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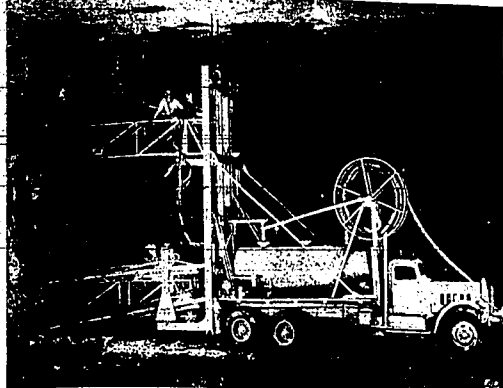

### Gooding's County Agent Warns of Skinned Potatoes

Gooding, Sept. 11.—Skinned potatoes will suffer discrimination, reports Gooding County Agent Robert E. Higgins. He has been recommending that potatoes be more than "moderately skinned" surfaces be rejected.

Modestly skinned means that not more than 10 per cent of the potatoes in any case lot have more than one-half of the skin missing or feathered, Higgins explained. To meet this requirement it will be necessary for potato growers to harvest mature potatoes before they reduce skinning and to hasten maturity on potatoes. Higgins suggested late irrigations should be light, use of a vine beater or vine puller, waiting at least 10 days after the removal before digging, packing, digging and using care in harvesting.

Higgins said bags to 46 pounds instead of 68 pounds. Watching the harvesting operations carefully will save farmers money as well as helping the potato market, the county agent added.

### Fast Service Started Here On Telegrams

Twin Falls is receiving the benefits of "wire-modern communications" as the local office of the Western Union high speed service opened at Los Angeles, Sept. 15, said local manager, said Saturday.

The \$200,000 streamlined center at Los Angeles features an "electrical brain" which eliminates manual transmission of telegrams and cables and all others with much greater speed and efficiency. The new automatic method places at the fingertips of the local operator circuitry connecting all parts of the country, said Saturday.

Old Method Slow

Until Sept. 7, telegrams from Twin Falls were transmitted to Salt Lake City, where they were received in the form of words printed on tape and the tape carried to message blanks. Messages were carried then to the proper trunk line operators, who retyped them to the local office and in many cases, to another center where the whole process had to be repeated.

Now these time-consuming steps have been eliminated, said Saturday. Each telegram is now sent to the point of origin, and then will speed to its destination without manual retransmission.

Use Call Letters

The Twin Falls operators will transmit a message will type two "call letters" at the beginning of each telegram. These letters will automatically route the message to its destination.

In the case of a telegram addressed to Detroit, for example, the Twin Falls operators type the letters "DT" which flash to the switching center at Los Angeles. The "electrical brain" then automatically selects the Detroit wire over which the message will flash to that city in less time than it takes to deliver the message. The speed at which electrical impulses travel is 180,000 miles a second, the speed of light.

Performer Used

An incoming telegram from Twin Falls will be received at the Los Angeles switching center on a perforator which simultaneously prints the telegram and punches combinations of holes on a paper tape.

A clerk, seeing the destination of the tape, will press a pushbutton marked "Twin Falls." This will cause the perforator tape to run through a transmitter which automatically sends the message to this city.

The new giant automatic telegraph center at Los Angeles is one of 13 high-speed communication centers in Western Union's new nationwide network now being rushed to completion, said Saturday.

### Third Generation Continues "Dairy Tradition" for Family

BURLEY, Sept. 17.—After weeks of completion of a modern, up-to-specification grade dairy barn on the William Gochounour farm, the 15-year Gochounour dairy tradition is being carried on by the third generation.

With a third generation of dairymen coming up, there is little doubt the Gochounour milk will appear on milk bottles here for many years to come.

Gochounour, young rancher and dairyman, has a fine herd of Holsteins and Guernseys cows. The milk is sold through a dairy operated by his brother, Blair Gochounour. Blair's dairy herd now that the new barn is completed, sharing the pride of the new barn are Will Gummerson and Irwin Gummerson, who built it.

John and Jerry Gochounour, young sons of Mr. and Mrs. William Gochounour, have a great interest in dairy cattle, and as their FFA projects they each have two registered Holsteins.

They have been working under the supervision of Blair Gochounour, high school instructor, Keller, who has shown considerable interest in bringing his class out to see the barn, since his class is a model dairy.

But it's natural for Bill Gochounour and his sons to be interested in dairying and dairy improvement. Blair's father, John Gochounour, from Pennsylvania, where every farmer is also a dairyman. He came to Burley in 1915 and with his brother, Albert, operated one of the first dairies in the community. Dairying was different those days, before electric milking, mechanical bottling machines and delivery trucks.

The elder Gochounour brothers operated a dairy on a ranch located just north of the Bill Gochounour ranch. All of that area now is a barbed wire dairy building, a gravel pit in later years.

In the early days of dairying, the Gochounour milked 100 cows by hand and delivered the milk to Burley residents in a canteen. Later, as motor transportation developed, trucks were used.

Just north and across the ranch from the Bill Gochounour ranch lives Blair Gochounour, who is actively engaged in the wholesale and retail dairy business. At this ranch, the milk is scientifically put in bottles of cardboard cartons, a far call from the big gallon milk-pails used as a Dutch kitchen.

