

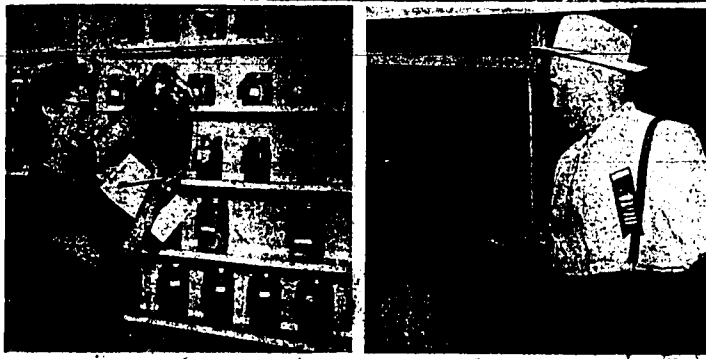

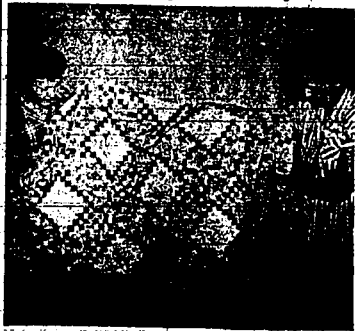

The latest jobs approved for women include assignment as information and education specialist, translator, photographer, photographic laboratory technician, photodupliographer, radio operator, cryptographic code compiler, purchasing agent, commissary assistant and supply clerk. This brings the total number of WAC careers to 111, General Kane said.

Approval of these 111 career-type jobs for enlisted women is another indication of the continuing study in utilization of women which is being made in the postwar army, he added. Participation of enlisted women in the career guidance program offers them opportunities, assurance of advancement and the advantages of interesting and challenging careers, he explained.

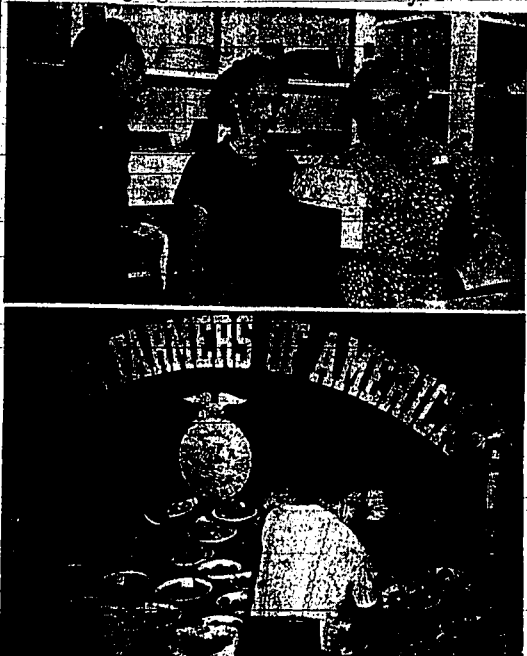

Group Forms To Aid State Nurse Worry

TWIN FALLS, Sept. 1.—An acute shortage of both practical and registered nurses in the state is the state advisory committee for practical nursing declared today at its initial meeting.

Dr. Bruce Budge of Boise was elected chairman of the committee which was formed recently to give the state board for vocational education advice as to expenditures of funds for practical nurse training.

C. Turner, state supervisor of industrial training, said it was the consensus of the committee that it would be necessary to train and license 200 practical nurses each year to maintain current needs.

He termed north Idaho "a vital section." The board attributed the shortage of registered and practicing nurses in that area to the small hospitals and lack of training schools in the area with exception of one at Lewiston.

Turner said nurses had to go to the larger cities—both Spokane and Boise—from northern Idaho.

He said that Cutler is coming here from Kentucky at the invitation of public administration service.

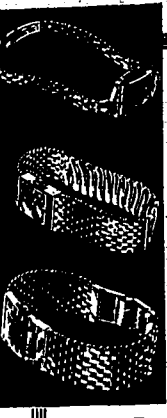

REPORT, Sept. 1—Only by transferring students from Paul and Rupert to the Pioneer district in Minidoka county were the schools able to avoid running on shifts to accommodate the large number of returning students, Suppl. Don Dafoe, said Wednesday.

Some 30 students from Paul and 80 youngsters from Rupert were transferred to the outlying districts to avoid congestion.

An increase of 113 students was recorded this year in the county compared with an enrollment of 2,862 in 1943.

Total in 1944

Increase were noted in the first, second and fourth grades with a slight increase in the sixth grade and decrease in the third and fifth grades. Total enrollment in the elementary grades for this year is 1,401, while 1,343 were recorded for 1943.

The junior high school grades were up and eight total 12 this year, a slight increase over last year's enrollment of 408.

High school students this year number 864, a decided increase over the 609 enrollment of 1943. Rupert high school has the largest enrollment with 477 students, and Aquelea is the smallest high and junior high school with 87 students.

With an enrollment of 406 Lincoln elementary school tops county enrollment, while Minidoka elementary school is the smallest with 20 students.

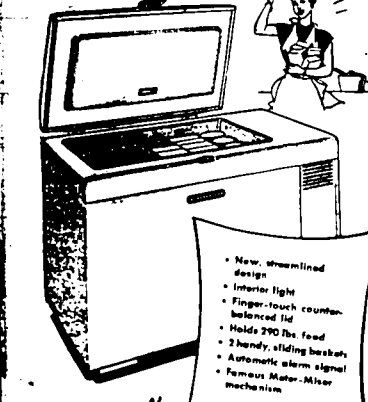
