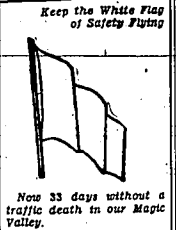

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Wool Growers Okay Uniform Rate on Wages

BOISE, Sept. 6 (UP)—The western Idaho wool growers have agreed on a uniform wage of \$17 a month for shearers and campers, the Idaho Wool Growers Bulletin announced today. The agreement will become effective Oct. 1.

Record Hops Pushed Odom Into Spotlight

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (AP)—Bill Odom stepped into the news when Milton Heywood, gun manufacturer, got the veteran pilot to take his 8-ounce plane over the army bombs, around the world.

Before that, the 39-year-old, lanky blond aviator had flown the Burma hump as a pilot for a Chinese airline and as a ferry for a Chinese mail line, making a number of numerous very crossings of the Atlantic.

Coming off to the "Bombardier" after numerous fails because of weather and Odom's controlled troubles, Odom piloted the big plane around the world and on April 18, 1941, set a new record of 78 hours and 55 minutes.

Trained in 12 hours

The previous a.d. world record, set by Howard Hughes, was 15 hours and 21 minutes longer.

In May, 1940, Odom jumped between New York and Toronto and back, alone in the plane, and claimed his time on each trip was the fastest on record.

He made it from New York to Toronto in an hour and 15 minutes, and on the way back cut five minutes off his time.

Sole Hop Around Globe

In August of that year, Odom finished a solo flight around the world in the same plane, making the 19,846-mile trip in 191 days and 15 minutes to set another world record.

On Jan. 12, 1940, trying for a non-stop record he was shot down from Honolulu to New Jersey, Odom had to land at Oakland, Calif. But he secured with another record—a distance record for light planes of 3,775 miles.

He promptly announced he would try again to fly non-stop from Honolulu to the east coast.

Non-Stop 1,000 Miles

On March 8, 1940, he made it. He landed at Waterloo, N. J., 1,000 miles from his take off at Honolulu and holding another record.

On March 21, the National Aeronautics association, officially approved his record as the "Hawaii to New York"—the "greatest non-stop solo distance flight in the history of aviation."

He had been discussed as by Charles A. Lindbergh in a radio broadcast from New York to Paris and the late Wiley Post—1943 miles from New York to Berlin.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (AP)—Senator O'Mahoney, D., Wyo., said today a survey shows 34 states need \$20,000,000 worth of work done on their roads.

O'Mahoney named Idaho among the 34 states, and said that this state needs \$22,000,000 worth of work done on its roads.

Other northwest states on the O'Mahoney list and the amount of work needed on their roads include Nevada, \$27,750,000; Oregon, \$46,000,000; Utah, \$27,628,000; Washington, \$40,148,000; and Wyoming, \$23,000.

O'Mahoney, chairman of the joint congressional committee on the economic report, said this backlog will afford an unmeasured market for business and industry.

"Everyone is aware of the depreciation of the American road system during and following the war," O'Mahoney said in a statement, "and few, I am sure, appreciate the tremendous backlog of essential work which has piled up."

As chairman of the joint congressional committee, O'Mahoney recently sent inquiries to the governors and highway authorities in every state to determine their highway construction and repair needs.

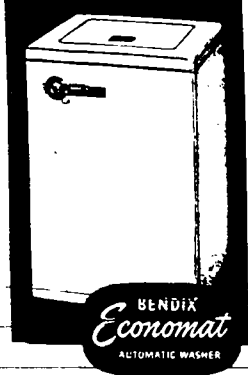
