Petition Cites Lower Income From Phones

THE OLD SQUEEZE PLAY

Careful as they are to conceal the purpose behind it, all those good officials who have been hounding the Pacific northwest, trying to sell the people on a Columbia valley authority, can't keep the cat from getting out of the bag.

There's one point they are always sure to emphasize: That the adoption of CVA would in no way hamper the development of the private utility concerns, such as the Idaho Power company.

But then we have some unexpected developments which knock all such assurances into the cocked hat. Right now we have a particularly glaring example—the United States department of interior getting out an instruction to restrain the Idaho Power company from any more work on its new transmission line between Boise and American Falls.

It's not surprising that the government would try to stop the power company from expanding its transmission facilities, but the reason it advances for such action is absurd: "Trespassing on the public domain."

On the one hand, Mr. Roach points out, the interior department tries to frighten the public into believing that there's a serious shortage of power. Yet, that same department takes legal steps to stop work on a private utility company's expansion program to produce a sufficient power available.

In the past, according to Mr. Roach, before any agitation for government power, permission for advance construction on public lands was granted as a matter of course, with the understanding that the formal permits would be issued in due time. But now it's a different story.

It appears that the power company has committed an unpardonable sin by "trespassing on the public domain," the people of this vicinity, entirely familiar with the entire facts of the case, would be able to figure it out for themselves that the government has another motive. Anyone can see that this latest move is nothing more than the old federal game of "wait and see."

Even now, before the government has had an opportunity to force a Columbia valley authority down our throats, we can see how it operates when it chooses to compete with private enterprise.

What would it be like once the bureaucrats had a CVA in actual operation!

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Kindly and shrewd Edwin O. Nourse observes almost daily that the council of economic advisers if he was not lucky enough to have a strong philosophical conviction as to the balance and sense of humor.

He had need of this in the wake of the regular routine of consulting business leaders in his line with the council's members, before submitting formal or semi-formal reports on economic conditions to the president.

WHOM?—In opposing any elaborate government program for lavish spending such as proposed by conservative Democrats in the senate, an extremely conservative business representative with N.A.M. and U. S. Chamber of Commerce connections insisted that the program would be a disaster.

He argued that the 1918-1928 period had been the most disastrous in the nation's history. In fact, he referred to the first postwar years as a "dark time." Now, he contended, despite a slight increase in unemployment, a general condition of business activity was in a state of "healthy" readjustment.

Healthy for whom?—calmly said Dr. Nourse.

CONSERVATIVES—Dr. Nourse found that his consultants, who numbered worried heads of small firms as well as the so-called "big boys," were generally conservative in their opinions. They were generally conservative in their opinions.

TAXES—On the positive side, the so-called "giant" plumped for no tax increase and possibly elimination of certain taxes. Their opposition was widespread.

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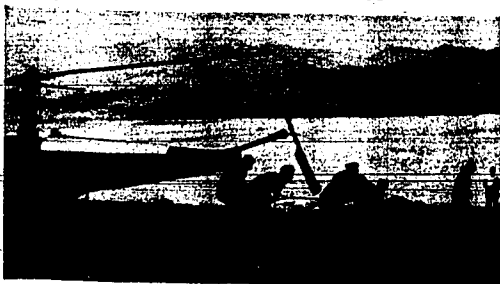

District Court Suit Seeks to Recover Cash

A demand for a copy of account also was filed. Biel claims that Olsen and Bradford have possession of all produce sent to Ogden within 10 days. Information is to include the date of sale, name of purchaser and amount paid. He also asks for the number, date and price of bags received in his possession.

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Czech Revolt Disclosed by Party Organ

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Aug. 10 (AP)—Residents of a mountain town in Catholic Slovakia, armed with rifles and shotguns, revolted against the communists and set up their own local government, it was disclosed today.

Over Prague, weekly magazine of the Czech Communist Party, announced that the uprising occurred at Surovo, in northwestern Slovakia, and that the local government was a communist-controlled police force of 50 men.

The magazine said aroused villagers led by a group of fighting peasants won out over the chairman of communist-controlled local executive board which was defending the local government against the "Reds' army."

Then, the magazine added, the district of Surovo appointed an "illegal" council of their own to replace the local government "after the Reds' army" departed.

"These people did not seem to be certain whether a local government had already been proclaimed, but they were ready for it," the Prague magazine stated.

West Range Condition Is Called Better

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 10 (AP)—Range conditions throughout the western states was reported generally in "much better" condition today than it was a year ago.

The report came from F. W. Baker, Jr., western livestock statistician for the D. & Department of agriculture.

Ranges fed in Texas, New Mexico and Arizona was rated at the highest since 1937. The Dakota has the lowest. Aug. 1 condition since 1899, with Montana range feed the lowest since 1928.

Better in 8 States
Conditions in Wyoming, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado, Oklahoma and Utah are rated as better than last year and above average.

Cattle and calves were said to be in above average condition, except in the northern great plains and far west, where range food and pastures have been dry and pastures are low.

Arizone are the best in eight years, according to Baker. In Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma and Colorado cattle are listed as being in "good" condition, above average.

Cattle in Wyoming, Utah and Nevada are in good finish, showing a higher condition rating than a year ago.

Four in Northwest
Dry short range and pasture feed in the Dakotas, Montana, Idaho, Oregon, Washington and California has reduced the condition of cattle.

Baker pointed out that sheep conditions varied greatly in the range sheep states.

The livestock expert noted that sheep were in good to very good shape in Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona and Utah. Texas sheep showed a higher condition than a year ago, but with coarse feed had made only fair progress.

Sheep Output Cut
Dry short range feed has shown its effect in lowering the condition of sheep and lambs in Montana, South Dakota, Oregon, Idaho and Washington, the report states. Early lambs in Idaho, Oregon and Washington are meeting at lighter weights, with less finish than a year ago.

The report was compiled on questionnaires sent to stockmen in the 17 western states who reported on livestock, ranges, and general livestock matters.
