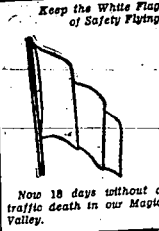

Effects Vary in Elimination of Rent Controls

By The Associated Press

Many people are paying rent increases averaging 20 per cent, according to a survey by the Associated Press.

But a common trend in what happened in rents after ceilings were eliminated is hard to find. Rent increases have ranged from a rare extreme case down to no increase at all.

In some places there were more increases after decontrol, in others there were fewer.

A survey of scattered areas, chosen as a random one or more ago brought the following results:

30 Per Cent Average

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn.—Harry H. Hays, area rent control director, says the highest increase in rents was 30 per cent, several in the neighborhood of 100, average about 20 per cent.

ST. LOUIS, Mo.—No appreciable change except in low-rent Meritland and Negro quarters where hikes were 25 per cent. Numerous increases in apartments, while lower increases in some cases.

BOSTON BEACH, Fla.—Little sign of rent increases since decontrol, but no complaints, no evidence of any evictions.

Fortie Climbs

MILWAUKEE, Wis.—Rent climbed an estimated average of 20 per cent, but was not doubled, and some withdrew services previously given.

SPokane, Wash.—W. H. Williams, head of tenants association, says average increase for more than 20 months was 40 per cent, but may have been doubled, and some withdrew services previously given.

Not Going Crazy

BOISE, Idaho—Chairman Frank Seelye of rent control board says rents are not going crazy, but are going up, although there have been some evictions. Secretary Earl Reynolds of Chamber of Commerce says considerably more rental units opened up after decontrol, previously held by tenants.

RAIL LAKE CITY, Utah—Highest reported rent 40 per cent, average about 10. Evictions probably not more than two per cent. Housing somewhat easier to find because owners had removed some completed from market, previously, apartment house owners association said, representing 80 per cent of city landlords, signed pledge not to raise overall rents more than 10 per cent.

Lie Asks for Big Increase In U. N. Fund

LANCE BUCKNER, N. Y., Aug. 20 (AP)—United Nations Secretary-General Trygve Lie has recommended a \$500 million budget for 1941-1942, an increase over the \$411,328,000 budget for 1940-1941. Lie is expected to claim an increase of \$100 million to \$500 million in the U. N. staff.

The request ran into immediate criticism from the independent committee of "moderate" and "conservative" tendencies in some U. N. departments and urged that \$170,000 be taken from Lie's total estimate.

It suggested that \$125,000 of the cut be made in planned outlays for "staff services and equipment" and that \$45,000 be taken from the budget figure to bring it down to the total for 1940.

Looking at the program as a whole, the committee urged Lie to set in motion an intense review and reorganization of the staff before the U. N. moves into its permanent Manhattan headquarters in the fall of next year.

State Bureau Advises Vets On Problems

A list of suggestions which should be followed by every veteran of any war has been issued by the Idaho state veterans affairs commission, Boise.

Business Involving the discharge from military service recorded by the county recorder. No fee is required. Veterans are advised to put the original discharge certificate in a safe place, for it is irreplaceable if lost.

Copy is Valuable Veterans also should get a certified copy of discharge from the county recorder, or a photostatic copy from a private firm to carry with them. Veterans should know where the original discharge certificate is located as well as place and date of birth, service serial number, veterans administration C-number, government or national service life insurance number, grade and organization in service of the serviceman.

Representative Needed If dealings with the veterans administration are necessary, an authorized representative should be designated and power of attorney should be given to the state veterans affairs agency or to a recognized veterans organization.

Veterans should keep in touch with their representative, and through it with the veterans administration. Notification of every change in location and mailing address and in family status should be made.

Wives and next-of-kin should know the representative in order to call on that representative in any case of emergency.

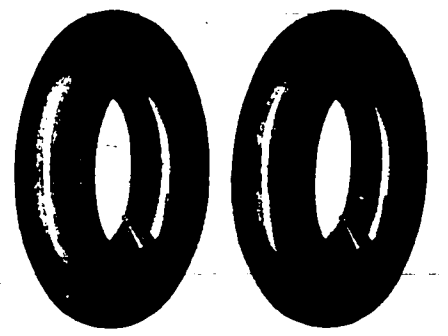

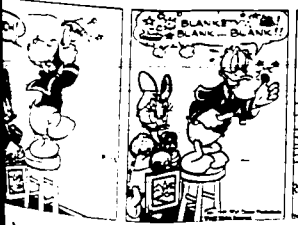

French Forest Fires Brought Under Control

BORDEAUX, France, Aug. 20 (AP)—Forest fires which have killed 75 persons and traced miles of woodland in southwestern France have been brought under complete control, French officials reported today.

The command post of the tarpaulin general of "civil protection," in charge of fighting the fires, said 78 bodies had been found in the forest. Sixty-five bodies were lined up in the Gesteau town hall which is in the Gesteau temporary morgue. Six more were counted in the Marche Puyon town hall and seven in the Robert Puyon hospital in Bordeaux.

Officials said the search for possible additional victims would be continued.

Robins Heard At Meeting of War Mothers

MAIAD CITY, Aug. 21 (AP)—Gov. C. A. Robins delivered the principal address at the opening session of the Idaho War Mothers 17th bi-annual convention at Maiad City Monday.

Mrs. Evelyn Ayers, Postville, Idaho, was War Mothers president. In presiding at business sessions of the three-day meeting which ends Wednesday, delegates from 12 Idaho cities and communities registered for the convention and more than 100 members of the organization attended the opening session.

Commenting upon war, Governor Robins declared, "Unquestionably we can agree on two points: That the war is a most terrible scourge and that there is ample room for doubt as to whether anyone ever actually wins a war."

"Obviously there are victors, yes, but when all the costs have been totaled up, especially as respects the loss of brilliant personalities with untold potentialities and the rude allocations and disruptions which attend upon war, we are aghast at the startling immensity of that total."

In complimenting the war mothers upon their contributions to the war, the governor said, "It has always been my belief that the greatest excuse, if there be any excuse, for the existence of such organizations lies in the service rendered to the disabled service men and to the families of such men."

"We know too well the suffering, monotony and loneliness through which so many go while confined to hospital beds. I believe it is not an overstatement to say that the condition of one's mind plays a major role in accomplishment of the rehabilitation of such men."

"Without the will to go on, without encouragement and thoughtful attention such as your ministrations have supplied, many would falter, remember that no one cares, so why make an effort?"
