon it will use when the "public power lobby" stages a floor fight to block passage of the bill. Chinese Reds Burned up by Ship's Escape

By JAMES D. WHITE
Army Air Corps Analyst

Simple runs on the local and semi-local level—the first reaction of the Chinese against the escape of the British ship Amethyst.

This reaction is going to be watched with interest by the Chinese because it is their first reaction to an issue that involves their pride and their future policy.

Their first reaction, however, strikes no hammer blow. It shows signs of having been rehearsed. It is not a spontaneous outburst. It is a broadcast by the Peiping radio.

The second outburst, sweeping in on a ship, Yuan Chung-Hsien, who is not identified in what appears to be a leak of writing later in the commentary, the agency names Yuan as the commander of the Chinese liberation army at the Chungking front.

It was from Chungking that the Amethyst escaped. General Yuan is apparently the recognized leader who has to explain the escape.

According to the agency, he has forced a passing steamer, the Amethyst, to escape. He has started her "infamous" escape. The Amethyst then sank her, as well as a number of other ships, to rescue survivors in the water. Several hundred were drowned, says the agency.

"Categorically denied," is the comment from the Peiping radio ministry to this whole account.

Yuan is a general in the army and commander of the Chinese liberation army at the Chungking front.

The agency's commentary is along the same line, calling for "punishment for the criminal acts of the Chinese Amethyst." It concludes that "the whole course of the Amethyst's escape, the Chinese people's victimization, hypocrisy and shamelessness of imperialism, no matter how it is explained, is a disgrace to the Chinese people."

SIC Official Tells of Lack of Educators

BURLEY, Aug. 1.—Raymond H. Snyder, president of the Idaho State College of Education, Alton, addressed the Burley school board Tuesday at a vocational meeting. He stated the increased need for trained teachers in Idaho to take care of present vacancies as well as to meet increased enrollment in the future.

Snyder traced public school education from the beginning, stating that training of a teacher was the main object of schools for many years. The first school for training teachers was opened in Massachusetts, he said, and Horace Mann was called as the champion for public schools in the early days.

Service Required

"To be a good teacher, one must be able to render a real service, and not expect to get rich," Snyder said. Education has grown from the first few grades to high schools, secondary to high schools and colleges, and now to vocational training in many places. Vocational training is included in many colleges, and year-around schools are a possibility, he said.

In discussing educational bills now pending in congress, he said education should not be a government concern, but that federal aid is granted schools.

Teach License

Of the 4,475 teachers in Idaho, 1,175 held permits to teach last year. At least 1,100 of the permits will be done away with, so the need for properly trained teachers is greatly increasing, he said.

Last year, 77 trained teachers were graduated from the state. An increased enrollment in the teaching training classes is expected this year, he said.

Low Pay Cited

One of the reasons in Idaho attracts rather than attracts people to the profession, the low pay. The Idaho rate among the highest-paid teachers in the country, while Idaho is listed among the 10 lowest, he reported.

Bernard King presided at the meeting, and guests were John Savage, Murtaugh; Jim Lowman, Twin Falls; and Edith E. Gray, Baker, Calif. Gray is in Burley in the interest of the picnic soon to be held from Burley Falls city to Boise.

Other guests included four inspectors at SIC this summer, Dorothy O'Connell, Hildreth, physical education, and Bernard Westel and Albert Leland, Colorado State Teachers college, elementary education department.

John H. Moore, superintendent of the Bureau of Reclamation office here, will have charge of a vocational meeting next Tuesday.

Plant Danger Minimized in AEC's Report

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—People living near atomic plants need not fear radiation, according to a report issued today by the Atomic Energy Commission.

The report states that the waste disposal area at Oak Ridge, Tenn., for example, is "fantastic total."

Scientists say the number of atoms in a cubic foot of air is 18 with 20 atoms after it. That is 1,600 million atoms, or one-half million billion atoms.

"If each of the atoms of gases in the air were the size of an ordinary pea," the commission said, "there would be enough of them in a cubic foot of air to fill the entire surface of the earth and then pile up all over the globe to a depth of rather more than half again as high as the Empire State building in New York City."

"Out of this enormous number of atoms in a cubic foot of air, 400 at most become radioactive in an hour in the vicinity of Oak Ridge—a couple of dozen in the case of the entire earth—and to that amount atomic energy operations contribute just four."

So-called "background radiation," present everywhere, produces the other 396 "non" atoms they do not harm.

Two and Half Miles Is Safe A-Blast Zone

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—People 2 1/2 miles or farther from where an A-bomb goes off are safe from radiation injury, the atomic energy commission said today.

In an analysis of bomb effects, the commission said nearly everybody within half a mile of an atomic air burst, if not protected by earth, steel or concrete, would die of radiation effects if they escaped dangers by blast, fire and falling buildings.

Drops sharply

At 1 1/4 miles from the explosion, the number of radiation casualties would "drop off sharply."

Not all killed by radiation would die immediately. Most deeply exposed would die in a few hours. Others would live four days to six weeks.

No Preventive

The commission said scientists have found no practical way to prevent the death of cells or tissues heavily injured by radiation.

However, the body's naturally great regenerative powers can be helped along, and research indicates some hope ultimately of finding partially immunizing agents in the form of sex hormones and oridine, an animal acid. These agents have increased resistance of laboratory mice to radiation.

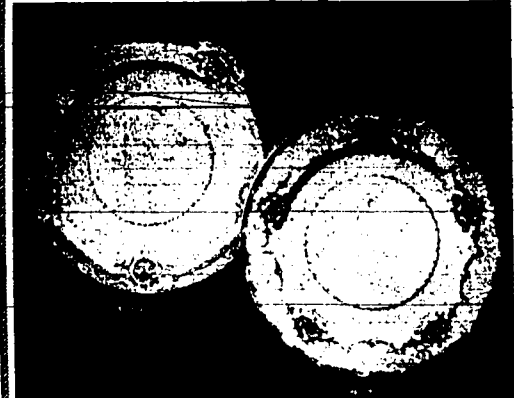

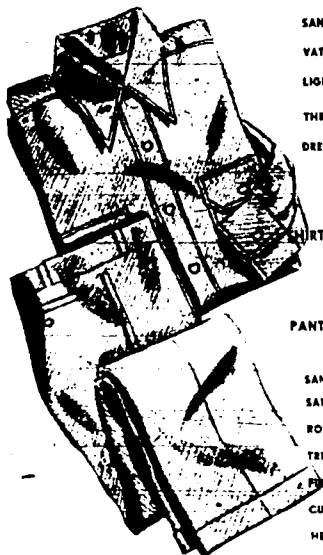
