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Insects Leave Beans; Attack Spud Patches

Damage caused in Twin Falls county bean fields by spider mites and thrips appears to be decreasing; however, a few of the insects are now appearing in potato patches. County Agent C. W. Deligi stated Saturday.

The increase in bean fields is attributed to cooler weather—should a week or 10 days of hot weather appear, more generations of the insects would hatch and damage again is likely to be extensive, according to Deligi.

Bushings Urged

Preventive dusting along the edges of uncultivated fields and along ditch banks and fence rows should be continued, the county agent said.

Conditions Cited

Remedy depends largely upon the stage of the insects and the amount of weeding which surrounds them.

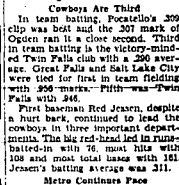

Gooding Men Invent Bean Windrower To Fill Need on Magic Valley Farms

GOODING, Aug. 30—Along with other farm machinery exhibited at the Gooding county fair, is an implement designed by two Gooding county farmers to meet a particular need of Magic Valley agriculture.

A. R. Bishop and his son, Kenneth, spent two years perfecting a windrower for beans. They started three pilot models before arriving at one they considered perfect for its purpose. The Bishops expect full patent rights to be granted shortly.

At an impromptu test and demonstration under difficult conditions, the other farmers, who had learned of the machine had been completed, acclaimed it as the best they had seen. Two of them were so enthusiastic they placed orders for the windrower—another demonstration is scheduled Monday on the Bishop place near here.

The implement will be manufactured by the Van Doran and Keeler machine shop here, thus adding another to the list of farm machinery invented and manufactured in Magic Valley. A. R. Bishop said his price will be about the same as similar machines, but stated it would prove cheaper because it is adapted better to its purpose.

As its special advantages, Bishop said it eliminates chattering of the bean pods, picks up very little dirt with the plants, does not pile or "mop" the beans, works off the power lift of any tractor and is completely adjustable to the crop.

The rake wheels are ground-driven. The machine is built on a triangular frame with row size supported by the tractor and the point carried by two wheels at the rear. Four rake wheels, two on each side, windrow the crop.

The four rake wheels are not geared but operate solely from pressure built up against the crop. The four rake wheels are mounted on the ground, thus eliminating much wear, and for a lighter touch the wheels have a heavier touch.

The tractor's power take-off is used only to raise the implement in transport or in turning around, although it is constructed rigidly, Bishop pointed out, it is light enough for two men to pick it up and mount it on the tractor in about three minutes.

Although designed for beans, it will work for other crops. It will windrow any from an eight-foot width and is designed to handle row crops up to four rows two feet apart.
