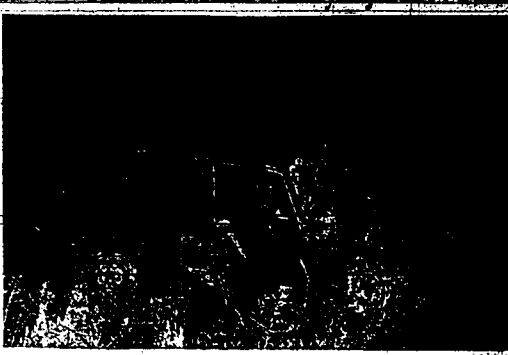

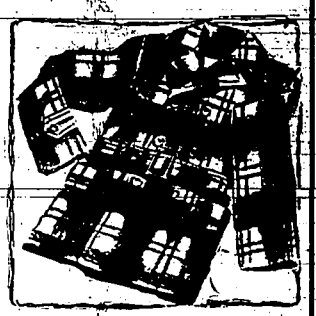

But they will keep the national social service, which is very popular in Britain. Even the British Conservative party leans much closer to some of the basic policies of the Labor party—socialized medicine, for example—than either the Democrats or Republicans parties in America.

Conservative Republicans are very cautious about the possibility of a general election which they will do if they win. They know victory will throw in their laps one of the most critical stages of economic crisis in British history.

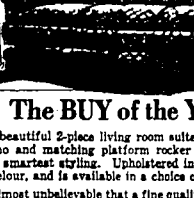

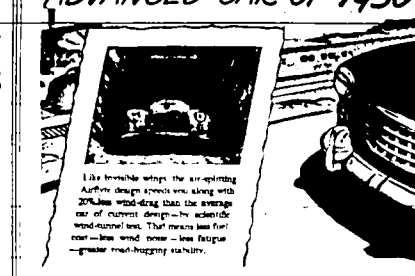

Cowboy, Horse and Rope Remain Basic Items in Annual Roundup of Cattle

Cattle Sorted As Portion of Fall Roundup

By LETHA W. TRIPP
 GOODING, Oct. 6.—Cattle-rang- ing clouds raced across the late September sky, continuously unpleasant weather. A feeling of expectancy hung in the air, in the approach toward the long drive visible on the slight sage-covered rise ahead.

Strong gusts of wind eagerly picked up the heavy dust stirred by a marching herd. Cold gusts were exchanged and hurried activity of setting up a small camp began at once.

As far as the eye could reach the range land, care covered with plentiful range feed, now dry and dusty, the wide, level, low hills were hazy in the distance.

Suddenly there was almost simultaneously in a half dozen different sections, rising up over the horizon appeared silent moving masses which gradually became discernible as cattle and riders drifting toward the center of a vast circle.

Two or three bunches converged at one point and the riders moved so neatly as if the earth had opened up and the animals were hundreds of head of cattle! Later it was revealed that a small ravine through which runs a trickle of water was the secret hiding place of the herd.

Sounds like reading from a western movie scenario of the opening pages of a western romance doesn't it? The setting could be found in either, but it actually the annual fall roundup of the Thorn Creek Cattle association only a few miles northeast of Gooding in Lincoln county.

Some 1200 or more cattle were rounded up by about 100 riders who are members of the association, and a pair of western romancers doesn't Dom Fredrickson, president of the Thorn Creek association, was rounded up low. The federal range land includes a vast area of grazing land northeast of Gooding and north of Gooding.

As the cattle were gathered at one point the riders were taking turns coming into the camp established earlier at the slight rise. To reach past riders, the crowd is hunched and ate as they could. The lunch and ate as they could. The members have been setting up the lunch camp, providing hot food and making of coffee and tea.

Despite all the innovations to make the roundup easier, the place of a rider and a good horse to round up the cattle on the range.

Many stockmen truck the horses to the range but there are still miles of riding, and the cowboy side of their horses, straining up to the line on short, stilted, struts, stiff from the hard ride.

Bones were slightly ached at the thought of being loaded a pile of food, remembering other days of cold jacket, hunched but from appearance it didn't take long to get over their embarrassment, and huge quantities of food disappeared.

In fact nearly 25 quarts of beef and noodle stew, 12 loaves of bread five quarts of ice cream in spite of the cold wind, gallons of hot coffee and several cakes were consumed quickly.

There was a great deal of banter, the latest "camp life" was a "pink ice cream" but this was over soon, for after lighting up the trucks the riders hurried back to get on with the job at hand.

