FRANKFURT, Germany, Aug. 15.—Western Germany has handed the right-wing parties a massive blow in the vote for the new federal republic for the crucial last four years.

More than 24,000,000 Germans returned to the polls yesterday in their first free election since Hitler took over in 1933.

Western German voters who rejected socialism and extreme right-wing parties.

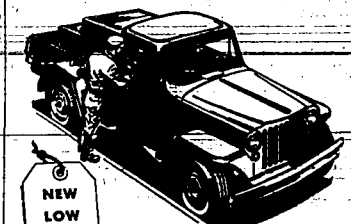

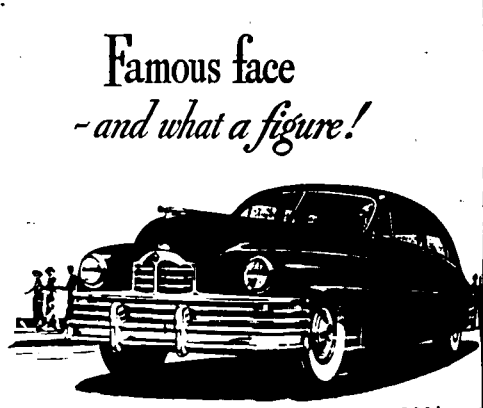

Care of Your Children

Expert advice is provided and certainly can be used with advantage to both parents and children. But it should be used in relation to the child under consideration.

Experts must deal with particular children. The way to do it is to study the child with a questioning attitude. Is the advice right for this child? The thought "perhaps" should be considered before the advice is accepted.

For example, I keep saying that routine is essential to the physical and mental health of children and they learn best when they do the same thing at the same time daily. What I cannot say is how their routine should be applied to their children in their various homes. In any case the program should be quite simple.

Suppose a mother chooses eight o'clock as breakfast time for a child. That child may not be able to eat and receive his routine of duty neatly. But one morning there are interruptions. A call from a grandmother for help, an accident in the kitchen, an unexpected visitor. The breakfast cannot be served at the usual time. The child is alarmed. The routine breakfast can be served a little later and the child will not notice any change.

The baby is scheduled for his sleeping at set time but something happens to make it impossible to lay him out at that hour. Perhaps there is a fire, or a visitor, or a package.
