Dane Studies Magic Valley Methods of Raising Beets, Potatoes for Home Use

Age Nielsen, Pym, Denmark is studying farming methods in Magic Valley so he can use American ideas on his father's farm in Denmark.

Nielsen has been in the United States for six months. He was in Idaho, Neb., for three months and then traveled in California, Oregon and Washington studying agriculture.

He came to Twin Falls from Walla Walla, Wash., and is trying to find a suitable job now so he can spend his days inspecting farm equipment. He plans to stay in this area until Christmas and in the United States until next fall.

"Because we raise beets and potatoes in Denmark, I am particularly interested in that type of farming," he said.

Nielsen said there are not many tractors used in Denmark as here. "Our farms are not so big," he said. "We can't use a hay baler in Denmark because there is more rainy weather and the hay must be put in barns. It is much easier the way you do it here."

Nielsen is studying farming methods all over the United States and especially the parts of the country where the crops are similar to those raised in Denmark.

"I am surprised that I like the country as much as I do," he said. "People are very friendly. I don't find the people strange—just about like Danes."

Nielsen admitted that he likes the people of the middle west and was better than easterners "because they don't talk so much about money."

In Denmark we work more with the ground than you do here," he said. "We should use more machinery. There is equipment here that we could use in Denmark and should use it."

Nielsen added that more help on Danish farms is needed because of the lack of equipment. His father's farm is 120 acres requiring three hired men all year.

"Our farm buildings are made of brick and are much better than the ones here," he said. Nielsen will take over the management of his father's farm when he returns to Denmark.

During the war the Germans used the farm and 1000 acres of surrounding farmland as an airport.

"All of the farms are back in the hands of their owners now," he said.

"I was not on anybody's payroll," he said. "and right now I am unemployed."

He added that although he still regards himself as a communist, he no longer has any formal ties with the party.

"I have not been able to talk to Joe Stalin and find out if he still loves me," he said.

Browder was dropped as the American communist leader in 1943 after criticism that he was an "apologist for capitalism." He was ousted from the party in 1946.

The health service said that with only Pennsylvania unreported, the number of cases last week was 3,119, compared to 3,119 the previous week.

Pennsylvania was expected to raise the total to about the 2,700 mark. This would make the third straight week that the number of cases declined.
