

# Idaho Power Company Completes Largest Plant at Lower Salmon

Idaho Power company today announced that it has completed its largest power plant, a 100,000-kilowatt plant at Lower Salmon. The plant, which cost \$10,000,000, is the largest of its kind in the West. It will produce 100,000 kilowatts of power, enough to supply the needs of the entire state.

"These new hydro-electric installations have doubled the company's generating capacity," T. E. Koch, Idaho Power president, said. "These installations, together with existing plants, will supply the entire state with power."

The first of three generators arrived this week and installation will be completed by the latter part of October. The second unit is scheduled for service in November and the third in January, 1949.

### Stairway Fall Is Blamed for Death on Ship

BOSTON, Sept. 8 (AP)—A boat mate said today that a Dallas, Tex., debutante was killed on her mid-Atlantic boat as she and her male companion fell backward down a stairway, their arms around each other.

The American export line steamship Esquilbur docked today with her crew at half mast, carrying the body of Adrienne Atwell, 26, who was returning from a holiday cruise in Europe.

An eye-witness account of the tragedy was told to newsmen by the steerman's mate Luis Rivera, 36, of San Juan, Puerto Rico.

**Raw Couple**

Rivera said he had gone on duty 4 1/2 hours last Saturday night and was chatting with one of his crew when he saw the girl and Robert M. Willard, 21, also of Dallas, stand a narrow stairway with his arm around her waist and her arm around his back.

He said they passed from his view as the stairs and then he heard a scream.

Both, he said, came tumbling down backward, the girl landing across a young man's body on this modern deck.

Put in Deck Chair

Rivera said he picked her up and carried her in a deck chair because he feared the weight of her body would shut off the man's breathing, after both victims were removed to the hospital area.

The girl, granddaughter of Federal Judge William H. Atwell, died Tuesday and was buried in Dallas.

Doctors described her condition as "fatal" but added it was "too early" to make a definite statement.

The Esquilbur's master, Captain M. O. Crowe, Boston, said the tragedy was plainly an accident.



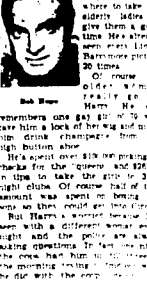

### Requirements Are Reduced For Training

Veterans now may take flight training under the GI bill of rights without necessarily submitting to the veterans administration completion justification that the course will be taken in connection with their present or contemplated business or occupation, according to William Brown, manager of the Twin Falls VA office.

That change in flight training policy was signed into law August 29 by the President. Public law 266 is the independent offices appropriations act of 1949, which provides VA's appropriation for the fiscal year starting July 1, 1949.

**Affidavits Needed**

Instead of complete justification, a veteran planning to take GI flight training now may submit to the VA a certificate in the form of an affidavit signed by him, and corroborated by two competent disinterested persons. The affidavit must show that flight training will be useful to him in connection with his business or occupation, or the absence of substantial evidence to the contrary. VA will accept the affidavit as constituting compliance with the law.

Along with affidavits, the veteran also must submit a certificate showing that he is physically qualified for flight training, in accordance with civil aeronautics administration standards, to obtain the type of license that will enable him to obtain his employment objective.

**Formal List**

The corroborating affidavits must contain the following items: Identity of the applicant for GI bill flight training; the character of the relationship between the veteran and the person supplying the affidavit; the basis and source of asserted knowledge of the matters to which the person supplying the affidavit is testifying; and a statement of the flight training under the GI bill may be in connection with their present or contemplated business or occupation, as required by the new law.

**Case Law**

With the exception of flight training, public law 266 continues for the first time the restrictions on avocational and recreational training, which first went into effect July 1, 1949.

The law specifies that no part of the appropriation may be used to pay the course and the instructor of avocational or recreational training.

### Death Claims Famed Reich Composer 85

GARMONCH—PARTENKIRCHEN, Germany, Sept. 8 (AP)—Richard Strauss, famed-German composer died at his home here today at the age of 85.

He had been ill for weeks with a kidney ailment and angina pectoris.

Strauss was best known for two of his operas, "Der Rosenkavalier," completed in 1910, and "Salome." He also composed a number of tone poems, symphonic concertos to cooperate with 100 selections for voice and piano.

Although a German, he was not related to the famous Viennese Strauss family of whom the waltzing Johann is best known.

**Started Early**

Born in Munich, Richard Strauss, first born player in the Munich court opera. By the time he was 10, Richard had composed several preliminary selections. Two of them, "The Festival March" and "Theremata for Wind Instruments," were published.

Strauss made two visits to the United States. On the first in 1904, he produced his "Sinfonia Domestica," but the reception was not too favorable. He returned in 1923 as guest conductor of the New York philharmonic and Philadelphia orchestras.

**Smelled Nails**

Strauss continued to compose during World War II. The Nazis tried to make him their No. 1 composer and producer, but he refused to cooperate with 100 selections for voice and piano.

Later in 1945, Strauss left Germany for Switzerland and settled down to await the outcome of his denazification trial. A Munich court cleared him of all charges and held that he had taken no part in Nazi movement and received no benefit from it.

