

CLASS Cut Pact Ties With Tito

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29 (AP)—The British scrapped her pact with Yugoslavia today, declaring that Marshal Tito's forces had flooded up with "fascist circles."

The pact, which was the alliance between the two nations, was disclosed in a dispatch to Yugoslavia. It was signed in Belgrade.

The pact called for the extradition of former Yugoslav leaders, including Josip Broz Tito, to Yugoslavia. It also provided for the extradition of British subjects who had been carrying on espionage activities for the Soviet Union.

Plastic Air Speed Is Told

KING, Sept. 29 (AP)—Aerodynamic engineers at the University of Michigan have found that the speed of air flow over a wing is not the same as the speed of the air itself. The engineers have admitted possible errors in their calculations, but they have been consistently correct in their predictions. The discovery means that the air speed indicator on an airplane does not measure the true air speed. 

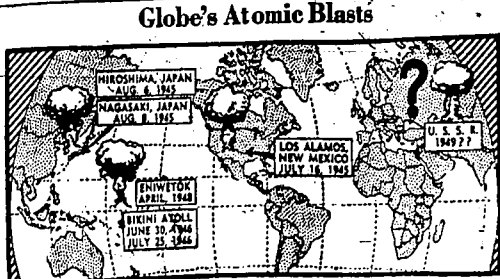

Fairview Dairy Farmers Try New Way of Putting up Silage

By MEN TOM TWEEDY
FAIRVIEW, Sept. 25.—The cows of the Ritchie Holstein herd owned by Tom Richmond and his son, T. W. Richmond, are thrashing maturing their silage in anticipation of the feed succulent green fodder and corn which will be fermenting the next three or four weeks in a silage pit on the Richmond farm.

Good news to the farmers who need to crowd the last entitled in making silage is the streamlined water way the Richmonds are doing it.

Many a farmer remembers the old back-breaking job of loading the whole corn stalk by hand onto horse drawn wagons, the trip to the silo, hand feeding it into a stationary chopper, blowing it up into the silo through pipes placed in springs along the side. Making neat, and timely the full silo became a task that had to be packed firmly and evenly in place by a man tramping on it and using a hose to keep it wet. Even in depression days it was hard to get a crew together when the job was putting up silage.

Today the work is mechanized so neatly and accomplished with a minimum of sweat and sweat.

The Richmonds' corn this year is prime priced with great stalks about 10 feet high, laden with long thick ears well filled with corn just out of the milk stage. The upper four or five feet of the stalks have

the lumber in building a lodge hall in Bogal.

Frank Atkins and Irving Ward also each had silage and the three farmers would work together in exchanging work in filling them. These few silos have been torn down and used to build new structures on the farm.

Irving Ward, pioneer owner of the Richmond place, once had a large dairy herd. Before disease swept through the cattle and he was forced to sell at the depression price of \$10 per head.

The silo later was torn down and the Richmonds have converted the cement pit on which it stood into a drainage pit for manure from their farm, spread periodically over their fields.

The Richmonds' milk an average of 28 cows producing about 15 cans of grade A milk daily. They belong to the Twin Falls County Dairy Herd Improvement association of 34 herds comprising 600 cows.

In August they had the highest producing cow in the association, an animal named Kate which produced 84 pounds of butterfat in the month. In September that top cow averaged more than 100 pounds but whether this will be high or not won't be known until October.

Richmond said about eight acres of corn was used for silage this year. He hopes to increase milk production by its use as well as conserve on the consumption of alfalfa hay.

The value of the silage in the pit will be tested this fall. It will be allowed to ferment several weeks

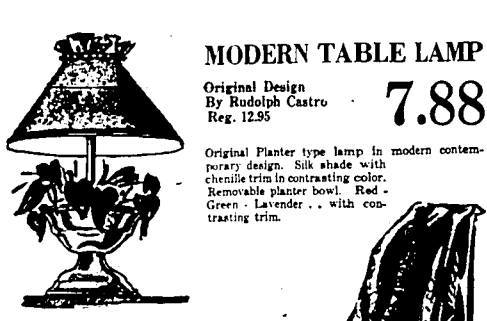

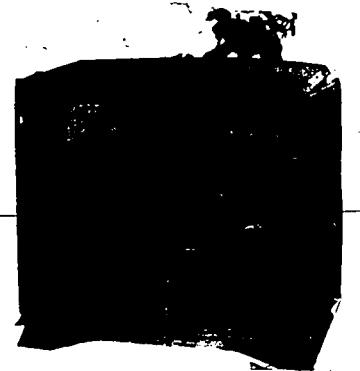

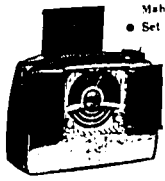

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Forest Blazes In Idaho Stop As Rains Fall

McCALL, Sept. 28 (AP)—A widespread rainstorm over southern Idaho today added five crews in stopping the last of 40 forest fires set by lightning during the past week.

The 120-acre fire on Cuddy mountain 14 miles northwest of Connetquot, was under control last night. It was the largest fire in the Boise and Payette forests during the outbreak.

Five crews are being returned to southern Idaho harvest fields today as rapidly as they were recruited early in the week.

Fire Commissioner Lynn Knight of the Boise forest said only about 100 to 150 men are being employed on succeeding 10 operations in the forest, while about 800 are finishing up the Payette fires.

Three bases left Boise this morning for Council to return Muddy mountain fire fighters to their homes.

At the peak of the fire there were 500 men on the fire line. About half inch of rain fell near McCall last night and a two-inch shower fell over the Cuddy mountain fire.

Fourteen new fire breaks out in the Boise forest yesterday afternoon and two new ones were reported in the Payette forest. The week concluded quickly.

Wall Hanks, fire dispatcher of the Boise forest, said the situation is 50 percent better as result of the precipitation.

Classification of Blood Is Related

OLENUS FERRY, Sept. 28.—Blood classification cards for the last two runs of the Red Cross bloodmobile were received this week by Sam Jones, blood bank chairman of Blaine county Red Cross chapter, who stated that individual cards will be mailed as soon as necessary.
