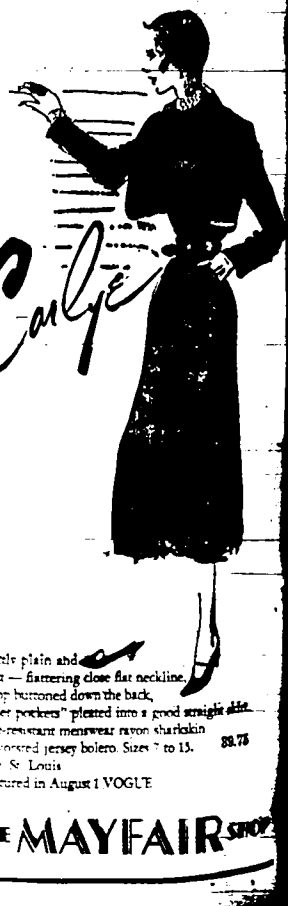

### Trail Built for Forest Service By Magic Valley Boy Scouts

**BURL, Aug. 18.**—The day-by-day experiences of 14 Boy Scouts and their advisor, Glen Johnson, Rupert, had essentially for the Snake River council, on a two-week trip into the primitive area of the Salmon river are related by Kenneth Shinn, troop 41, Shoshone, log skinner of "The Explorer's Post."  
According to the log, "everyone gained experience, trail knowledge and insight while taking advantage of opportunities offered by the forestry service. In addition to regular scouting these boys under the supervision of the forest service, built a trail which divided into four crews of four members each.  
Maximum work for each crew was 40 hours. In respect for the work, the forest service provided food, camping equipment and packed all equipment into Leon creek, primitive trail area of the Salmon river.  
Johnson stated that this is probably one of the greatest experiences offered in scouting.  
Johnson's log reported: "Thomas was a handy man to have around. He did a great job, including two cleanings in the pool. He passed on scout advancement and we couldn't have had a better leader. Everybody appreciated his help and patience."  
"Tom" and "Jack" who were with the forestry service, were the two work horses. According to the log: "Tom shot a rattlesnake while out on the trail and took of squirrels. Jack was always playing jokes. They are both well fellows and are going to become full-fledged rangers in the next year," the log says.

### Canyon Ferry Project Draws Excess Labor

Canyon Ferry dam construction is attracting an unwarranted flow of migrant applicants for work, according to J. J. Meeks, manager of the local office of Idaho state employment service. Up to 150 men have been writing, only to meet with disappointment, he added.  
"There are only 175 employed there now, aside from the 34 supervisory employees and office crew, and the peak this year will not exceed 200," Meeks said. Unnecessary hardship and waste accompanies the excessive flow of labor, he notes. Applicants are advised that employment prospects are practically non-existent during 1949 and the total employment in 1950 probably will not reach 800 at any one time.  
Drilling and blasting of the key way for the base of the dam is under way, but bedrock has not been reached, he said. Steel sheet piling for the first cofferdam, on the west bank of the Missouri river, will be started this month. Other preliminary work in the basins of warehouses and dormitories is nearing completion. Dormitory space for 100 men is provided.  
"Ample supply of labor is at hand in all skills anticipated by the contractors as needed," Meeks said. No decision as to continuation of work through the winter has been announced but severe weather will reduce, if not eliminate, employment during at least a few weeks of normal Montana winter, he added.

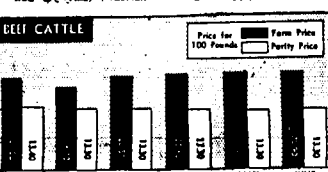

When the Erasmus-spieler finally caught hold of a curve, or drabball, and snapped it between the first baseman and the bag for a two-base hit, the crowd yelled, "Well, land, air, well land!" And each good catch by an outfielder was greeted with cries of, "Well caught, sir, well caught."

In an important game a few weeks ago a question arose as to the legality of a play which means the ball game. No one could decide it to the crowd's satisfaction, so it was agreed to cable the United States for a final decision. To one knew the result of the game until the cabled answer got back.

All of the equipment used comes from the United States, and with the tightening on imports by the union, equipment is precious and tenderly treated. During the game I saw the umpire announce that two new balls had been knocked into the crowd and asked that they be returned immediately.

The crowd reacted just as an American one would.

"Not a chance, sir. Not a chance, sir. Not a chance, sir."

The game I saw brought together the two strongest teams in the union and the standard of play was about that of good college baseball. The hitting was much better than the throwing. The players, mostly all of whom also play cricket, seem yet to break themselves of throwing with the underhand motion of the cricket bowler.

I talked to many of the fans and what they want most of all is to have two teams of American major leagueurs come here and play exhibitions. All agreed that such exhibition games would pack the biggest parks in the United States.

### Hailey Couple to Help Natives Of Atka, Remote Aleutian Isle

By ROBERTA MUEKCHER

HAILEY, Aug. 18.—Mr. and Mrs. Roman W. Kinney and their son, 3½, are leaving Hailey this week to make their home on the island of Atka, in the Aleutians, where they will enter the "jack of all trades" civil service position in the Alaska native service.

Their new home is on a "big" island, 10 miles wide at its widest place, narrowing to a little as 4, and 80 miles long from one extremity to the other. The climate is quite mild, with a temperature between 28 to 30 degrees, and much fog and rain. The growing season is 125 days, for hardy vegetables and flowers.

