Kulp Praises River Accord As "Pattern"

BOISE, Sept. 9 (AP)—State Republican Representative H. H. Kulp today said that the Snake River compact negotiations between Idaho and Wyoming provide a pattern for agreements that will permit "local development of the northwest in an orderly manner."

A draft of the proposed compact distribution of the upper Snake river to Idaho and Wyoming and two states will be submitted to the bi-state negotiating committee at its next meeting, probably in early October.

Kulp said he was confident of the compact approval by the commission in substantially the form it was worked out by a drafting committee, which he said, he believes, will be effective, however. It must get the approval of the Idaho and Wyoming legislatures and congress. In any event, it was not expected to go into force before the end of 1941.

"This compact," Kulp said in an interview, "is a fine example of what men of good will can do for the benefit of the northwest can do to reach agreement on questions of local development."

Even though the compact enabling legislation is discussed, he was under no impression that it would be passed on an informal but serious basis. He said he would be prepared to present a proposed compact draft, but the Idaho members balked, and the Wyoming members balked, and the compact is not yet passed.

Finally, on Jan. 27 of this year, Governor Robins approved the compact and the Snake river commission bill and from that time on negotiations proceeded rapidly.

A tentative agreement finally was reached at Pocatello last month for the Snake river compact. It calls for the construction of a dam at the mouth of the water in the Snake and Snake rivers passing the Idaho-Wyoming boundary. 2 Die, 6 Hurt As Big Plane Hits in Marsh

FAIRFIELD, Calif., Sept. 3 (AP)—A pilot and his co-pilot tried to land a crippled C-47 "Twin Otter" on a marsh and were killed last night after six others had parachuted to safety.

The giant air force plane crashed in flames.

Two of the survivors were wounded and four were passengers.

One of the crew members, Tech. Sgt. Kermit B. Carlson, reported the accident to the Fairfield-Stinson air force base by telephone shortly after he reached the ground near Bird's landing.

Last to Jump

He told officers he believed he was the last to jump and that the pilot and co-pilot remained with the ship.

Survivors were taken to the Fairfield-Stinson air force base hospital for observation. There were no known injuries.

One badly burned body was found about 50 feet from part of the wreckage.

The crash was first sighted by Capt. Marsh Evans, piloting United Airlines flight 218 from Salt Lake City to San Francisco.

Evans said he saw a large fire on the ground surrounded by small fires.

Map Was Wrong

He first thought it was the steel mill at Pittsburg, but when he checked his map he found it was out of position.

Ground crews reaching the scene said the wreckage was driven over nearly a mile. The plane, apparently attempting a forced landing, hit a drainage ditch and plowed through a marshy field. Visibility was reported good.

The plane was en route from Lovry airport in Denver to the naval air station at Alameda, Calif., on San Francisco bay. It crashed about 30 miles from its destination.
