

British Profit Tax Upped 5 Per Cent As Inflation Curb

LONDON, Sept. 27 (AP)—Sir Stafford Cripps raised British profit tax by one-fifth today to offset the inflationary effect of cheapening the pound. The tax on profits now is 25 per cent. Cripps said the house of commons he is increasing the rate to 30 per cent.

The chancellor also warned British business men of any further breaking away from the voluntary control of dividends I shall introduce legislation to restrict dividends in the next finance bill.

Cripps opened the crucial debate in the house of commons on the devaluation of the pound. He was fortified by a labor party caucus which, informants said, decided to stand behind the government on the currency issue.

Parliamentary Tax Starts
The labor party caucus proceeded, the opening of the government's parliamentary test on the currency question.

Before the meeting there had been speculation that some left-wing members of the party, hostile to prior raise resulting from the devaluation, might force the Minister of Finance to announce a vote of confidence to be taken on the currency issue.

This possibility, however, was rejected as the labor party caucus decided the labor party should stand behind the government.

Defeat of the government on the currency question would require the prime minister to call a new election immediately although he does not expect to do so.

Leaders of the labor party decided to support the government. The conference today made a statement to approve devaluation and calls on the people for full cooperation in speeding the British recovery.

Oct. 15 Deadline Set On Vote Registration

Deadline for registrations to qualify for the city manager election scheduled here Oct. 18 is 9 p.m. Oct. 15, City Clerk Constance J. Leiser announced Tuesday. She urged voters to register early.

Hours of registration are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily at the city hall. Anyone properly registered for the election last April 5 is qualified to vote at the coming election without registering again.

Officers must be 21 years of age, citizens of the United States, residents of Idaho for at least six months immediately preceding the election, resident of Twin Falls for three months immediately preceding the election and properly registered.

On Aug. 13 the city council set Oct. 18 as the date for election which will determine whether Twin Falls will adopt a city manager form of government instead of the present mayor-council system.

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Prosperity of U.S. Guarantees Peace, President Declares

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—President Truman said today American prosperity is the best guarantee of world peace, and he urged public support of his program to keep the economy booming.

In a radio broadcast that was openly political, Mr. Truman said critics who accuse him of seeking a "war state" are 160 years behind the times. He said "they want us to forget the language of the constitution."

He said the Democratic party stands for—and the line continued to be drawn—acting on measures to improve housing, education, health, and social security and to protect the wages of workers and incomes of farmers.

Party "Determined"
He said the party is determined to keep the economy growing and expanding. To make this possible, he said, congress is working on laws to assure better use of natural resources, to develop more electric power, and to raise the standard of living.

"Above all else we want to keep the United States prosperous and strong because we know that our country is the best guarantee of peace," he said.

"They want to promote the general welfare in this country in a measure to promote peace in the world."

"Program of Prosperity"
The program of the Democratic party is a program of prosperity and peace. It can be made effective only through the united efforts of our citizens.

Mr. Truman spoke from the White House on a program sponsored by the National Woman's Party and the women's division of the Democratic national committee. The program was in the form of a radio broadcast.

The President directed his speech mainly to women, inviting them to help in the program. He said the program is a program of prosperity and peace.

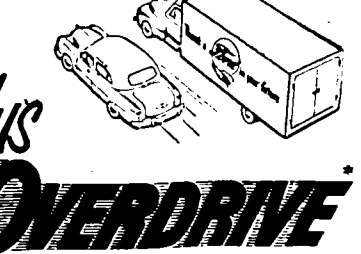

Senate Panel Note Delayed On Joint Plan

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP)—The senate panel "works to complete a report on the joint plan to develop the Columbia river basin in the next few weeks," according to the committee on the request until Thursday.

The committee on the request for authorization of a comprehensive river and harbor-dredging program for the area were Senators Magnuson, D. Wash. and Cain, R. Wash.

They asked that the house-passed omnibus river and harbor-dredging bill be amended to include the big program.

Leaving the committee, he told a reporter that the delay on their request had been ordered so that the committee have a list of specific projects contemplated under the program, with estimates on the cost, that can be carried on in the next four years.

