PORTO RICO, Aug. 8 (AP)—A call went out today to all 4,000 planes in the Panama area to carry the quake-stricken people to safety. The quake killed over 4,600 people and injured 10,000. The military spokesman said if there were not enough air force planes to carry the quake-stricken people, the required additional planes will be drawn from the Antilles bases. Some American planes already have participated in the relief work.

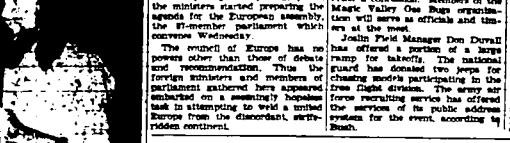

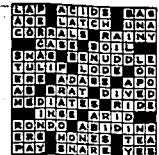

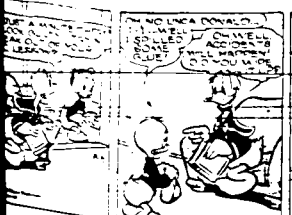

### U. S. Cotton Surplus Seen In Huge Crop

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (AP)—The agriculture department today estimated the 1942 cotton crop at 14,000,000 bales—enough to meet the needs and add considerable amount to the nation's surplus stocks.

It was the department's first estimate of this year's crop and it virtually assures government action this fall to clamp tight controls on next year's crop to curtail output of further surpluses.

**Last Year 1941**  
The forecast crop was smaller than last year's crop of 14,000,000 bales. The 1941 crop was the largest in 11 years. Production during the 1934-41 period averaged 11,500,000 bales.

This year's crop is growing on the largest acreage in 1932 and an increase 14 1/2 per cent larger than last year's. This was offset by drop in yield. Cotton lint yield per acre was estimated at 27.4 pounds compared with last year's record high of 31.3 pounds and a 10-year average of 25 pounds.

**Close to Normal**  
The condition of the crop on Aug. 1 was said to be 80 per cent of normal. That compares with 65 per cent a year ago and a 10-year August average of 73 per cent.

Cotton picking already is under way in some areas. The bureau reported 29,743 running bales were ginned from this year's crop before Aug. 1 compared with 28,977 a year ago, and 19,028 in 1941. The indicated yield based on total cotton supplies for the marketing year over the 20,000,000 bales. This is well above the level at which farm law requires use of rigid controls to hold down surpluses.

WENDELL, Aug. 8.—The Rev. Gerald V. Case, who was graduated recently from the Presbyterian Seminary of Louisville, will assume the pastorate of the Presbyterian Baptist church in Wendell, which has been vacant for the past two years.

The Rev. Mr. Case arrived in Wendell last week with his wife and three small daughters. During his years of seminary he served as pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Castletown, Ky., and is a talented musician.

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—United Aircraft lines is in a move to cut flying time to the Pacific northwest by 11 per cent, has petitioned the civil aeronautics board for permission for nonstop flights.

Present flights to the Portland-Battle Ground area stop at Denver. The air line said it is in the movement here.

The former undersecretary and his wife sailed to Europe a month ago on a trip planned to restore his health, which was damaged by exposure when he fell unconscious last Christmas night in a snow-covered field near his Maryland estate.

The former diplomat had collapsed on a walk and fallen into a hole in the ground. He was found several hours later. He had reported to remain in Switzerland about two months.
