Opening activities of the five-day event were limited to the judging of 4-H and FFA dairy cows, beef cattle, sheep and swine, and preparations for the judging of antiques, women's wearing apparel and handwork, and 4-H entries of clothing, cooking, canning, freezing and handwork.

The judging started at 9 a.m. and will continue through the afternoon.

All exhibits will be open for public inspection this evening until midnight. The evening's activities will feature the rides and concessions of Ribbard brothers carnival, and farmers will display plenty of activity at all booths and exhibits. All other refreshment stands will be open.

The exhibits include livestock entries of various kinds, fruit, farm produce, poultry, school work, needlework and painting classes, FFA 4-H and juvenile handwork departments, flowers and a complete display of merchandise and souvenirs shown by leading southern Idaho businessmen.

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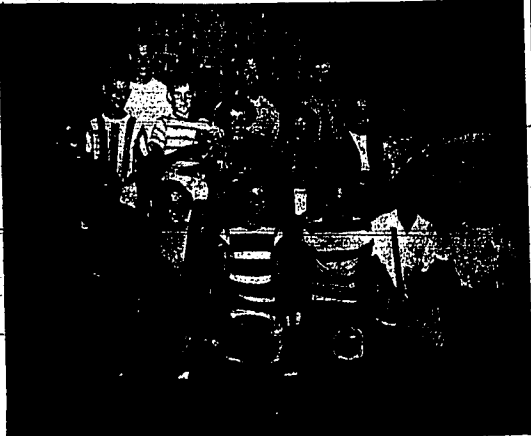

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### Three Major Halls Will Go Up at U. of I.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Aug. 22.—Three major buildings are cutting new notches in the campus skyline. University of Idaho bids on three new buildings will be called soon. Biggest structure is the three-story main campus to be three-story main building, for more than 2000 students. Agricultural students have college of agriculture students have shared crowded quarters with the students in the old home-stead, officially known as Merrill hall.

Disappearing from the campus soon, and from operation and maintenance records are the three dilapidated frame structures formerly used by agriculturists.

**Ready to One Year**

Completion of the agricultural plant buildings is officially scheduled for about Aug. 1. The buildings are already being poured for support of the second floor of the structure. After some repairs to Merrill hall will continue to serve the school of forestry, permitting use of two overflow frame structures. To serve the agronomy department, the building is to be completed renovating the old dairy building.

The same program will be applied during the next year to the old military mill building, a laboratory capable of serving Idaho's important mineral industries.

**Another Old Landmark to Go**

The engineering building, the engineering building, will have to go, according to Fred C. Buchanan, "Because of the doubtful structural safety of the building, the department of public works in 1931, however, and has been going on since then. It is a student structural steel frame to temporary until it can be replaced."

Already under construction as part of the engineering department is an addition to Merrill engineering laboratory. Excavation work has been completed, and plans are being prepared for the foundations. Completion is scheduled for Jan. 31.

**Third Major Project**

Third major building is present under construction is an estimate, three-story addition to the student union building. This is a student financial project with \$60,000 in three per cent revenue bonds to be paid by student fees and funds.

In addition to bids for the new classroom building, which will be called upon for an addition to the administration building, and for a new music building.

Meanwhile, long-delayed attention is also being given to the university's old main building. Work being completed in renovation of the central heating plant, including the installation of a large, high-efficiency boiler to replace two coal-burning boilers. The new boiler will be installed in the basement, and the installation of mechanical coal and handling equipment.

**Acute Water Supply**

To relieve an acute water shortage, drilling operations on a new well are being completed. The well is expected to supply more than 100 gallons of water a minute. Although enjoying one of the highest academic ratings in the nation, the University of Idaho has many projects in the air. The present projects comprise a major "catching-up" job.

Totalling about \$2,000,000 in cost, the projects are financed by a \$2,000,000 authorized last February by the Idaho state legislature, by revenue bonds, and by current budgets.

**18-Year Program**

Called for in the remainder of the 18-year program are some additional new buildings as well as new equipment, and the library. In a recent report, President Buchanan gave particular stress to the need for a library which he called "the heart of the university."

Also in the serious planning stage is a dormitory construction program to be financed by revenue bonds. Delivery of the first rate that replacement of these temporary dormitories would cost \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000.

"There you go again. That's the third dish you have broken this week and this week you've broken one. Your brother can't wash dishes without making a sound or your sister can't hold a dish without smashing it. Out out of the kitchen."

### Rate of Polio Cases Lowers Through U. S.

By The Associated Press  
The nation's 1947 polio cases numbered more than 15,000 today, but the rate of new infections appeared to be slackening. Approximately 2,000 new cases from Aug. 18 to 27 reflected more than a 20 per cent reduction from the previous nine-day period when 2,500 were reported. However, this was still well above the 1,000 cases reported during the first nine-day period of August.

The latest Associated Press survey showed actual declines in new cases reported during the past week in Alabama, Arizona, Illinois, Kansas, Maine and North Dakota. Illinois, with 1,400 cases and 11 deaths this year, is the third state in numerical incidence. Arkansas, too, has been hit hard, with 707 cases and 33 deaths.

Further encouragement came from health officials of nine other states—including the two with the heaviest 1947 case totals—that there was a curtailment of leveling off in new reports of the disease. Massachusetts, Michigan, Nevada, New York, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas and Washington.

New York, with 2,425 cases and 41 deaths topped the list of states. In New York City, where 1,433 of the state's patients and 143 of the dead were reported, the health department declared the epidemic is now in a fluctuating period before an imminent decline.

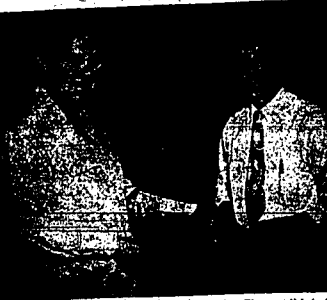
School delays  
There were only three instances of plans to delay school openings because of polio. Milwaukee, Wis., set back its school opening date one week, to Sept. 13, after three years of polio postponement. Some rural Iowa schools were advised to delay opening. In Oklahoma, a few schools planned late opening despite a state health department recommendation that schools open on schedule.

The survey showed 19,021 cases reported in the nation to Aug. 27. This was far ahead of 1946, when 11,600 cases were reported to Aug. 27.

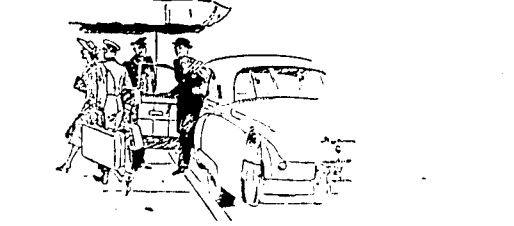

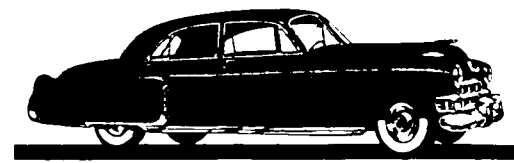
