### Major Who Spent Three Years In Germany Says Life 'Faster'

An American officer, returning to the U. S. with his family after three years in Germany, says he notices that life is "faster" in America than in Germany. Particularly in this time of rapid transport which is far lower in Germany, he says. The officer is Major A. M. Gill. He and his family are visiting Mrs. Gill's parents, Mrs. and Mrs. Woody Bess, The family consists of Johanna, an adopted daughter, and their 18-month-old daughter, Jori. They arrived in Twin Falls Friday after a short visit in Salt Lake and North Carolina on their way from Heidelberg, Germany. The Gills were married in Ober-Joch, Germany, in 1944. Mrs. Gill was formerly with the American Red Cross and was active overseas three years ago. When the German Major Gilt was with the military government for a while and with the engineer division at headquarters for the European command. During the war he served with the seventh army in Germany. "There is much less traffic and transport in Germany than here," Major Gill said. "The country is heavily populated but there are relatively few cars. "It is a picturesque country—with its attendant dangers," he added. "There are many pine forests. "But they couldn't compare with our Sierran mountains." The average standard of living is considerably higher here," Major Gill pointed out. Only a few enjoy a high standard of living. "There is sufficient food in Germany now. However, much of it comes from America and is paid for with American money," Major Gill said. "Most of the food is imported, but there are enough exports to pay for it," he said. "You can buy anything you want in Germany today if you have the money. But money is hard to get," he added. ### Record Low Seen in U. S. Wool Output

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (AP)—Production of sheep wool in the United States is estimated at 318,535,000 pounds this year, the agricultural department reported.

It will be the smallest since the department started keeping records in 1908. It is 84 1/2 per cent under the 1943 and 71 per cent less than the 15-year average of 543,784,000 pounds.

The number of sheep about 10 to 12 years old will be down about seven per cent from last year and about 27 per cent under the 15-year average. The 1943 number was set at 28,841,000 head.

Many states have reported a drop in production. All but Colorado, New Mexico and California will have the lowest production in history.

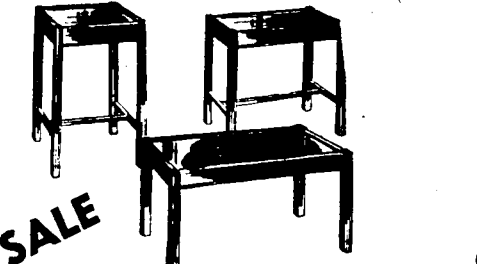

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### U. N. Progress Toward Peace Hailed by Lie

**LAKE ROOSEVELT, Aug. 8 (AP)—**U. N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie today hailed the past 12 months as a "year of progress towards a more peaceful world."

In his fourth annual report, Lie told the 48 member nations the fear of war has definitely decreased despite big power differences.

The 1944 report was the most optimistic yet issued by the secretary-general.

In a speech delivered a few hours earlier at Bergen, Norway, the secretary-general expressed confidence that in five more years war may become obsolescent.

### Pain Toward Peace

He revealed that Franklin D. Roosevelt once said it might take five years to win the war and six years to win the peace.

In his report Lie credited the success of the Bretton Woods with doing the most to ease world tension, but added:

"United Nations action in other parts of the world has also contributed to the progress made towards a more peaceful world by either preventing or ending wars."

This was a reference to U. N. mediation efforts in Palestine, Kashmir and Indonesia.

Lie conceded the U. N. still has not been able to resolve the differences which have caused the cold war between Russia and the western powers. He said, however, the conflict has been kept within peaceful bounds and that further progress toward a settlement.

### U. N. Plans Program

The secretary-general advanced a six-point program which he said could reduce the danger of war and strengthen the U. N. The major point is continued negotiations among the big powers on such problems as the German, Austrian and Japanese questions, atomic energy and creation of an international police force.

Other points proposed by Lie:

A direct U. N. trusteeship over the former Thailand colony, with an advisory committee.

An international council, during an interim period before the colonies reach independence.

High priority to the middle east in the U. N. program of technical assistance for economically backward areas.

Taking full advantage of U. N. machinery in tackling world economic problems.

### Don'ts Mention Pact

Admission of a United Nations field service of 800 uniformed men to aid the U. N. trust in Belgium and other peace missions around the world.

Lie touched indirectly on the North Atlantic pact, but he did not mention the regional alliance.

"It is important to understand that it is impossible to have a better security by the pact and arrangements that have not any of the great powers."

Thomas F. Keady, executive secretary, said the commission, sitting as the state board of equalization, will also make determination of ad valorem taxes and charges on special levies for functions such as sheep inspection and predator control.

The meetings will continue until Aug. 22.

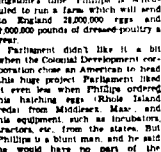

### "Some Drop" Forecast for Food Prices

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—The agriculture department forecasts "some decline" in retail food prices this fall.

