### U. S. Seeks to Apply Brakes On Bank Firm

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5 (AP)—There is a "pressing need for swift application of corrective measures" to the western banking field, J. Leonard Townsend, federal reserve board auditor, said.

Townsend was arguing against dismissal of the board's charges that the corporation's commercial banking operations may be in the "incipient stages" of monopoly.

Arguments on the defendant's motion for dismissal are being heard by Sutherland M. Zedler, member of the federal reserve board of governors.

Evans took the arguments under advisement and said he would give a decision in writing. He has indicated this might take a week or more.

Samuel B. Stewart, Jr., Trans-America counsel, presented his arguments Wednesday.

No direct evidence

In rebuttal yesterday, Stewart said there is no direct evidence in the record to show any intent by Trans-America to restrain commerce or banking or to create a monopoly, "but much evidence to the contrary."

Townsend outlined the growth of Trans-America and its predecessors and charged that Trans-America is "threatening the economic and financial stability" of five western states.

Three states, in which the board charges a monopolistic tendency may be developing, are Arizona, California, Nevada, Oregon and Washington.

### Sugar Usage Rate Exceeds U. S. Estimate

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—An official report indicated today that the rate of sugar consumption in the United States may be using sugar at a greater rate than that set by the government under a marketing control program.

The report—issued by the agriculture department—bobbled up as some users claimed the government is not permitting enough sugar to be imported to meet the nation's needs, 1,500,000 tons.

Secretary of Agriculture Braman, who administers the control program, has decided that only 1,200,000 tons of U. S.-and-impacted sugar can be sold in this country this year. The program is designed to stabilize prices and supplies.

Today's department report said 1,328,450 tons had been distributed in the domestic market during the first seven months of this year. This is at the rate of about 7,421,000 tons a year or 22,000 tons more than Braman's market limit.

Consumption Higher The apparent shortage in the marketing quota may be even greater than the report indicates, because consumption normally runs higher during the last half of the year than the first.

A shortage of sugar in Austin, Tex., was reported in telegrams to members of congress yesterday. Last month, spokesmen for industrial users wrote Braman urging an increase in quotas. But no action was taken.

Department sugar experts said they have no evidence of any shortage.






