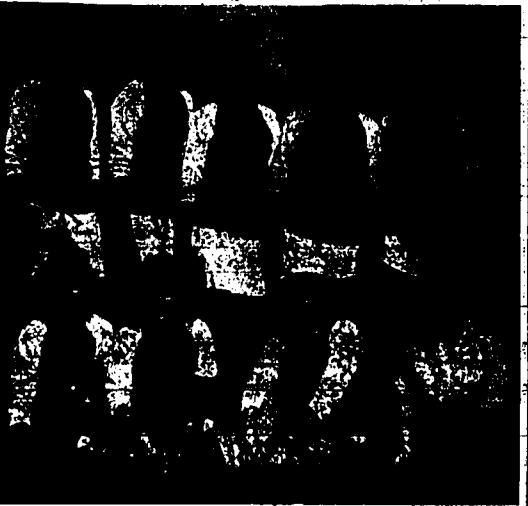

Visits Family He spent the week with his daughters, nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild, but refused to discuss where he had been for 28 years. Whitsett did tell them that he had not married again.

Yesterday, the daughters reported their father was gone again. They did not disclose where he was going or whether he would come back.

Compulsory Education Law

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Idaho: SECTION 1. That Section 21-1501, Idaho Code Annotated, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows: 21-1501. COMPULSORY EDUCATION LAW.—In all districts of this state all parents, guardians and other persons having the care of children shall instruct them or cause them to be instructed in reading, writing, spelling, English grammar, geography and arithmetic. In such districts every parent, guardian or other person having charge of any child between the ages of seven and sixteen years, shall send such child to a public or parochial school for the entire year during which the public schools are in session in such district; provided, however, that if a reputable physician within the district shall certify in writing that the child's bodily or mental condition does not permit his attendance at school, such child shall be exempt during such period of disability from the requirements of this section.