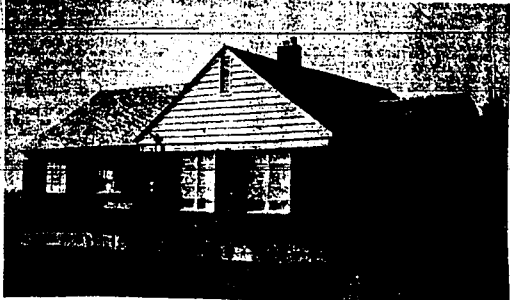

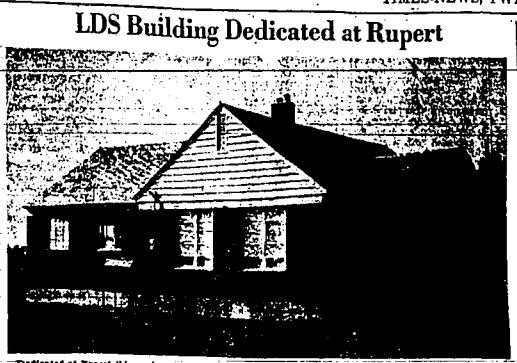

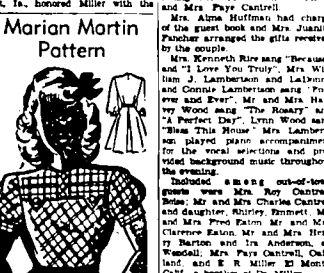

### Russians Hint Charge Filing Against Slavs

LANSING, Sept. 8 (AP)—Russia indicated today it may carry the charge with Marshal Tito in the United Nations of the U. N. protection for Albania against alleged Yugoslav and Greek attacks. The Moscow broadcast article in the authoritative publication News Times charges that Yugoslavia and Greece were in league to seize and partition Albania between them. "Both Greece and Yugoslavia are committing weekly 'provocations' against Albania's territory and southern borders," Moscow charged. Since early August these attacks have been coordinated and "conducted" by an emissary from one center—the Soviets asserted.

"It is the direct duty of the United Nations to call to order the open force of the League of Nations," Moscow said. "Those who follow Hitler in the attempt to seize the Balkans are attacking our neighbors and for the seizure of their territories are putting a challenge to its freedom-loving mankind."

May Best French Observers said the Moscow broadcast indicated the Russians may try to force Yugoslavia to accept the charges of a Soviet threat to peace by charging Marshal Tito with the same delinquent against Albania. Possibly that both Russia and Yugoslavia anticipate a showdown battle before the United Nations when the general assembly opens in New York on Sept. 20 as was reported that both will send extremely strong delegations.

"The police never used any force against me as I was walking during the concert," he said. "My investigation fails to show that any force was used against any of the concertgoers."

## Work on City Roads During Summer Told

An extensive amount of painting, grading and leveling and tacking and sealing of Twin Falls city streets has been done by the city, according to Commissioner Arnold P. Cross reports.

This work has been done by streets department personnel although some equipment has been rented for the projects, Cross said. No contracts were let to outsiders. On June 30, the city council divided the streets and water departments. H. H. Ballinger was placed in charge of the newly formed streets division. Charles F. Larson was named head of the water department.

Painting and sealing has been done on three blocks of Third avenue south, Elizabeth boulevard from Blue Lake boulevard to Madonna street; Buchanan street from Heyburn avenue to Piler avenue, and Heyburn avenue from Buchanan street to Blue Lake boulevard.

The process consists of applying rock salt which penetrates from three-fourths of an inch to one inch. One-half gallon of oil is used for a square yard of surface. Traffic is kept off the surface. Three tenths of a gallon of cutback, non-penetrating oil, is then applied for the next yard of surface on top of the oil previously applied. While the oil application is in progress, the rock chips are applied to complete the seal.

South Park avenue has been sealed from the Rhoads street bridge through 10th street and to Elizabeth street. An added fill was made on South Park avenue which had been graded up in some places as much as one foot. Oil was then applied and the street was sealed.

Heyburn street has been tacked but not sealed. The final process was not made as previously applied because of further application unnecessary.

Two-inch thickness of road mix will be applied in the 100 block of Third street south; Main street, from Addison street to past Heyburn avenue; Piler avenue west, Piler avenue to First street and about five blocks in the middle of Heyburn avenue west.

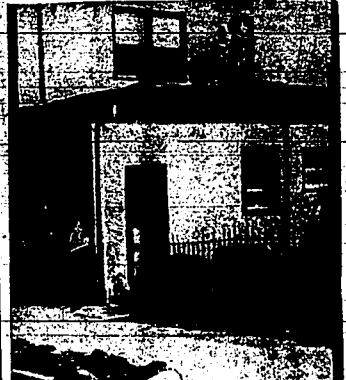
The grade was raised 18 inches on the scales of Piler avenue.

An estimated 4,000 square yards of painting and repairs have been done at street intersections and at broken places in streets. Much of the painting was pre-made near the city storage barn at the end of

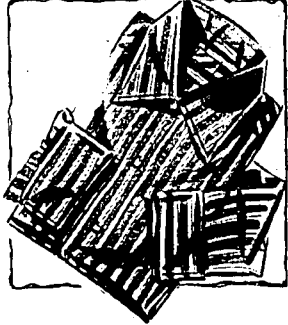
