Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI. If a child shows an odd appetite for eating such as earth, or wood, or the wool of the blanket, the children's specialist should be called in. Often there is an indication of a lack of an essential substance in the child's diet. He has some special food he is trying to satisfy. The physician will understand.

Occasionally a child chooses an odd fruit and vegetable, milk and most meats that most children enjoy. One wants only sweets, another wants only one vegetable, refusing all others. One will take no milk, another no eggs. When this happens, don't force the food but have the child examined by the children's specialist to determine the cause of the peculiarity. Some children are allergic to certain foods which most children take as a matter of course. Only the physician trained in the ways of children can help. Forcing the unwanted food on the child would be a grave mistake.

Healthy children who have been offered a good diet usually accept it. When they do not, it is time to see the specialist. There are some children who are hard to train in table manners. They cling to their milk and fight against any other sort of food. These children must be trained over a period of time to take a little of this vegetable and a pinch of that. Never let much at the start, just a little. In time they learn.

It is common to find a boy or girl who wants to eat meat and nothing else. When he is little he got a taste of meat and liked it and showed his preference as he got the most. Having formed the habit early he clings to it. It was too much trouble for his mother to modify his tastes and he was well set in his habit by the time he was eight or nine—a little time he should have been enjoying a well-varied menu.

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Fate of U. S. Now Linked With Europe

For several days our fate has been tied in with some 2,000,000,000 Europeans.
Last Wednesday the President will do what we think is needed to keep the peace in Europe, from the way to Italy. In return we get the help of all those people for the job. How strong does that make us feel?

First there are 322,000,000 people in Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Great Britain, Iceland, Italy, Luxembourg, The Netherlands, Norway, Portugal and the United States.

Headed by the United States, these nations hold the greatest group of the most important nations the world has ever known. They have led the way through a century to all the refined machines the world now enjoys. Through World Wars I and II, these nations have proved "there is no substitute for brains."

What have these people got to work with, since factories have become as important as guns?
This steel, the most important product in a warlike world. Western Europe has 60,000,000 tons capacity a year and the U. S. has 80,000,000. The Soviets and their satellites have less than western Europe alone.

World Isolate U. S.
Secretary of War Louis Johnson has told congress that "should western Europe be overrun by the power, and should its vast industrial manpower be added to such an aggressor, the United States would stand isolated in a dangerously insecure position."

How happily our Secretary of State Dean Acheson has said—if all this steel is determined to aid any way in the bid there may be to further World War.

How to hold it?
Politically it is now glued together by the pact. But Europe is weak in arms, lacks air fleet. The continent was used for Hitler's purposes for six years. Britain fought the way two years longer than America did and came out almost exhausted.

Community Strength
Now the U. S. proposes to aid three past nations to arm, although the leaders have been known to start a war when they thought their potential victims were getting too strong.

Now again American military leaders think the north Atlantic community has a strength. The combination of atom bomb and Red hammer.

U. S. air force generals told congress that the combination is probably the most important deterrent we have today. At least, they figure the bomb and the Red hammer will give the western world a breathing space in which the U. S. can arm Europe without setting off a "preventive" war from the east.

Johnson urged that this congress vote arms for Europe before it adjourns. He thinks it will take six to ten months just to deliver stuff the U. S. already has in surplus and perhaps until then, and that to deliver arms that will have to be ordered.

He told a committee "congress can appropriate dollars, but it can never appropriate time."

Yale Savant Blames Slums For Juvenile Delinquency

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Aug. 23 (AP)—The Yale sociologist, August B. Hollingshead, said tonight that juvenile delinquents are made, not born, and are almost exclusively the product of the slums.
Also, he said, "careful studies have shown that while solitary delinquency does occur, the first delinquency each child commits is virtually always in the company of others and at their instigation."

Hollingshead, speaking on a "Yale interprets the news" weekly radio program, said delinquency "is transmitted from individual to individual through the learning process. When a boy has been assimilated into the gangs and has acquired the techniques of the criminal, he usually finds gang life so much more fascinating than the daily routine of school and play that he throws himself into this life with high enthusiasm."

Police and the courts, he said, have only a "slight deterrent effect" in combating slum gangs.
In some cases imprisonment or special schools aimed at reform by society merely increase the boy's or girl's prestige, and give him an opportunity to learn new criminal techniques."

Hollingshead said that delinquency follows the same pattern—high in the deteriorated and disorganized areas of the city and low in the organized areas.
Boy gangs, he said, are "cultural bearers of juvenile delinquency."

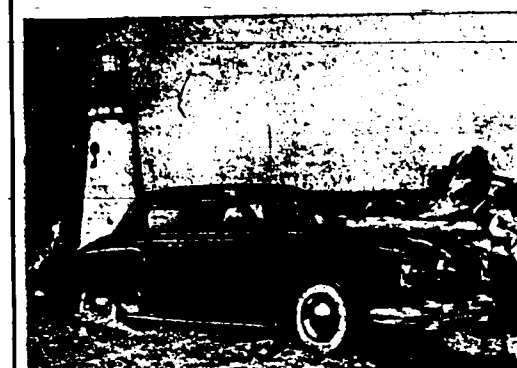