There is a normal population of about 180 natives on the island. However, at present several are away, working in fishing groups and in canneries. Some 20 students will be in school from the age of 8 to 20. However the present teacher, Mrs. Banks, warned the Kinneys that often the parents come too, and "sit in."

The Kinneys are approaching a new way of life—and from a short talk with them, it was evident they are moving toward it with a great deal of anticipation for the new and probably unusual experience which will be theirs.

Small Jim is highly intrigued with the possibilities he sees in the whole development—and no doubt his later life will be colored by the association he will have in Alaska.

Kinney says from all the information he has been able to collect, the island and one-half hours required in teaching is only a warm-up for the other tasks which will occupy their time.

Weather reports and vital statistics must be kept carefully, the land store must be supervised and the financial and health standards of all the natives are the responsibility of the colonists.

It is easy to envision the problems that may arise in a place where no doctors, nurses, dentists, ministers, peace officers or fire-island transportation, except by emergency plane, will be available. The Kinneys, in their capacity as government representatives, will occupy a place of leadership and their responsibilities also are very great. It is also possible to look through

their eyes and see the reward that will be theirs as they help to make a better life for an important handful of citizens so far from civilization.

The living quarters for the teachers-colonists are modern in every way. Their oil tanks, which supply a five-year supply of fuel. The power plant is portable equipment. A two-year supply of food for all residents in case of emergency, is specially stored—in addition to the vast supplies the Kinneys will take.

In preparation for this work, both Mr. and Mrs. Kinney are supplied with training which should make them well able to do the job. Kinney is a graduate of the University of Utah, and took a part of his college training in Oregon.

In the two schools he has completed majors in chemistry, education, biology, geology and bacteriology. He has taught in Bellefleur, Moore, Hailey and Bells, where he was superintendent the past two years. He is the son of Mrs. Mary Kinney, Blackfoot, who long has been in the field of education in eastern Idaho and who holds the first certificate issued by the state to a librarian.

His wife is the former Letha Kirby, his daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Kibbie, Hailey. She is a graduate of Hailey high school and took her college training at the University of Utah also. She has taught in schools at Pingree, Moore and Bellefleur.

The couple will continue work on Atka, with the exception of the weather or epidemic to the Aleutian islands. In addition to the civil service work there, they will continue to keep records for the MEAL until completion of the survey begun by the group from the University of Michigan.

Not quite dormant volcano "Kilauea" brings a shiver of apprehension down the spine of the adventurous Kinneys who prove their ardent interest and anticipation for their new position, by projecting a stack of information gathered from bulletins, other field notes and many other sources.

Kinney is an enthusiastic sportsman, but admitted he would be reluctant to get too involved with one of those northern bears which track down quarry like bloodhounds. He said he didn't know about them until lately.

Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Myers, formerly of Bellevue, have been in the Alaska native service for the past four years. They made a trip home last summer to visit their parents, Mrs. Lettie Myers and Mr. and Mrs. George D. Campbell, all Bellevue.

They find the life a satisfaction and delight in almost every way—the only drawback being the isolation from home and family. Since they continue on "the same must be worth the candle," say the Kinneys, who know that the history making events possibly will occur in the vicinity of their new home.

The word "almanac" is derived from the ancient Arabian words which mean "the weather" or "climate."

### Quicker Way Found to Get Miracle Drug

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Government health experts said today science has found a new and quicker way to get a miracle drug which cures many of the ills of old age.

But, they emphasized, it will be "many years" before the new procedure, made possible by the production of enough of the drug to go around.

The drug is cortisone, a crystalline substance discovered three years ago. Surgeon-General Leonard A. Scheele told the audience of cortisone actually has cured arthritic cases and has shown good promise in the treatment of rheumatic fever.

Could Reduce Cost  
The cost per unit would be far less than cortisone made from ox bile and production of the drug would be unlimited if enough seeds could be found.

The United States government has sent a scientific expedition to visit the Malaya, Borneo and Sumatra, to search for the rare plant. It will bring plants back to the country where they are transplanted to bear their all-important seeds.

What happens inside the apple to cause water-oozes is fairly simple, Verner says. High temperatures late in the growing season cause a higher sugar content within the apple.

The condition within the apple is easy to detect, Verner says. A water-ooze apple appears transparent and glassy when sliced through. Delay in harvesting reduces the fruit still more and may bring on a water-logged condition.

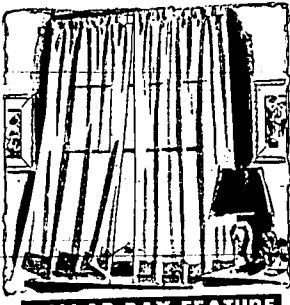

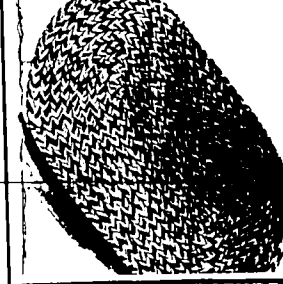

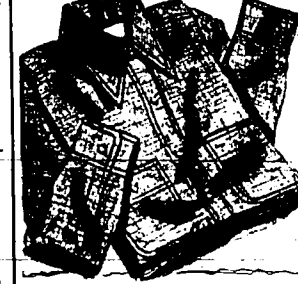
