The casualty toll was mounting steadily and hundreds more may be buried in the rubble. Open House Set at Church in Honor of Pair's Anniversary

Open house will be held in the pastor-served four and one-half block Presbyterian church Tuesday from 2 to 5 and 7 to 10 p. m. in observance of the golden wedding anniversary of the Rev. and Mrs. O. L. Clark.

The Rev. Mr. Clark, one of the most widely-known ministers in Idaho, was pastor of the local Presbyterian church for 12½ years, retiring in 1946.

The minister and his wife were born in Illinois in the same family and community, and went to the same Sunday school. They were married Aug. 9, 1893, and left for their present home in Twin Falls immediately after the wedding. Mrs. Clark majored in music and her husband prepared for the pastorate of a Presbyterian church which he held after graduation.

The Rev. Mr. Clark entered the theological department of Cumberland university, Lebanon, Tenn., in October, 1923. Both he and Mrs. Clark took courses in the theological department. Mrs. Clark being the first woman to do credit work there.

Upon graduating from the seminary he was ordained by the Synod of Presbyterians in Illinois, and from June 1, 1907, until his retirement in 1946, he was in constant service as a Presbyterian minister. He served as pastor of the high street Presbyterian church in Alton, Ill., for seven years and in summer conference work through most of the First Presbyterian church, LaGrange, Ore., in 1914. He held the pastorate there for five years, part of the time teaching at the YMCA summer school at Seabeck, Wash.

During World War I he served 18 months overseas with the YMCA. He was made superintendent of field work for the southern half of France early in 1918 and returned to the United States June 8 of that year.

Following his return to this country, the Rev. and Mrs. Clark moved to Corvallis, Ore., where he became the first student pastor at Oregon State college. Mr. Clark took special work in the domestic department of the college, and at the end of the year the couple was called to the Presbyterian church at Pendleton, Ore., where the local