While the committee generally favored all of the projects, the senator added, it felt only enough money should be appropriated to carry on the construction of the first part of the program for not more than four years.

Magnuson and Cain said they expected to have the bill reported to the committee when it meets Thursday.

The committee approved authorization of the proposed \$17,000,000 Green-Duane river flood control project south of Seattle.

Deploring Suggestion Cain deplored President Truman's recent suggestion that action be coordinated with the federal government until next year.

The president has urged legislation creating a Columbia valley authority, and said the comprehensive program for the river should be held until executive agencies concerned with it have completed their review.

Official Slaps Freight Rates Of Northwest

PORTLAND, Sept. 13 (AP)—Ottard Davidson, assistant secretary of the interior, has made a proposal for a change in Pacific northwest freight rates.

Davidson said the Catholic conference on industrial problems that the northwest is in a "critical position" and that the freight rates which are paid are "arbitrary freight rate structure."

He attacked "discriminatory freight rates" which make it difficult for the northwest to compete with other industrial areas.

The government official also demanded two specific suggestions: a Columbia valley authority, and a change in the Pacific northwest freight rates.

One was in a debate before the Chamber of Commerce, with Robert Ormond, chief Portland author, taking the anti-CVA side, and the other before the Catholic conference.

Zeal Revival
Called 'Need'
For This Era

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 27 (AP)—A revival of the religious fervor that inflamed Christians in the first century was urged upon churchmen by the leader of the Protestant Episcopal church in America.

President Bishop Henry Knox Sherrill, Boston, opening the church's 10th biennial general convention told bishops, priests and laymen:

"The tragedy of today is deeper than the circumstances we confront. It lies even more in the fact that we have forgotten our dependence upon God, that of ourselves we have no power to help ourselves."

The answer to the world's need is not to be found alone in the resources of the human spirit but in the power of God working in and through human life.

"Certainly as compared with the first century the spiritual temperature of the church is low," Bishop Sherrill said. "When the church was formally recognized by the Roman state something of the heart, the daring, the distinctive was lost from the Christian witness and in general, with notable exceptions, of groups and individual individuals this loss has never been repaired."

"We are all of us too conventional, too limited, and let us say frankly without any gross interpretation of the word, too worldly."

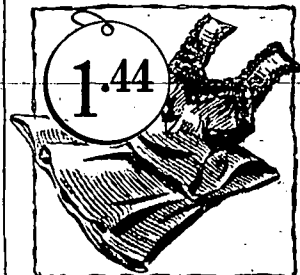

Settler of Buhl Is "too Ambitious to Retire" -- There's too Much to Do

BUHL, Sept. 7.—With her retirement from the Buhl cafe in July, 1931, friends of Stella Browne were sure she had decided to take a well-earned rest. Her retirement was far from her mind.

Retirement from public life was necessary to continue to live with a wife and child. One has only to talk with this enterprising individual to realize that retirement is in the distant future.

Stella McKay Browne was born Oct. 20, 1881, in Pomeroy, Utah. When only three or four weeks old, her mother and sister, Hortense, and the small baby had to leave for Healy, where they would join the father who had gone on ahead to start a hardware business.

The trip had to be started in spite of the baby's age or they would have been snowed out for the winter. Mrs. Browne's sister, Hortense, will be remembered by Valley residents as the late Mrs. I. P. Frymoyer.

When Stella was between 8 and 9 years of age, her mother died and the children were sent to live with their grandmother, postmistress at Healy river. During the winter her father, Frank McKay, had a Lincoln hotel in Shoshone and sent for Stella to join him there.

"That was quite a trip," Mrs. Browne recalled, "winter had already been so cold and it was as easy as it is now. When we reached Albion, we were nearly frozen, and the children were sent to live with their grandmother, postmistress at Healy river. During the winter her father, Frank McKay, had a Lincoln hotel in Shoshone and sent for Stella to join him there."

"I was able to enter the third grade at Healy, the Odd Fellows, and then returned to Buhl Lake City and Milford, Utah."

Mrs. Browne returned to Magic Valley at the age of 18 and lived at the Blue Lake ranch until she was 20.

