Four Divorce Cases Put on Court Docket

Four divorce complaints were filed Tuesday in district court, all by wives. Two complaints charge drunkenness.

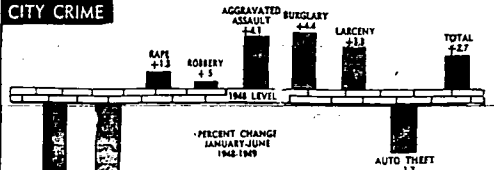
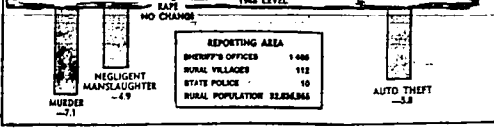
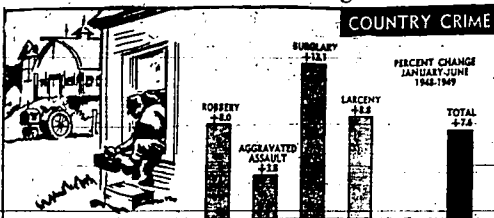

Tito Releases 713 Prisoners In Red Rebuff

BEGRAD, Yugoslavia, Oct. 2 (AP)—Yugoslavia today announced the release by security police of 713 political prisoners. They had been jailed for supporting the communist government.

The release was announced by Minister of Interior Aleksander Rankovic, boss of the country's security police, served as a surprise to charges by the country's eastern European neighbors that they were being released to aid Yugoslavia themselves against Tito's independent communist administration.

Russia Starts Squeeze Play Against Foes

BERLIN, Oct. 19.—The Russian move to set up an east European government controlled by an American political official today as a new squeeze play for control of Berlin.

The Soviet strategy is expected to unfold by the week-end as Western German political sources said. The Russians have ordered the communist-controlled people's council to convene in Berlin Friday and provide the new government with opposition to the western European republic at home.

The British-licensed press continues to insist that the Russian demand is a squeeze play for control of the city.

The American political official, who asked not to be quoted by name, asserted: "This means the end of Berlin as a four-power city. The Russians are deliberately trying to destroy the city's separate identity and force the impression that it is part of the Russian zone."

The Soviet zone of occupation surrounds Berlin, and the Russian capital was established by the four occupation powers as a completely separate zone in 1945.

In Foreign Country. If the Russians lose in Berlin a citizen of western Germany, supposedly paying allegiance to the West, would be in effect in a foreign country when he stepped through the Brandenburg gate into the Soviet sector of Berlin.

"This does not mean that the Russians would erect customs barriers and all that sort of thing," this American source said. "But they keep the borders open to encourage the support of those who are dissatisfied on this side of the fence."

Western Berlin, already an autonomous, has been reporting for the 1930's that Allied authorities have denied the application, assuming that such an admission would violate agreements for free officials of Berlin as a four-power city. This situation now changes. Allied officials said, if the east German government sets up shop in the Russian sector of Berlin.

Briton Dollar, Gold Reserves Still Dropping

LONDON, Oct. 19.—Britain disclosed last night that her dollar and gold reserves fell to \$1,400,000,000 at the end of September.

But this was only a half-year's drop that had been foretold, and it was \$80,000,000 above the level of the end of September. The gross deficit in dollar output and income of the reserve for the quarter actually was \$22,000,000. But this was partially covered by \$25,000,000 from a Canadian loan and \$24,000,000 from Marshall plan advances, leaving a deficit of \$13,000,000.

The figures were announced by Sir Stafford Cripps, chancellor of the exchequer, in a speech at the annual food mayor's dinner for bankers and merchants of London's financial district. At the same time they were released by the treasury. Cripps said the post-drawdown of the dollar deficit in foreign trade still was "an impossible burden."

Sheep Decline An Odd Case, Report Shows

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—The agriculture department issued a report today on the strange case of the missing sheep.

Since 1921, the nation's sheep population has dropped 64 per cent.

In those seven years, sheep numbers have declined on all farms having records to the lowest level on records dating back to 1867. There are no records to prove it, but the department said it believes per capita consumption and desire for mutton is at the lowest point since early colonial days.

Wanted in Turkey

The seven-year decline in sheep numbers was not staged by any livestock animal in American history, the department's report said.

What caused it? Americans ate up the sheep in the form of mutton and lamb, sheep raisers didn't replace them.

Why not?

Sheepherders left.

Well, the report said, part of the blame must rest with sheepherders. It was opened up new opportunities for him in industry and other farming enterprises. They got tired of "their loneliness and often low-paying occupation" and deserted. Of these more lucrative fields.

Other economic factors helped reduce sheep numbers, the report said. Increases in meat prices made it more profitable for sheep raisers to sell off their animals for meat than for wool production. Furthermore, cattle raising became more profitable than sheep raising for many areas in recent years.

Shape of Full Globe Surveyed From Rock in Kansas Pasture

LUCAS, Kan. (AP)—An unimposing rock that rises about six inches above the surface of Frank Robinson's pasture 12 miles north-west of here is the center of a world-wide survey. It is a small rock, but it is the center of a world-wide survey.

The survey is being conducted by the United States Geological Survey. The survey is being conducted by the United States Geological Survey.

The current project is the second phase of the job. Last year, astronomical calculations were made by geologic survey officials. This year they are making gravity checks, consisting around the rock in Robinson's farm. The scientists will use the two studies together and get a new determination of the earth's exact size.

Robinson's rock has been used before. For about 50 years it has been the basis of every triangle drawn by surveyors over the whole United States. All buildings surveyed, from the White House to the barn on Old MacDonald's farm, are down on charts as being a certain distance from the rock.

When the marker was first put in place, in 1881, it was just one of many points of reference established across the nation. But it soon became the principal one, when geologic survey officials decided it was the most nearly accurate of them all.

It became virtually the geodetic center of the nation. And, in 1913, the rock extended its importance beyond the borders of the United States. Canada and Mexico consented to recognize it as the basis of their survey, too. So, for all intents and purposes, it became the geodetic center of the whole North American continent.

U. S. Finishes First Quarter Far in "Red"

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (AP)—The government finished the first quarter of the fiscal year \$1,782,140,000 worse off than at the same point a year ago.

The figures are for the three months ended Sept. 30. Government business runs on this basis of a fiscal year starting July 1. Fiscal 1934 ended with a \$1,811,440,000 budget deficit for the year.

The treasury reported today the government went \$1,782,140,000 in the hole during the first three months of fiscal 1935. Last year it was \$1,829,500 ahead for the first quarter.

With the final fiscal 1934 budget deficit depending in large part upon the fate of billions in appropriation bills caught in the worst congressional log-jam in history, there could be only guesswork on the ultimate outcome.

However, estimates on the year-end deficit ranged from a conservative \$1,000,000,000 figure offered by an administration official to a top of \$1,200,000,000 or more, forecast by Senator Byrd, D., Va.

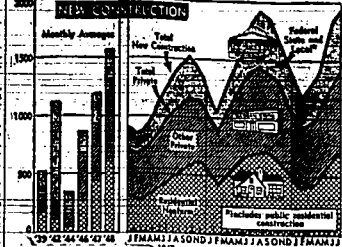
