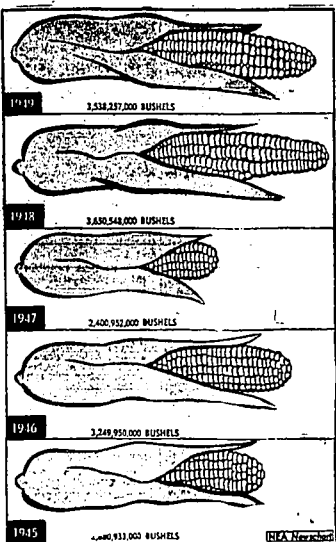

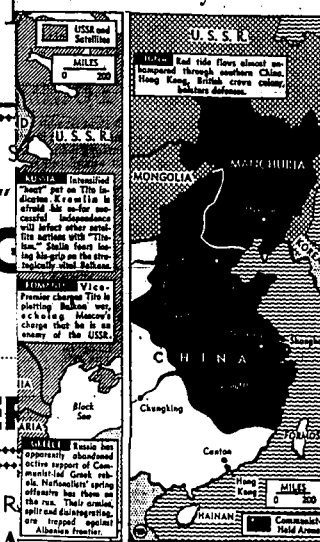

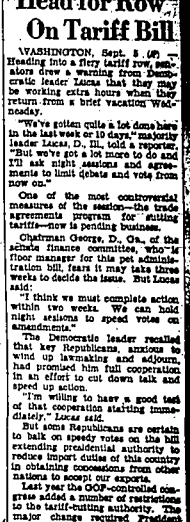

### Reich in Bad Shape, Local Woman Finds

While on a 90-day assignment in vocational home economics, Florence Shultz, Twin Falls county home demonstration agent, visited Switzerland, France, Austria and Germany, with headquarters in Stuttgart, Germany.

In her work, Miss Shultz visited industrial, agricultural and home economics teacher-training institutions and was in close contact with the teachers and students in schools and institutions. She saw home economics displays, research laboratories and home economics manufacturers and inspected approximately 70 schools.

"As soon as I landed in Frankfurt, I began to feel the destruction," she said. "The people were poorly dressed and had a poor mental attitude. They looked what they were—defeated."

Miss Shultz visited one recreation center where the wealthy Germans spent their vacations. They were sorry and seemed to have no interest in life," she said.

The attitude of the people in Stuttgart was different, Miss Shultz said. "They were working and had more pep and enthusiasm. The food situation there was much better and the crops good."

The German countryside is beautiful, she said. There are lovely forests and woods and good roads. "I pointed immediately that women work in the fields from early in the morning until late at night," she added.

"Their methods of farming are crude and backward," she said. "They still use ox carts and they use scythes for cutting hay."

Miss Shultz gave demonstrations to women's groups in connection with extension service and agriculture. She visited many homes which she found to be more or less shabby for displaced persons and refugees.

"Some people live in basements," she said. "For it was the only part of buildings left after bombing."

Meat, butter, eggs, beans and cheese are still rationed in Germany, Miss Shultz found. The rationing camps were depressing.

"Some large families had been there six or seven months," she said. "When clothing was distributed there was never enough for the occupants of the camps."

She also went to Dachau, a concentration camp near Munich, and saw the gas chambers and ovens used by the Nazis during the war.

"The home economics system in 75 years before the times," she said. "In most of the schools I visited, I saw the Hoover feeding program being carried out. In one school there were more than 40 packages of supplies from Lewis and Clark school in Spokane."

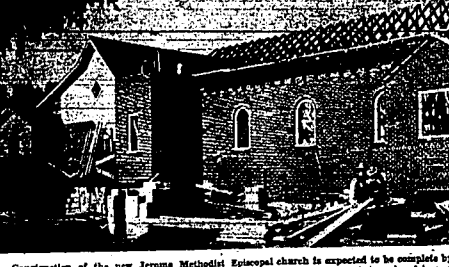