To meet the specified requirements, the barn has hot and cold water, concrete floors and manure, with the milk room apart from the milking room. The drainage system provides for easy cleaning, and the rooms are kept as clean and spotless as a Dutch kitchen.

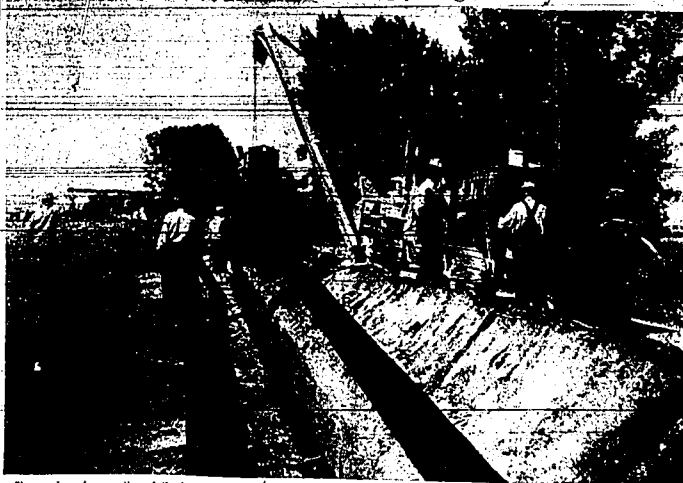

### Pipeline Crews at Burley Work Fast; Expect to Be in Boise Before Winter

By CASILDA STEELSMITH  
BURLEY, Sept. 17—Pushing work toward completion before cold weather sets in, workers on the 20-mile Salt Lake-Boise refinery pipeline assembly the pipe sections and lay them with amazing speed, and the latter part of this week will find the heavy machinery working on the desert between Burley and Murtaugh.

Crews are progressing from two separate points, Salt Lake City and Burley. Workers here say the pipeline has stretched about 25 miles from Salt Lake City at this time.

The Burley section of the pipe work started near Unity, and travels the direct line west to the end of the project, across the desert, then east. Murtaugh Pipe already is working along the route near the road which runs a mile south of Hansen and Kimberly.

The \$6,000,000 pipeline project involves digging trenches and stringing the pipe along the bank of the ditch. The 40-foot pipe sections are welded together preparatory to placing them in the trench. The pipe is specially treated with some coating to prevent erosion.

Smith Contracting corporation is laying the pipe the 100 miles from Salt Lake City to Burley, and the second section, to Boise, is being constructed by the Oklahoma Contracting company, Dallas, and Chief-Ishtar Construction company, Los Angeles.

After the eight-inch pipe is laid along the surveyed route, heavy dig-

gers follow and scoop out trenches of various depths, the deepest about five feet, depending upon the lay of the land.

Workers follow to join the sections of pipe.

Then a self-propelled machine, encircling the pipe, automatically buries the pipe, gives it a prime coat of seal, and wraps the pipe with a second self-propelled machine, which also "rides" the pipe.

The second machine also gives the pipe a second seal-coat. Men, holding a balancing pipe, walk beside the self-propelled machines to balance them. The pipe is then lowered into the trench and covered by shovel and "cat" operators.

Following along the path of construction is the "dope" crew which constantly keeps a supply of hot seal coat ready for the pipe. The "dope" heating machine is kept hot all night in order to keep the seal coat at proper temperature.

Private driveways into ranches, ditches, and roadways slow the work considerably, workers say. At these points, sections of pipe are welded together and left for hand crews to put together.

The ends of the main pipe are plugged until the insert sections are ready to be put in. Many workers are put on the insert section work as ranchers will be inconvenienced for only a few minutes while the sections are placed under their driveways.

At the end of the refinery property in Salt Lake City, a pumping station is being erected from which the oil will be pumped to a high point about 20 miles east of Burley, and from there gravity will carry it on to Boise, where a second pumping station is being built.

When the work of laying the pipe reaches the desert, the men expect to complete between two and three miles of work a day, which is considerably more than they are now doing.

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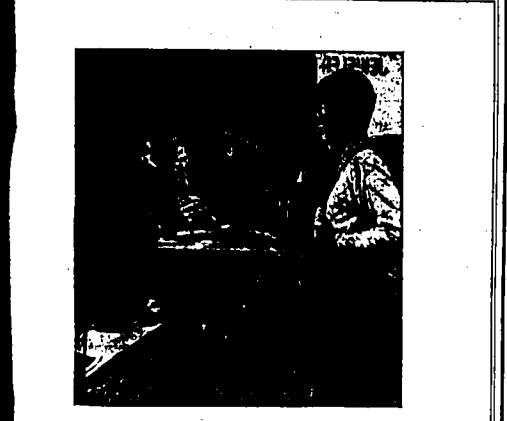
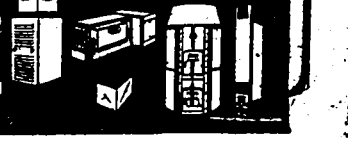
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### Honor Gained By Boy Scout Of Malta Unit

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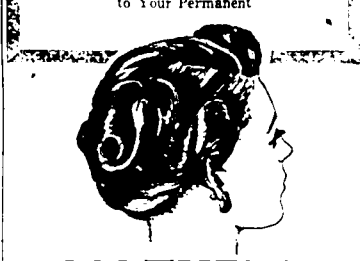
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
