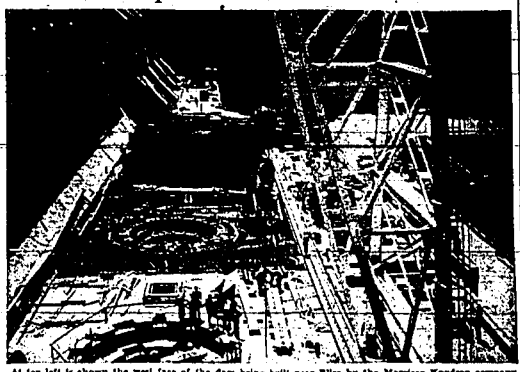
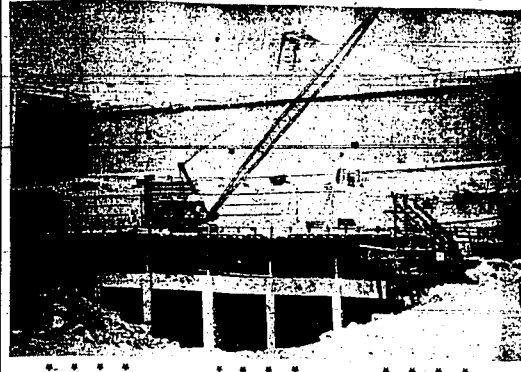

Even before the eye can take in all these things, it's drawn to the mighty Snake, where the nearly completed dam sits calmly in the midst of the turbulent water. Road Reserve

"I am in New York to make a picture," she said, and had nothing to say about anything else.

Her 9-year-old son by a previous marriage was with her. Elliott, son of the late President Roosevelt, was unavailable for comment. His secretary, a Miss S. Y., said he was out of town and is not expected back today.

COLUMBIA, Miss., Sept. 12 (AP)—Flower petals dropped by military planes today marked the grave of Bill Odum, whose brilliant flying career was cut short last year in a crash at the Cleveland air race.

Odum, who at 29 held five world aviation records, was buried yesterday at Friendship cemetery near the ranch where he had wanted to live when his flying days were over.

Her figure—33 inch bust, 22 inch waist, 34 inch hips—gave her a first place in the bathing suit division. The girls also appeared in evening gown.

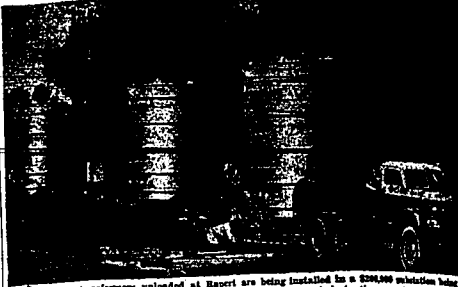

Power Firm Adds Equipment To Serve Land Developments

Transformers and steel structural material have been received in Buhl for the construction of an Idaho Power company substation, according to R. W. Carpenter, division manager of the company.

Plans to construct the substation, which will cost about \$200,000, were made to complete the company's facilities which provide power for irrigation pumping in the rapidly developing agricultural area north of Rupert and Paul, where some 7,000 acres of newly reclaimed land are producing wheat, beans, potatoes and other crops.

Power company lines were built to serve the area, but during the past two seasons the Mindoka project substation has been used for developing the 13,000 volts of the company's main transmission system to the 11,000 volts required for distribution to the project.

This arrangement will be continued throughout the present irrigation season and the new substation is to be put into service next year.

Large scale irrigation pumping is being done electrically at nine wells serving the Julian Clifton farm. It takes about 11 hours to pump 100 tons of water.
