It is predicted that the only
total solar eclipse of the year
will occur on Oct. 2, 1949, at
the time of the harvest moon with
the sun rising at 8:37 A.M. and
setting at 4:41 P.M. The total
eclipse will last from 7:29 to 8:37
and the moon will be darkened by
the sun's shadow for 1 hour, 10
minutes and 5 seconds.

The total duration of the
eclipse will be 4 hours, 10
minutes and 5 seconds. The chance
of seeing it at all stages of the cycle
is excellent.

For centuries, man has
watched and studied the sun and
the moon. These are quite
natural and nothing unusual
has ever been observed.