In a review of the national food situation, the department said food supplies during the rest of the year are expected to be somewhat larger than during the same period a year ago.

And, in the fall, the department said, seasonally larger supplies will be available for meats, chickens, butter, fresh fruits and vegetables, sweet potatoes, dry beans and peas and rice.

**Eggs Show Dip**

On the other hand, supplies of eggs and dairy products are likely to be seasonally smaller, the department said.

Here's the department's forecast of retail food prices this fall:

Meats—Prices are expected to decline seasonally in the fall. The reduction is likely to be most marked in pork prices.

Eggs—Higher prices during the next few months, with the seasonal price peak reached sometime in October-December.

**Leafy for Fish**

Fish—Prices are likely to continue lower than a year ago, but higher than in the late spring.

Chicken and turkey—Lower prices are expected. Supplies will be considerably larger than last year. Turkey meat supplies per capita may set a record.

Dairy products—A seasonal drop in supplies, but higher consumption than a year ago. Retail milk prices aren't likely to change greatly.

**Citrus Boost Seen**

Citrus fruits—Prices will continue substantially higher this summer than last. Supplies will continue short until the new crop comes on in volume in the fall.

Other fresh fruit—Prices are expected to decline more than seasonally this summer and by fall should be lower than a year earlier.

Nuts—Record large crops of almonds, walnuts and figs are in prospect.

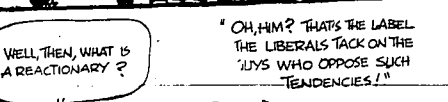

BOISE, Aug. 9.—Fighting a forest fire is a tedious, frustrating job and frequently dangerous. It requires a staff of experts who know their tactics as well as a military commander.

The type of fire, weather conditions and terrain determine the difficulties.

A fire such as is burning in the Payette forest multiplies the difficulties as does the Boise national forest fire.

**Humidity is Low**

In both cases, humidity is low; the terrain is steep and rugged and in the case of the Payette fire, flames get a good hold before large crews could be mustered.

James W. Parrall, superintendent of the Boise forest, said establishing a fire line is the basic maneuver. It can be as narrow as the width of a shovel and may only have to go as deep as the organic soil. On a steep mountain side it must go deeper to stop rolling pine cones and other burning matter.

As soon as an air survey is completed, the forest service crews go into action. The length of the fire line needed largely determines the size of the crew. The terrain determines whether all of the digging and hacking must be done by hand or by bulldozers and other heavy equipment.

**Line Prevents Spread**

If the humidity is low, the fire fighters must do most of their work in establishing a fire line in the early morning hours.

During the day a fire frequently

spreads. This means it travels at high speed through the tree tops. When the wind dies early in the morning, an established fire line often holds the ground fire. The line prevents spread.

A large fire will create its own draft. The warm air rises and cooler air is sucked in. Parrall said it is almost perpetual motion.

While the crew tries to narrow the flanks of a crown fire by day and early evening, the exhausting work also must continue through the night. Parrall said the crucial time is the early morning hours. Then the fire must be mastered or it usually will continue through another day.

### Matches Save 2 From Death In Blaze Trap

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 9.—A box of matches saved two of the 10 smokejumpers trapped in the roaring Coles of the Mountians forest the near here.

They landed and were fighting the fire in a canyon when the Coles, edged by steep cliffs and flames, suddenly the wind reversed itself and blew the roaring flames eastward, toward the men.

Wag Dodge, Missoula, Mont., the smokejumper, forewarned—and it was today he saw they were trapped. He found a rockpile and used matches to burn foliage in and around the rocks.

As the big fire advanced, Dodge crouched between the rocks and shouted for his companions to join him.

Bob Sales, Samual, Ida., apparently was the only man who heard Dodge, or wanted to stay. The two stayed in the rockpile. The others scrambled up the cliff.

**Survive Horror**

Flames licked over and around the rockpile. But Dodge and Sales survived their night of horror.

Water Runway, Laramie, Kans., made it over a ridge and into another rockpile.

Twelve parachutists and one fire guard were burned fatally.

**Expert Warns of Turkey's Health**

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Aug. 9.—Turkeys now on feed for the Thanksgiving trade will have a better chance of getting to market if poultry raisers keep them away from the chickens this summer.

There's real danger in raising chickens and turkeys on the same land, warns Dr. L. H. Hoffman, state veterinarian at the University of Idaho.

Scrapyard says some diseases which are fairly mild in chickens can be extremely serious in turkeys. To be assured of healthy turkeys staying that way until Thanksgiving day, keep them away from other poultry

### Experts See Fall Upturn In Business

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Government financial experts and private bankers cautiously agreed today that business appears to be looking up. But only a few thought that the post-inflation "readjustment" trend is over yet.

A top federal official, closely allied with the financial world, believed the attitude of businessmen toward merchandising will go far in determining the economic future.

