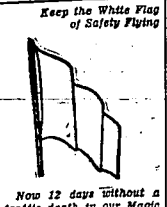

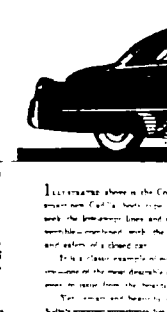

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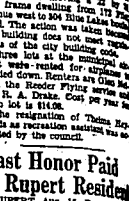

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Elmore Cantaloupe Grower Foresees Melons Becoming Important to Region

OLINHS PERRY, Aug. 16—Cantaloupe planting in several hundred acres of land in the King Hill-Elmore area, instead of the 50 acres under cultivation this year—highlight the dreams of Olinhs Perry, local produce grower and shipper who envisions the day when the area could be famous for its cantaloupes and melons.

"This area has ideal conditions—good soil and hot weather—for the crop which should supplement the early potatoes and onions grown in this area," Olinhs said, as he watched the golden cantaloupes rolling up the conveyor onto a long belt before workers in his warehouse here.

"We've been growing and shipping them on a small scale for the past 10 years, and feel that they yield more for less work and output than any other produce we can grow here," he continued.

"The year crop, which runs about 300 crates to the acre, began to grow in March a year ago, and picking will continue for about a month more."

Olinhs explained that local growers are being trained in the packing and shipping business, in an effort to make the industry an important part of the community.

He said that the University of Idaho now has a school for cantaloupe and melon production, and that the school is being operated by Olinhs Perry, who is the instructor in the school.

Olinhs also sponsors tours of the cantaloupe fields in the area, and he is working to attract tourists to the area.

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Auto Industry Unworried by Sizable Stock

DETROIT, Aug. 16—The auto industry will have a sizable stock by this year's end, but it isn't worried, industry experts say.

A normal field stock means that just about any make of car may be had off the dealer's floor. That hasn't happened before the end of 1949, but model year will be made to fit only a temporary condition.

Counting upon the huge backlog of replacement demands, they say field stocks will be wiped out again early in the spring.

Demanded Tapering - Of course, a tapering off in demand is coming to the car industry. When it comes a drop in production will not be far behind. Many industry experts say these things could happen any time after Sept. 1.

Earlier this year few persons had to the auto industry believed retail prices would hold up beyond increased car makers' need to boost that price cuts would be made at that time to stimulate demand.

As a result, however, the industry's new car business is very good. Price cuts aren't expected to be likely to make any substantial cuts until it knows what commitments it must make to labor.

New Models Rushed - Most industry sources are predicting that because of sales and production curtailments, more new models will get under way after Sept. 1. Several more new models are already being prepared for early introduction.

Appearance of new models would ease any sales drop. New models always stimulate demand. And the stimulus will be greater if lower price tags are put on the new cars.

Automatic Transmissions - Optional automatic transmissions is to be announced for several forthcoming new models will add to the manufacturer's production costs. Many of the cars to be fitted with the new transmissions will need increased electric power output.

Despite complaints of high prices, car buyers still want automatic transmissions and other extras that add to delivered costs. Most sales chiefs say there has been no let up in the demand for auto accessories.

Report Shows Dip for Idaho Disease Load

The cases of notifiable diseases reported in Idaho dropped 86 percent from last month, according to the state department of public health, division of vital statistics.

The greatest cause of disease for the month was measles with 305 cases, followed by chicken pox with 200.

Poliomyelitis began with 25 cases reported for June, considerably more than reported for June of the past two years. Excess counties reported cases during the month.

There was an increase of 83 percent in the number of pyemiasis deaths recorded over last month and a 30 percent drop in the number of stillbirths recorded. Three maternal deaths were reported.

Heart Disease Leads

Heart disease again topped the field with 103 deaths. There was one death reported from measles, one from diphtheria and one from undulant fever. Eighteen deaths were reported from pneumonia.

Accidental death increased slightly with 94 attributable to motor vehicles.

Three children under 4 years of age were drowned in open irrigation ditches.

Producing comb honey is a technical work. First the small wooden sections one way in the stove have to be folded and stuck with foundation which is a kind of beeswax. The purpose of this is that the bees will draw perfect combs in the sections.

Revisions for Old-Age Law To Boost Aid

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (AP)—The house ways and means committee is putting finishing touches on legislation intended to insure about 43,000 of America's working people against want in their old age.

Moreover, the legislation — if it becomes law — would permanently increase aid to about 70 per cent of the benefits being received by 1,000,000 persons over the insurance program if they have died. Increase by an average of 50 per cent of the benefits of insured persons yet to retire, or to their survivors if they die.

Liberate State Help

A liberalization of about \$100,000,000 of the federal participation with the states in granting public assistance, or bona fide, to needy persons not covered by the insurance program. The federal government now is contributing about \$1,100,000,000 a year for this purpose.

3. Create a new category — the "retardation" — of permanently disabled persons for protection under both the insurance and public assistance divisions of the social security program.

4. The insurance program the workers and their employers pay for what the workers get. Public assistance is direct relief based on need.

Tax Levy Hiked

4. Increase the payroll taxes that support the insurance program. The committee's new schedule calls for a boost from the present one per cent each on employer's pay and employee's pay, to 1 1/2 per cent each on each pay Jan. 1, to 2 per cent each on Jan. 1, 1951; 2 1/2 per cent in 1952; 3 per cent in 1955, and 3 1/2 per cent on each in 1970.

This is the most important social security law revision approved by the committee since 1930. It was approved after a long and bitter struggle brought "survivors" of the insurance program, along with providing benefits for the insured persons in their old age.

There is little chance that the legislation will be approved finally this year. The house may act upon it in legislative Jan in the senate probably will cause that body to delay action until 1950.
