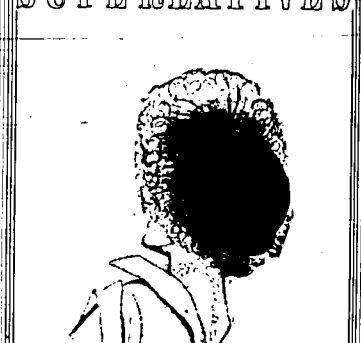

Restrictions Are Set for 2 More National Forests

CHALLENGE, Aug. 11.—Extension of restrictions to the Challinor and National forests because of the current fire hazard situation has been announced by W. B. Rice, regional forester.

The restrictions were effective Thursday and will continue in force until conditions permit their revocation, Rice said.

Smoking is prohibited, except while traveling on an auto, through highway. However, smoking is not prohibited at camps or improved places and persons may stop and smoke in places "free of inflammable material." They must stop smoking before resuming travel, Rice explained.

The second restriction prohibits persons from going into areas without being equipped with an axe, bucket and shovel when means of carrying the tools are available. This does not apply to persons traveling through closed highways.

Persons in charge of campfire parties will be held responsible for any violation of the order, Rice explained.

He Suggests Idaho Change to Unicameral Legislative Plan

Editor, Times-News: Idaho's "title Hoover commission" is considering the reorganization of the state government. While they are at it why don't they do some real reorganization of our legislature by adding the unicameral or one-house legislature as Nebraska did in 1900.

The unicameral is not something entirely new. It has existed since the times of ancient Greece. The bicameral or two-house legislature, although probably a better system, is an old-fashioned system.

There is no governmental unit within the state that requires representation. The legislative committee represents the same areas and constituents, differing only in the number of members. One house is merely a duplication of the other. The conflicting interests and the duplication of totally different areas as embodied in the national congress, is totally lacking here.

There is no enough of a compact area that conflicting interests are absent and areas interests are fairly uniform throughout the state. Look at city and county governments. The county is run by only one board of directors. The trend from bi-cameralism to a unicameral council for city government came in the early part of the century and by 1927 only 60 per cent of the nation's cities hadn't made the change.

All cities above 20,000 had made the change by that year. As for a business concern, he one would consider two boards of directors is government different?

The unicameral would bring a reduction in membership. Legislative membership that is too large is detrimental to the representative principle. In order to accomplish our country's members' right, including that of debate are supervised party leaders or committees.

The bicameral divides responsibility and back peddles as well as treading as well as lobbying, has a tendency to increase the people's interest. The people are interested in following their elected representatives' actions or your reports because they are unacquainted and are not called by the bicameral machinery. The unicameral would speed up the procedure so that the people themselves can follow the actions of their representatives and thus ward them by re-election or punishment by defeat and in this way establish their responsibility.

Milk Grading Explained by State Official

Tests required by the state to determine fitness of milk for marketing have been explained by Lester Hendrick, Boise, Idaho, state director of agriculture director of dairymen.

By taking necessary care of raw milk, Idaho dairymen can have a large income, the explanation stresses. Idaho milk processors can not produce high quality finished products from inferior raw milk.

Milk offered for sale is subjected to required tests at regular intervals. Government tests are taken twice monthly with weekly checks made by producers who receive reject milk. The methylene blue dye test is taken once a month, and high bacteria count milk being tested twice weekly until a low bacteria count is achieved.

Oxygen Loss Timed

The dye test is based on the fact that color given the milk will disappear more or less quickly, depending upon the rate oxygen is taken from the milk. Bacteria in the milk consume its oxygen, content—the more bacteria present, the faster the oxygen is consumed. The time consumed in removal of oxygen and the dye color is used to determine the amount of bacteria present in a sample of milk. Good milk retains the color for five and one-half hours or more. Average milk loses the blue tinge in two to five and one-half hours and is tested five and one-half to 20 minutes to two hours.

Reject Milk Colored

Should reject of either of these tests prove the milk unacceptable, it is colored with a harmless dye and is returned to a producer. Milk rejected cannot change from the plant where milk is produced until it has produced acceptable milk for 10 consecutive days.

Manufacturers of milk are required by state law to make these tests and grade all milk and cream received. Hendrick pointed out that milk not meeting the requirements is rejected as unfit for human consumption.

Failure to comply with the law can result in fines or imprisonment. Convicted producers are subject to a fine of not more than \$500 or a term not more than three months in the county jail, or both, Hendrick warned.