He said he believes several factors which have caused this year's downturn will continue to operate, offsetting some of the bullish trends which have turned up in recent weeks.

Significant Change  
This same official, however, said the inflation fall with businessmen during the past month have turned up "a significant change" in attitude on this issue. He was hopeful, but he was very cautious in his optimism.

Views Are Varied  
More than one-fourth said deflationary forces will dominate, and almost equal number thought the readjustment period will ease off.

The bankers expressed varying opinions on what factors are now most predominant in affecting the economic future. But many noted three factors as being especially important. They were government fiscal policy, the foreign situation and the 1949 wage picture.

One banker replied that "considerable deflationary activity" had taken place in the non-durable consumer goods field within the past 18 months, and this same problem must be faced in the consumer durables between now and the middle of 1950.

### Woman Who Asked Aid for 14 War Orphans Tells Its Worth

GHILMS FERRY, Aug. 9.—Early last spring members of the Ghilms Ferry Veterans of Foreign Wars auxiliary answered an appeal from Germany for clothes for children 2 to 6 years old, or anything that could be made over into clothing for children that age.

Today, five large boxes already have gone—and four more are ready to go to—that particular group of 14 orphans, and the woman who made the appeal is a visitor in Ghilms Ferry.

She is Mrs. Arthur Bergstrom, who has spent the past two and one-half years in Germany while her husband, Captain Bergstrom, was serving with the United States Air Force in Europe. The couple and their two children, Billy and Diane, are visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Bergstrom, for the next six weeks prior to going to San Antonio, Tex., where he will be an instructor in the air force.

The story of how she became such an active worker for the benefit of that group of war orphans is an interesting one—especially to those women who have contributed to their assistance.

And the fact that she is back in the United States doesn't mean that the captain's wife "forgot" these 14 children, but forgoes her small friends.

She is the aunt from "America," as she was called by the youngsters whenever she visited them, has shoe sizes and measurements for all of the group, seven boys and seven girls, and asks that anyone having discarded shoes—especially over-shoes—bring or send them to her for shipment now in preparation for the long muddy winter ahead.

"Often, people wonder if the things they contribute actually get to the person for whom they are intended," she said, explaining that anyone who wished to aid this particular group could rest assured that what they gave was well accounted for.

The Catholic sisters who care for the orphans at Bad Weisbaden, in Bavaria, near the Swiss border, are so conscientious that they get signed statements from the recipients.

At that time, are very small now. Long warm coats, overcoats or wool sweaters, long woolen stockings (if there are such old-fashioned garments in the United States at all) and most things of all. They have no rubber over-shoes at all—these would be very welcome gifts.

"The greatest problem again is coal for the winter. The one ton per month they get from the American ladies here last winter was the most precious thing you could give them, and as the winter proved to be rather mild, it enabled them to make the house at least fairly warm. Now, the price for coal will soon be the double of its present high, and the ration will be shortened."

Mrs. Bergstrom interrupted here to explain that the first time she went to the orphanage last winter, it was so cold in the house she had to keep on her top coat.

Concluding Frau Brandenmeyer's letter, "Any form of help would be welcome to them. You know how modest the Sisters are for themselves and even for their children, so I am glad that you permitted me to make such an honest statement of their needs."

"As to clothing, there are certain difficulties still—as the parents of some of the children are missing and some are widowers of war. The readiness of American women to help our children here has been one of the few really beautiful things I had the privilege to take part in during the last difficult years," concluded Frau Brandenmeyer.

Mrs. Bergstrom explained that the only source of money for the children has been the relief from the Berlin youth relief office, which already a small amount, is worth only one fourth of its value in currency in Bavaria. Bank accounts in Berlin were blocked from the beginning here!

"The children go to the kindergarten every day and have a walk in the morning. They have four meals a day, look not too well in spite of all that, as the sisters caution against buying them enough fresh vegetables and fruits."

"Unluckily, most of their winter clothes from last winter, the right sizes for them still for two years."

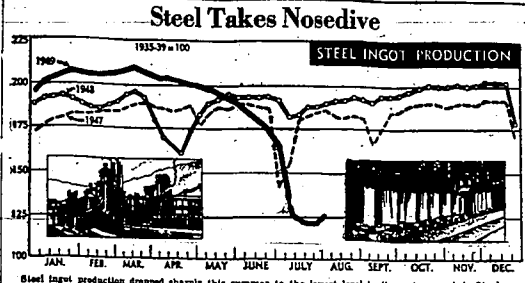

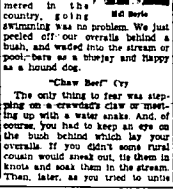

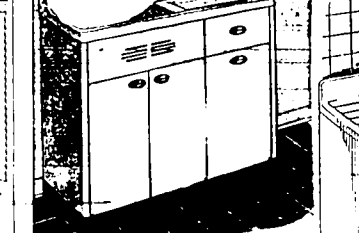
