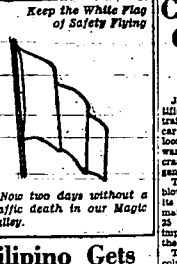




### Ray Banbury, Buhl, Killed in Farm Mishap

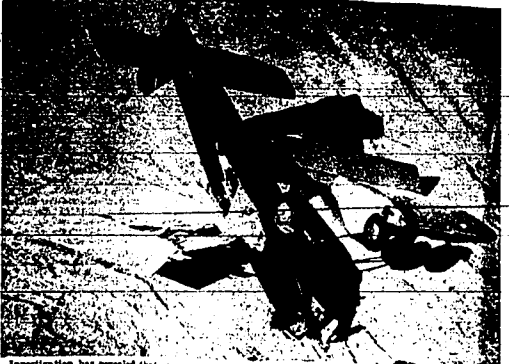
### Effect Varied In Value Cut On Currency

WASHINGTON (NEA) — An reporter who has covered the navy department and Pentagon since the way knows how politics and insight is the navy's probe into the matter of who helped Cedric R. Worth write his anonymous letter.

As it is more serious has merely awarded the air force round one in the fight. Air force officials and Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson stand completely cleared of charges that there were abnormal relations in connection with the purchase of B-35s. And although the navy is making a temporary and undignified retreat by making Worth the scapegoat, most navy officers don't think that the matter is settled by a long shot.

Worth ever became special assistant to the undersecretary of the navy, the carrier, B-16 purchase had already reached the point where public interest was being hurt and the effectiveness of the service was being impaired. A person found it difficult getting any sense out of any without some official, general or civilian official, attempting to get in some bars against the other service or the making of strategic bombing.

Before anyone had ever heard much of Cedric Worth they were reading in the papers most of the charges that appear in his letter. That is an obvious point that has been brought out but so far ignored by the navy's investigation. Worth's paper clippings and several witnesses who have admitted that they supplied other information to him.

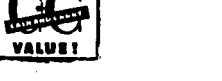

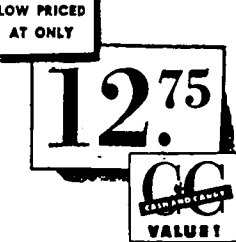

### City Contracts Are Awarded On Jobs, Fuel

Sounding an appeal for "help from Idaho" for the USO, young men and women now in the armed forces, George E. Demman, Boise, state director of the Service Organizations, Inc., considered here Monday with Community Chest funds on the part of the USO will play in the chest's 1942 campaign. The normally active USO is now a Community Chest fund as a participating member, Demman said. Since the reactivation of the former wartime agency, continued cooperation is sought with various chest units.

**USO Expansion**  
"Since the President and the office of national defense called for reactivation of the USO in 1941," Demman explained, "chest units have gone forward rapidly for putting the USO back in the national security picture."  
"As of this date the USO is operating 170 units in the United States and 19 overseas, the nearest having just opened in Oklahoma."

"While the USO is worldwide in scope, it is the welfare of our young men and women in uniform that the state USO is primarily interested in and in which every Idahoan should be interested."

**USO in Service**  
"Selective service records show 8,886 men and women from Idaho now serving throughout the world. Of this number are from Twin Falls county."

USO units are established and maintained in states or areas where large military establishments are located, Demman added. Their services are available to all members of the armed forces.

**General Over Youth**  
"What the President, the office of national defense and military and naval authorities are concerned with at the moment is the youth of our uniformed men and women. It is estimated that 80 per cent of them are under 18, the crucial period of their lives," he said.

Community chests, he added, are the USO, but their contributions will account for only a part of Idaho's goal of \$6,000. The remainder necessarily must come from individual or group contributions, Demman explained. No special campaigns are conducted when the organization gets funds from the Community Chest, he added.

### Plans Evolved for Teacher Training

**BOISE, Sept. 30 (AP)—** Plans have been approved by the state board of education for a teacher training program to include teaching practice credits for new teachers in elementary and high schools.

The plan will enable teachers to qualify for regular state teaching certificates. R. E. Barry, assistant superintendent of public instruction, said.

The University of Idaho, Northern Idaho College of Education, and Southern Idaho College of Education will offer training under the plan, Barry said. The training will be offered for six semester hours of credit. The teachers must attend 160 summer sessions at the institutions evaluating the work.

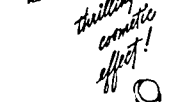

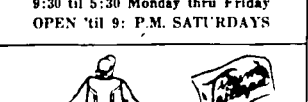

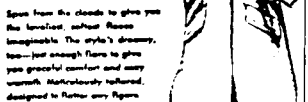