"I came to Buhl when the town was in the 'twenties," Mrs. Browne recalled. "The town had been started on April 10, 1906, and I arrived in April 20, 1920. The hotel, which occupied the corner where the Sport Shop is now located, in the only building still standing of the original townsite."

Mrs. Browne took over the hotel, which at that time had a cigar store and cafe in connection. Through the hotel was not completed, business was carried on. The new town was teeming with arrivals coming in to "prove" land. There was no time to worry about where one slept or ate.

Realizing the new town would be a permanent community, Mrs. Browne knew that religious training would be a must, and decided to gather the women of the townsite together to talk over plans for organizing a Sunday school.

"I sent out invitations for a card party, and it took every woman on the townsite to make up four tables."

Won't Retire

Mrs. Browne said, "After the party we got busy and formed the first Sunday school in Buhl."

"Because the only available place for meetings was the hotel, we made the hotel parlor our headquarters."

Some of the first members of that Sunday school still live in the valley. Among them are Rose Johnson Wilson and her brother, Oscar, Margaret and Chester Hobson, Margaret and Don Fretsch, Alton and Johnny Lindstrom. In those days the hotel served as a headquarters for everything. The first lodge organized in Buhl, the Odd Fellows, met there.

Not content with seeing the Sunday school project under way, Mrs. Browne felt they must have an organ and began accepting donations. Dave Burley, passenger agent for the Buhl route, was the first to contribute.

The first big wedding on the townsite was that of Leno Burley and Joy Allen. "There was a big reception," Mrs. Browne said, "and everyone attended."

Although "mountain hicks" came and gossiped as Mrs. Browne termed them, were the only

means of transportation, all entertainments were well attended. It was a welcome relief from the daily chore of grubbing saguaro.

Mrs. Browne chatted when she recalled the first Thanksgiving dance in Buhl. Al Nihart was appointed to get the floor ready. "The dance was to be held in what is now the Sport Shop."

More serious than informed on the treatment of dance floors, Nihart poured melted paraffin all over the floor. "When we discovered the error at a late hour, we scraped with all the tools available in Buhl, but our efforts were pretty much useless, so we covered the paraffin with corn meal and made the best of a bad situation," she recalled.

"The long dresses were ruined by the mixture. The music for the dance was furnished by Mr. and Mrs. Tom Holmes. Mrs. Holmes played the piano and Holmes the violin. Mrs. Browne served a banquet to 200 persons that night."

Her business started with the town and it won't long before E. A. Miller opened the first bank, Russ Alford the second bank. "Thousand day doctors Mrs. Browne remembers were Dr. Monroe, Dr. Alford, Dr. McClary and one whose name she could not recall other than he was called the "Cody doctor" and made the rounds on horseback.

"I led the crew that ran the first electric lines from the Thousand Springs to Jarbidge, Nev., in the fall now occupied by the R and R. You know, after living by the alarm clock for 37 years it's hard to retire," Mrs. Browne said. "In fact I'm too ambitious to retire—there's too much to do."

At present she is working on a book of western poetry, complete with illustrations. Besides her own writing activities she has a constant demand for reference work for other writers compiling a history of the early days of this country.

Her home literally is filled with mementoes of the early days, even to a glass given to her when she first came to Buhl. A Mrs. Ortlieb gave Mrs. Browne a rose geranium when she first moved to Buhl, and Mrs. Browne still has a plant growing from a slip of the original.

She has a large collection of old dishes, each with a story of the early days connected with it. Two milk globes more than 100 years old brought to this country from England by her family, old calendar plates that are early day mementoes of the first Buhl marchants.

But Mrs. Browne has little time to look back, she's too busy with the future.

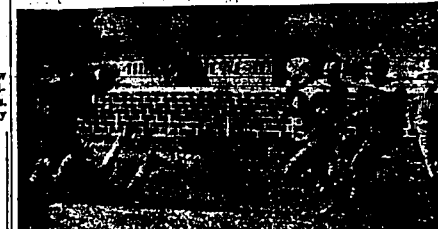
Albion Trounces Hazelton 32-13