Then began the gigantic task of setting out, or separating the different brands. A horse which seemed an impossibility, but the experienced rider had a little difficulty recognizing the many brands.

After that they must drive the cow and to a smaller herd and on this particular day the cattle were not "mooching up" because of bad weather. For some peculiar reason the unpredictable cattle will not "mooch up" with her calf on a steady stormy day so many riders had to return to the range later to hunt up strays and orphans.

Back and forth the sure-footed horse carried their riders, cutting out during the afternoon. During the time the heavy dust hung in the air, seemingly all seemed to be a man's day.

By evening all men were of the same complexion, a dusty gray. The wind was cold, there was no time out from the endures back and forth over rough sage-covered, hilly, brown range land. And in most cases there were still miles of driving the cattle to corrals for the night. Many had already begun to drift back toward the foothills.

There goes a cow with a hat, the "JA Bar," belonging to George Artoosh, the "Lay O X," to F. W. Bell, the "Steerhead" to Harry Patterson, all Gooding, the "Hooking S," to Cliff Stittman, the "Lay O X," to Sam Danvers, Rhoshone, and many others. There are 28 members of the association and the registering of their brands is an interesting story to itself.

longer. Guy Worden is rider for the Thorn Creek association. Fall roundups are being held in most places about this time. The cattle are beginning to lose weight and are brought in for winter feeding and some shipment, and for branding and inoculation against disease for the calves.

Sitting on the top rail of the corral in the exhilarating October sun-light was much better than a front row seat at a rodeo. The wind had blown itself out and the day was perfect. Here was the real thing!

Despite some of the biggest calves, although it looked easy from the corral fence. And the effort was ease with which a loop was dropped over a calf was a startling thing to see.

Here again a good horse is invaluable. It stands and holds against the rope, seeming to know just the right way and the exact moment to turn.

When once a small fire on the ground, constantly tended, kept the branding iron searing hot, there now is a gas generated blow torch.

The steady, reliable work of the men on the ground as they roped, about the reaching into the neck of the calf, lopped off its tail so they would know it has been vaccinated, re-marked, and placed the hot iron of the "D" brand on its hip was a sharp contrast with the terrified, swaying of the calf as the branding iron was applied.

For a moment the calf lay quiet, then as the long hair blazed the frenzied bawling began. After the calf was released it trotted off peacefully to find its mother who nuzzled it anxiously. Only the dreadful companions who had their fingers in the ear and another rider's calf is dragged up.

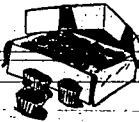

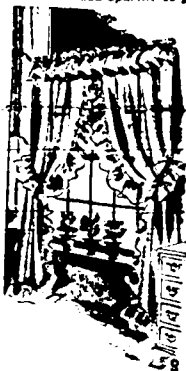

Farm House Fire Danger List Is Told

MOSCOW, Oct. 9.—Persons who live in farm houses are in greater danger of burning to death than those in city houses. The warning from the National Fire Protection association was passed on today by the University of Idaho extension service in a statement calling attention to national fire prevention week Oct. 8 to 13.

The U. S. department of agriculture and state agricultural extension services are cooperating in an effort to reduce fire hazards.

Dangerous Shows
The protective association estimated that almost 100,000 of the persons killed in fires are residents of farms, although only about 100,000 live in cities.

The national fire prevention week is observed in flames-proofing their future, attention was called to eight common hazards that cause most of the farm fires.

- 1. Careless smoking habits.
- 2. Accumulation of debris.
- 3. Flammable white paint.
- 4. Improper storage of gasoline and kerosene and use of flammable kerosene lamps.
- 5. Improper cutting of stacked or stored hay.
- 6. Faulty or defective heating plants.
- 7. Lack of lightning rods on main buildings.
- 8. The national fire prevention week says 10 farm residents die in fires every day. "Make sure you are not next," it said. "Do your best to see that your turn never comes."

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Oct. 8.—Slapping down the myths in a tractor motor can save a lot of fuel. Owen K. Brown, extension agricultural engineer at the University of Idaho extension operation, says this work.

Check the fuel system often. He advised to see there are no leaks in the gas lines and make sure the carburetor is functioning properly. If the carburetor leaks Brown said, it probably needs a new float or float valve.

The engineer particularly cautioned tractor drivers to use the choke only when necessary. A choked tractor may waste as much as a gallon of fuel in an hour.

Brown said a carburetor should be adjusted only when the engine is warm and according to instructions of the tractor firm. He also advised the use of a correct type of manifold, and inspection of spark plugs every 300 hours.

Check the magneto regularly and service the air cleaner daily, he suggested.
