"Bitter" Seeds Net Idahoans Sweet Profits

BOISE, Aug. 11 (AP)—Idahoans are making a sweet profit collecting bitter melon seeds.



Utah Refinery Is Planned to Help Industry

CAPITOL, Utah, Aug. 10.—Construction of a refinery which will stop taking a double rise across the country next year when Utah's first copper refinery is completed.

The Utah division of the Kennecott Copper Corporation annually produces about 35 per cent of the copper mined in the United States.

The ore comes from the ground in the high Blighatch mountains, Oquirrh mountains on the western rim of Salt Lake Valley.

But the bars of blister copper that come pouring from the smelter are sent to the coast where in the west in that condition.

Before wire made of Utah copper can be strung to the coast, the bars of blister must be loaded into freight cars and sent across the country to smelters in the eastern states, mainly Connecticut.

Now the pure refined copper draws into wire at eastern mills, then shipped back to the west for consumption. The only smelter in the small output of one refinery at Utah.

Over the years, the industry has had continuous industrialization of the west.

11,000 Mark Is Topped in Wave of Polio

By The Associated Press
More than 3,000 new cases this week pushed the national total for this year to more than 11,000.

An Associated Press survey through Aug. 9 showed that the number of cases this week is running roughly 4,000 ahead of that for the same date last year. The total, with a total of 37,000 cases reported, was the second highest in the history of the disease. The worst year was 1916 when more than 20,000 cases were counted.

Judged solely by case figures, the polio situation looks more alarming than it really is, health authorities pointed out. They said that a greater percentage of polio cases are recognized and reported each year and that many of the reported cases are so mild they would have been diagnosed as a cold in the head a few years ago.

Actually, the 11,000 cases reported to date represent a rise of about 10 per cent over 10,000 persons in the United States.

Polio Cases Drop
Most health officers reported the proportion of paralytic cases of the disease this year polio cases was reported under the usual ratio in most areas.

The Aug. 9 survey showed an increase of more than 1,700 cases in three days since an earlier national check.

Twenty-eight states had reported more than 800 cases since the first of the year. Polio cases in Kansas 877, California 626, Illinois 79, Michigan 561, Missouri 967, New York 1,110, Oklahoma 993, and Texas 1,284.

Foundation Gives \$278,330 in Polio Help for 1 Week

NEW YORK, Aug. 11 (AP)—The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis announced today it had spent \$278,330 in emergency aid during the week ending Aug. 7 in chapters in polio-stricken areas whose search of disease funds were exhausted.

The allotments were the largest in any week since the 1948 outbreak.

Chapters in 28 counties in 14 states obtained the grants. The total grant was a 34 per cent increase over the previous week's \$207,000.

Missouri, where polio cases have risen sharply in the past several weeks, received the largest amount, \$68,000.

The foundation gave \$66,000 to North Carolina. The state, which has almost escaped this year's outbreak, received the most money for care for victims of last year's epidemic, won't in the state's history.

Near East Arms Embargo Secured

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—The United Nations security council today voted to lift its embargo on arms shipments to the Near East.

By a 9 to 0 vote, with Russia abstaining, the council recommended that the United Nations Committee for the Middle East be authorized to negotiate a permanent peace and to prepare armistice agreements. The council also recommended that the Arab states with whom she fought the holy land war.

The council, however, refrained from ordering the Palestine trustees to observe an unconditional armistice, and by rejecting Soviet suggestions, continued the Palestine commission to negotiate a permanent peace and to prepare armistice agreements for the various Israeli-Arab armistice agreements.

Loyalty Program Upheld by Ruling

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—The U. S. court of appeals today upheld by a 3 to 1 vote the constitutionality of President Truman's loyalty program.

In so doing the court ruled that there is nothing unconstitutional about Attorney-General Clark's list of subversive organizations. It said that an organization named on this list has no right to complain.

The ruling was made in the case of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee committee, a group Clark has designated as subversive.

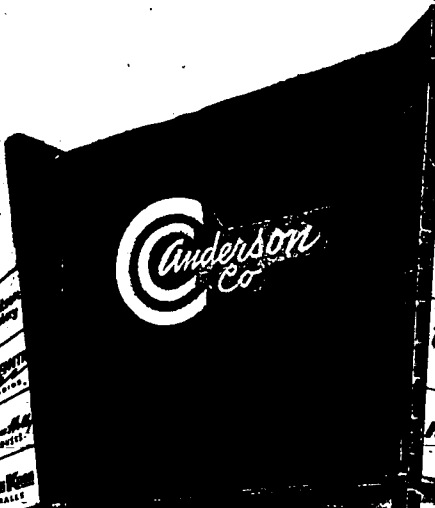
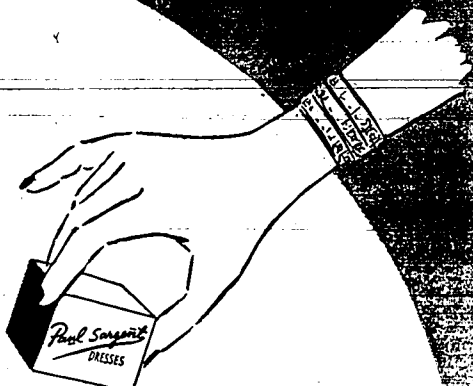
